

Dean Of Teacher Education Recommends Name Change

The office of Hermann Cooper, Executive Dean of Teacher Educa-tion of the State University of New York, has recommended a change of names of the colleges for Teachers and the Teachers College to the uniform title of College of Education.

Dr. Cooper, in a memorandum for William S. Carlson, President of the State University of New York, dated February 24, 1955, states that both the public and the profession are considerably confused because an assumption is made that the two different names either give better status or certain inferred privileges to the colleges for teachers. "This situation is unfortunate and should be corrected at an early date" states Cooper. His office has recommended that one title be used for the eleven
