




The consideration of matters relating to the Model and
Primary department, was resumed.

The Treasurer stated that the expenses of the primary
department for the current year will exceed the receipts
from tuition by about \$240. The President
stated that he does not regard the continuance of
this department important for the purposes of the
Normal School. Whereupon it was ordered
that this department be discontinued after the
present term, and that the Secretary so inform
the teacher Miss Kirtland.
