GINN'S OUTLOOK ON GE EMPLOYMENT VERY MISLEADING

NOBODY WANTS A STRIKE...BUT...

NOBODY WANTS A STRIKE. NOBODY LIKES STRIKES...BUT...IN EVERY CASE WHERE A STRIKE HAS OCCURRED, IT HAS BEEN FORCED UPON THE MEMBERSHIP BY BIG BUSINESS.

If the companies involved really sat down at the bargaining table and negotiated in "GOOD FAITH", there would never be any

Speaking of negotiating in "GOOD FAITH", let's take a look at the 1958 sessions between GE and the IUE.

GE and IUE signed a 5-year contract in 1955 with a reopener in 1958 on Employment Security. However, in 1958, the GE refused to talk about Employment Security, but instead they offered a so-called savings and security plan which, in their own words, would cost them nothing. It

When President Carey says that we owe GE a strike, it is very clear what he means employed in the local plant. because under ordinary circumstances in 1958, when GE REFUSED TO BARGAIN IN "GOOD FAITH" on Employment Security, there should have been a strike.

RATHER THAN BARGAIN IN "GOOD FAITH", GE started the propaganda presses rolling.. For example: They told the people in Schenectady that if they voted for a strike, it would be a long and bitter one and they would make a ghost town out of Schenectady.

They said, however, that if the people voted akainst a strike, THERE COULD BE 4,000 MORE JOBS in Schenectady and that the future would be bright.

Well, here it is one year later and we have had nothing but a continual decline in employment at the Schenectady plant and the future looks very black. Therefore, it is certainly easy to understand why our National President, James Carey, feels that we owe GE a strike.

OF COURSE, GE KNOWS that no one including Pres. Carey wants a strike if GE will bargain in good faith and give their employees what they so justly deserve.

CONTRARY TO THE BRIGHT PICTURE PAINTED BY GINN, there is still going to be a large layoff in the GE Steam-Turbine Department.

Representatives of the Union met with management last Thursday on the outlook in the Steam-Turbine Department.

The present estimate is that employment will drop by 1,000 people by Dec. 1, 1959. This is 850 in the bargaining unit reason for union members to have to strike and from 150 to 250 employees in the salaried group.

> THE UNION WAS INFORMED by the Turbine management that they did not anticipate any pick-up in employment in that department until the last quarter of 1961. We as a Union fail to see anything optimistic in this report.

According to Mr. Ginn's own report, during 1960 and 1961 there will be only 22,000 persons employed in GE in the had nothing to do with Employment Security. Schenectady plant. We find very little consolation in this when only five short years ago there were over 40,000 people

> We as a Union feel that if the representatives of GE were really interested in improving the unemployment situation in Schenectady, they should sub-contract into this city some of the government orders they have on hand ... and that they should utilize some of the surplus skilled help we have in Schenectady. There are many empty buildings and idle machines which could be put to use to alleviate the unemployment situation in Schenectady.

THIS WOULD INDEED HELP TO TIDE US OVER THE LEAN YEARS OF 1960 AND 1961.

We also find very little consolation in Ginn's statement that they will be recalling 100 people a month to replace the people who retire or die. This certainly |will mean no increase in the number of people employed in Schenectady.
