colleagues in Federal or State Service when it comes to vacations, An order issued by State Service when it comes to vacations An order issued by Mayor LaGuardia last June to heads of all City departments is still in effect, and provides for a vacation
of 12 working days. In addition it allows the use of 12 days of unused sick leave with the vacation period.
