✓ The Secretary reported that pursuant to the directions of the Committee he had made an agreement with James A. Shattuck for the sale of the material of the burnt building No. 82 Market St to be removed and the ground put in order, said Shattuck to pay to the Committee the sum of \$100⁰⁰. On motion of Dr. Ward this agreement was approved.

✓ Superintendent Ryggles reported that pursuant to the directions of the Committee he had received from the City of Albany a Joint Claim and waiving all claim on the part of the City to the premises now occupied by the old Normal School building on the corner of State and Howard Streets and conveying the same to the State. On motion of Mr. Murray this report was accepted and the due orders to be rendered, and the thanks of the Committee were tendered to Super. Ryggles for his services.

On motion of Mr. Fayer, President Watkinson was directed to confer with

Pipson Boss, the director of the Observatory with reference to a system of time service and signals for the new building, and after such consultation to make such arrangements as shall seem best for securing proper apparatus, at a cost not to exceed three hundred dollars.

On motion of Dr. Ward, the Architect was directed to make an agreement with Mr. Post Kitchen to put a concrete floor in the Chemical Laboratory in place of the wood floor provided in the contract with the carpenter.

On motion of Mr. Ingr the Building Committee was authorized to purchase from Mott's iron works, New York city, iron sinks for the chemical laboratory at \$120 per each.

A communication was presented from President Watkinson, announcing the death of Professor Sumner H. Babcock, and nominating Edward A. Burtt in his place as professor of Natural Sciences. On motion of Dr. Ward this nomination was approved and Mr. Burtt was appointed at a salary of \$1500 per annum, to begin

from the beginning of the School year.

The following memorial minute prepared by President Watkinson on the death of Professor Babcock was adopted and ordered to be sent out on the record of the Committee:

Professor Sumner H. Babcock.

The Executive Committee of the State Normal School make this record in memory of the late Professor Sumner H. Babcock: He filled the chair of the department of Natural Science with ability, industry, and faithfulness in all that relates to the duties of his position. He was in all respects an admirable model for the students of the school. His good judgment and sound ideas are well exhibited in the planning and arrangement of the equipments for teaching science in the new building. His early and lamented death is a loss to this institution, to the cause of education and the advancement of science. His blamless and happy life must, even amid the sadness over his death, be a comfort to his friends, parents and family, to whom

We tender our heartfelt and earnest sympathy.

The Secretary will enter this minute on the records of the Executive Committee, and transmit a copy thereof to the parents of the deceased.

The Executive Committee met pursuant to the call of the Chairman.

Messrs. Waterbury and Architect Wright were also present. The minutes of the preceding meeting were read & approved.

Architect Wright reported that he had conferred with Archer, Pancoast and Co. as directed and had arranged for a reduction of 15% in the contract for gas fixtures to be furnished by them.

On motion of Mr. Murray the Building Committee was directed to reduce the expenditure for clocks to \$300.
