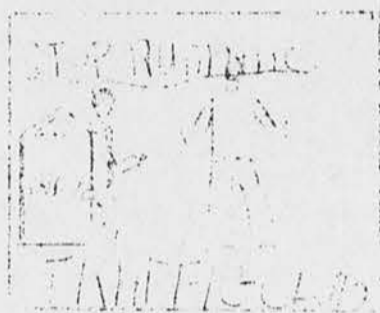

This fall, under the new system, everyone attending Milne must pay \$25.00 a year, or \$12.50 a semester.

Taking the place of Miss Katherine E. Wheeling, of the English Department, is a graduate of both Milne and State--- Mrs. Jayne D. Garrison.

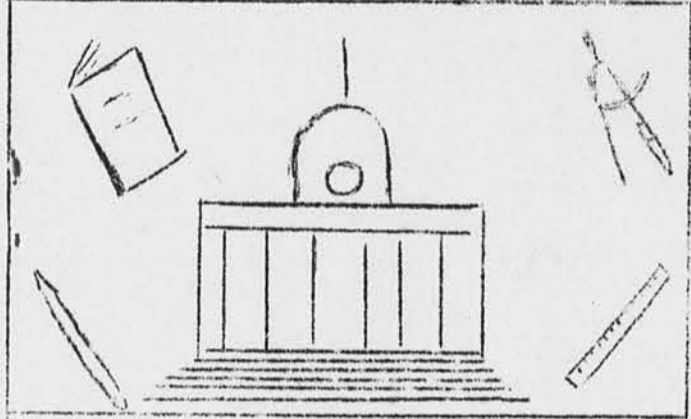
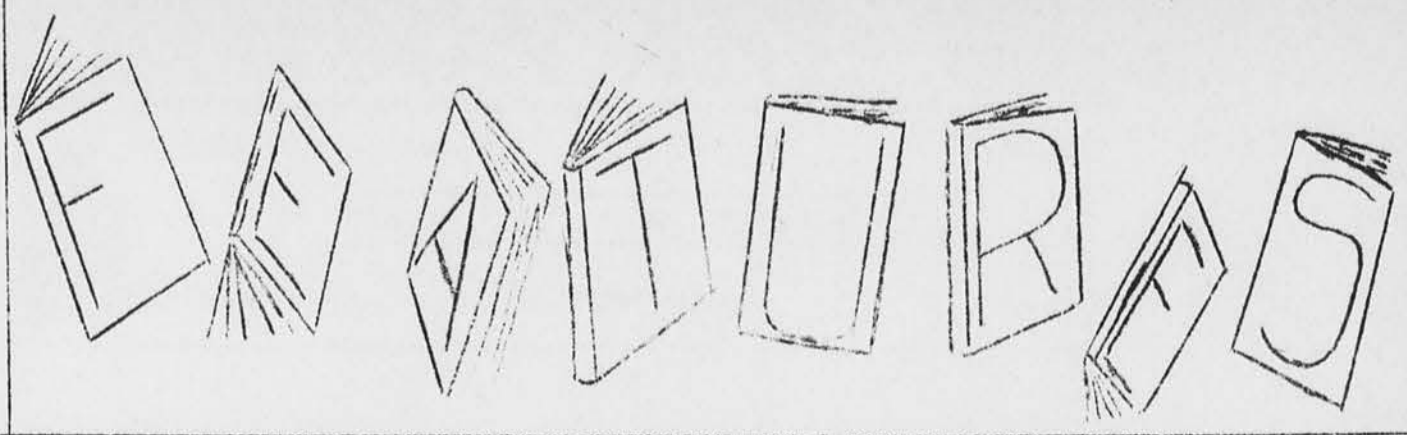
We wish luck, happiness, and success to these new members of our faculty. We know that we shall have an enjoyable, profitable season.
