A new subway bill, hot off the desk of Senator Arthur Wicks, number of organizations with membership among subway workers. Introduced last Tuesday as S.I.1223, the bill establishes seniority, on the basis of length of service on any transit ine. If enacted, for example, it provides that when elevated lines are torn down, subway employees now on the Eighth Avenue Sy tem would be laid off and re placed by men from other rail placeds.

## We Suggest a Bill

LAST year, The Leader editorially advocated a bill to end the difficulties caused by local residence plowed by the State. The suggestion was taken up by Supreme Court Justice Kleinfeld, then a State Sanator, and Assemblyman Wagner. The Kleinfeld-Wagner bill sought to exclude State employees from strict of fects of any local residence laws, such as New York
City's Lyons Law. The bill unanimously passed in City's Lyons Law. The bill unanimously passed
the Assembly but was not reported in the Senate.
The Leader suggests that this bill be revived. Under the terms of the Fite bill, many communities are soon to set up residence restrictions. We also suggest that a new provision be added to meet a difficulty that has arisen since last session. Many young men and women who have taken exams are leaving their home towns to accept jobs in defense industries. These positions are temporary, and the workers expect soon to assume their rightful position on local eligible lists. However, under strict interpretation of residence restrictions, they may very well be declared ineligible jus
they were helping their country arm itself.

Pay Cut Proposed
This editorial is so good we're reprinting it in full. It's from the Na-
tional Federation of Postal Office Clerks. Every Civil Service employee Representative Clare Hoffman of Michigan has introduced a bill to cut the salaries of government employees, providing a 10 percent cut
for our own particular wage level ( $\$ 1,000$ to $\$ 2,500$ ). What interests for our own particular wage level ( $\$ 1,000$ to $\$ 2,500$ ). What interests us exceedingly is not only the actual pay cut provisions, but also the introduction of the bill, which states that it is to "provide for common detense. Essentialy, his is the trick known as hiting below the belt. It sweeps aside all reasonable argument and says in effect,
"It you dare to oppose this bill, you are selfish, and a traitor to your
It appears to Representative Hoffman that this cut is necessary, for, another statement of the bill is that it is to last as long as there is a national emergency." Is there an emergency so great as to justify Congress on national defense orders, provided for a tax reaching a limit of 50 percent, not on normal profits, but only on "excess" profits, at the same time allowing deductions from the tax for the cost of new plant expansion. We will not go into the intricacies of these proing called for from the corporations that are making the armaments. on the contrary, the benefits are quite liberal. In that case, why should the call to "sacrifice," and the accompanying threat, be thrown at us? This cut, to the average Post Office clerk, is not one of
"profits," but one that will cut his food, clothing and medical care. Does Representative Hoffman realize this? What is going on in his nind we do not know, but we do know the general mentality that lies behind such ideas. It is a program not of national defense, but in order to feather its own nest at some one ement of "emergency" against this mentality during the depths of the depression, when a powerful group of lobbyists fought every measure that would help num wage law, housing, W.P.A., the right to join a union, etc. They gave many fine-sounding reasons, but the essential one was that these measures raised "the price of labor" to them, and so prevented them from making the fullest profit out of the people's misery.
So it is with this bill. Behind it lies a general move to push down wages. As experience has repeatedly shown when fighting for an in-
crease, the movement up or down of the pay of government employees seems to be regarded as a guidepost for the movement of pay in out-

It is a peculiar thing that whenever the sound of "emergency", rises, a group of minds should immediately shout Get atter labor cut costs (meaning wages)! Increase hours! Take away their right to
organize, to speak freely for themselves, to strike," etc., etc! Why should labor be suddenly regarded as a dangerous element? It is not that we, or the rest of labor, have any interests apart from the interests of our country, For one thing, labor constitutes by far is dangerous to those who would aggrandize themselves under the cover of "emergency" cries. Labor fears that it is too easy to take the next step, of deepening the emergency to increase the aggrandizement. Labor might point at some who advocate cuts in wages for "emergency" but number among their customers countries which the headlines say are causing the "emergency." Labor does not believe in an "emergency" that attacks only the health and manhood of the country, the economic life of the workman and the small business
man who work on a small enough margin as it is.

Vets Vs. Investigators
Veterans in the Welfare Depart-
