Dear News Director,

Events in Southern Africa are unfolding very quickly. The Mass Democratic Movement in South Africa has intensified its' resistance aganist the apartheid government recently forcing the release of seven of the long imprisoned ANC leadership. On November 7, Namibians will vote for the first time in their lives for a government of their choosing.

By way of this letter I am informing you that we are available to give a local reaction to any future news coming from Southern Africa. We have worked closely with the liberation movements of South Africa (ANC) and of Namibia (SWAPO). We have participated in international conferences, United Nations debates and sponsored many forums on the topic.

Locally we have been involved with fighting racism in our community with a special emphasis on police abuse and racist violence. We have representatives who are also prepared to respond to these issues.



Dear Friend:

The New Jersey Anti-Apartheid Mobilization Coalition was founded in September 1985 to specifically help work towards the elimination of the system of racial segregation in South Africa which is known as "apartheid." NJAAMC also works on other human rights issues as well, such as hunger and homelessness in the United States, global racism, U. S. intervention and human rights abuses in Central America, and so on.

The coalition also supports the major liberation organizations in South Africa, such as the South African Council of Churches, the African National Congress, the United Democratic Front, the Congress of South African Trade Unions, the Black Sash (women's organization), and the End Conscription Campaign. NJAAMC also supports the struggle for Namibian independence waged by the South West African Peoples Organization.

Since its founding, NJAAMC has organized demonstrations against apartheid, raised money to help provide humanitarian relief to South Africans, donated monies to New Jersey food banks and shelters for the homeless, given presentations on apartheid in schools and at the meetings of other organizations, helped organize lobbying campaigns for passage of divestment and sanctions legislation, and serves as a resource on apartheid in New Jersey. NJAAMC is part of the newly-formed Northeast Southern Africa Solidarity Network, and is on the steering committee of this body. NJAAMC is presently coordinating increased New Jersey participation in the "Shell Boycott Campaign," is helping mobilize for the "Soweto Days" event that will take place in Washington, DC by sponsoring a bus for the "March for the Children" on June 17, and has established an ongoing corporate campaign against the Johnson & Johnson Company because of its heavy investments in South Africa.

Membership in NJAAMC is open to anyone who subscribes to fighting against apartheid and human rights abuses. Individual membership is \$15 annually. A reduced membership fee is available. If anyone is totally unable to pay a fee, then the fee will be waived. The fee for membership organizations is: fewer than 100 members, \$50; 100-499 members, \$100; 500-999 members, \$150; 1,000-4,999 members, \$200; 5,000-9,999 members, \$400; 10,000-19,000 members, \$600; 20,000-49,999 members, \$800; 50,000+ members, \$1,000. For coalition organizations, the fee is: fewer than 50 groups, \$100; 50-99 groups, \$200; 100+ groups, \$300.

The coalition meets monthly at the Rutgers Labor Education Center, New Brunswick, usually on the fourth Monday of the month, at 7:30 p.m. NJAAMC officers are: Valorie Caffe, president; Maryellen Kluxen, vice president; Margie Blau, secretary; and Eleanor LaPointe, treasurer.

Enclosing letter forwarded to me by Mae Ngai who also sent a nice note about sorry missed meeting and explained conflicts. Busy w/ mayoral race , wants to be in touch. Had a check for \$1800 sent to SWAPO. Mary Benns has a connection whose ent a \$500 anonymous contribution(they needed a receipt for tax purposes) and then a \$50 contibution from another person in their group, so that added a nice bunch to the total. Interesting, though, we seem to be having a difficult time getting across the idea of a dollar from lots and lots of people adds up. Think about that one.

About the convening group: I have not heard a peep from Valerie. Which is fine. #### DIRECTIONS

By car: Tent City is at 130 Dartmouth Street near the intersection with Columbus Ave. Tent City is next to Niemann Marcus in the Copley Plaza shopping complex. There is pay parking across the street. (Note: if you park on the street, be aware that police ticket and sometimes tow, so follow parking signs carefully.) From the West, take the Mass. Pike (I-90); take exit 22, then follow signs for Copley Plaza. Turn right on Dartmouth and you're there. From the North or South: take Route 3, exit at Chinatown, go west on Kneeland, which turns into Stuart St.; head toward the Prudential Center, which is pretty tall. Pass Arlington, Berkeley, and Clarendon Streets, then turn left on Dartmouth, and you're there. (Total distance from Rt. 3 to Dartmouth is about one mile. Note: Mass. Pike does not have an exit at Copley for people heading west, so don't get on it.)


By subway: Back Bay stop on Orange line or Copley stop on Green line. It costs 75 cents.

DIRECTIONS:

TRAIN(AMTRAK): Ask if train stops at Suburban Station(16th and JFK Boulevard). If so, get off and walk a couple octs to 1501 Cherry St. Most likely, train will NOT stop at Suburban, but will stop at the Main Station, Penn Station(30th and Market). Get off and go out to Market Street. Take EASTBOUND TRAIN #31. Get off at 15th St., wall two blocks north to Cherry.

Directions are given for coming through the city and for coming by the outskirts of city. Choose one. There is construction going on in Phil but most likely no work being done on Saturday Morning. If you come via city streets allow for a little extra time.

BY CAR FROM SOUTH. 95NORTH, get off at first Philadelphia Exit (says to the Airport). Stay on RIGHT as leave exit, follow down and around and stay toward LEFT. Continue until Island Ave. This is past the airport and past the Sheridan Hotel (big white S in circle can be seen from road on Right). LEFT on Island Ave., go couple blocks to first major intersection (shopping malls to left and in front). RIGHT onto Lindbergh Blvd. Follow it all the way down, it becomes 49th St., then 8-10 blocks later, make RIGHT onto Market St, stay on Market to 16th St. Left onto 16th St., go 3 blocks to Race St., RIGHT onto Race, RIGHT onto 15th. 1501 Cherry right there. FROM SOUTH THROUGH CITY- 95 NORTH, exit Central Philadelphia, Historic Area, Penns Landing. You will be on Water St. At dead end, turn RIGHT onto Spruce St., Take first LEFT onto Delaware Ave. Stay to RIGHT. Follow signs for Historic Area, Center City. At top of ramp, turn LEFT onto Market St. At City Hall. go one quarter way around and turn RIGHT on Broad St.(It would be 14th St if it were numbered). LEFT on Cherry to 1501 Cherry.

BY CAR FROM NORTH: 95 to NJ Turnpike. Takenexit 3 or 4. Follow signs for Camden/Philadelphia/Ben Franklin Bridge. Go over Ben Franklin Bridge. It becomes Vine St. Go down to 7th St., make RIGHT onto 7th St., LEFT onto CallowHill, LEFT on 15th. Go 3 blocks over to Cherry St. 150l Cherry.

FROM NORTH THROUGH CITY- 95 South, get off at Vine St, Center City exit. Turn RIGHT on CallowHill St. at bottom of ramp. Go over to Broad St. (would be 14th St. if numbered), LEFT on Broad St. RIGHT on Cherry St.

Dear Friend.

Exciting developments are taking place in the anti-apartheid movement in our country. September of 1988 saw the coming together of 300 activists from the northeast to a New Haven conference to discuss building a southern Africa solidarity network of trade unions, church groups, community organizations, anti-apartheid groups, peace activists and students. In March 1989, a follow-up meeting was held in New York City to plan strategies in three areas of concentration and to lay the groundwork for continuing the network.

There is unanimous agreement that a network to provide a forum, a sharing of experiences and ideas is greatly needed. While the anti-apartheid work in our country has seen ups and downs, epps and flows, we need to maintain a consistent level of activity in order to advance the struggle, build a real movement, and raise our work to a new level. A network can make the difference. It can provide further impetus, inspiration, and direction for all those who want to see a free and democratic southern Africa.

Now we are delighted to announce the formation of the Northeast Southern Africa Solidarity Network, representing the 12 states along the northeast corridor from Maine to Washington, D.C. An Interim Coordinating Committee, representing various constituencies, met in April in Washington, D.C., and will meet again on June 24 in Philadelphia. The tasks of the Interim Committee are to provide leadership, strengthen the work in local areas, map out ways in which we can build and strengthen the Network.

The three Network campaigns are:

- Support for the Dellums Comprehensive Sanctions Bill (S.507) at all levels of government;
- the Shell Boycott;
- Dollars for Democracy in Namibia Campaign

Enclosed are sample copies of a pledge of support for comprehensive sanctions against South Africa and a Shell Free Zone declaration. These were developed by the Network for circulation in local areas. Please feel free to adapt them for use in your locale. National organizations with further information on these campaigns are listed at the end of this letter.

Urgent ! SWAPO needs our help NOW!

The Dollars for Democracy in Namibia Campaign is a material aid drive in support of SWAPO during this crucial electoral period. It has a two-fold purpose: education and material aid. For the first time in 100 years, elections will take place in Namibla on November 1. and South Africa has, and will continue to sabotage the elections by intimidations. discriminatory laws, and other maneuvers.

Summer is an ideal time to reach thousands of people.

We urge you to bring this campaign to your church, trade union, peace group, or community meeting and encourage them to raise money for SWAPO in its struggle for free and fair elections in Namibia. Whether it is

- a special church collection, a walkathon, bikeathon

- a collection on the street, in the park, at outdoor concerts

- house parties, buttons or T-shirts

- tied in to support for your local soup kitchen or homeless shelter

Funds collected will be turned over to SWAPO to be used for a myriad of needs related to the elections: resettlement of almost 100,000 refugees, many of whom are disabled and need special medical care and facilities; voter registration training, transportation to remote parts of Namibia for electoral work, printing of voter education materials, medical supplies, etc. A Dollars for Democracy Campaign brochure highlighting some important nistorical facts about Namibia and a map showing it's location in southern Africa is enclosed. Our experience so far has been that an enormous amount of education on this issue is needed. Brochures can be ordered from the Network at cost, please see below.

Timing is crucial. When SWAPO wins, we ALL win!

Please put the Network on your local mailing list and keep us informed about what is going on in your area. Many have expressed the need for a newsletter on anti-apartheid activities. We don't have the resources for this right now, but hopefully we will have in the near future. We are also working on a Network brochure with information on who we are, why we are, what we support, and how to join.

We are looking for a part-time staff person to carry on the daily responsibilities of the Network. Interested parties are encouraged to send a resume to Vera Michelson, 13 Pennsylvania Ave. Albany, NY 12206 by June 30. In the meantime, Pam Saffer of the New Haven Free South Africa Coalition is acting as temporary staff person. Feel free to call or write her at Network address for any questions you may have.

Our next Coordinating Committee meeting will be held in Philadelphia on June 24. If a member of your organization can attend, please call or write for details.

The Network has begun its work with a few substantial contributions from supportive organizations. We plan to continue with financial support from memberships of local organizations, contributions from individual patrons, and grant monies. Our existence, and how much we can accomplish, depends on your support- monthly, quarterly, or outright.

We recognize that those who receive this mailing are busy, active people, but we urge you. In recognition of the importance of the formation of the Network, and of the critical electoral period in Namibia, to:

- Join the Network

- participate in the Dollars for Democracy Campaign.

PLEDGE OF SUPPORT FOR COMPREHENSIVE U.S. SANCTIONS AGAINST SOUTH AFRICA

Under cover of stringent censorship, South Africa's white minority regime has intensified its repression of all those calling for majority rule and the dismantling of apartheld. Mass organizations such as the United Democratic Front (UDF) and the Congress of South African Trade Unions (COSATU) have been barred from political activity, church offices have been bombed, student and community leaders assassinated, and thousands more jailed or banned.

At this time of profound crisis, we join Archbishop Desmond Tutu. Reverend Allan Boesak, Nelson Mandela and all other leaders of the anti-apartheid movement inside South Africa who have called on our country to impose comprehensive sanctions against South Africa.

In 1986 the U.S. Congress overrode President Reagan's veto and passed partial sanctions against South Afica. However, these measures did not end millions in U.S. corporate investment that sustains white minority rule with critical computor technology and scarce resources such as oil. At the same time our trade with South Africa continues to top one billion dollars every year, earning the white minority regime vital foreign exchange and fueling apartheid's war machine.

It is thus imperative that we heed the call of South Africa's Black leaders and cut off this continued U.S. support for white minority rule. Already, partial international sanctions and South African defeats in Angola have forced Pretoria to agree to Namibian independence. Further measures can only hasten the end of the racist apartheid system.

Most fundamentally, by weakening the apartheld regime we help strengthen and encourage the millions of Black South Africans struggling for their national liberation.

We, the undersigned, therefore pledge our support for passage by the Unted States Congress of comprehensive sanctions against South Africa and urge President Bush to immediately sign such measures into law.

#### A SHELL-FREE ZONE DECLARATION

The government of South Africa, in defense of the policies of apartheid, has maintained a state of emergency since July 20, 1985, thereby increasing military and police actions in the Black townships, has restricted the operation of democratic organizations working to end apartheid, and has denied the majority of South Africans their basic numan rights.

Archbishop Desmond Tutu, Reverend Allan Boesak, the African National Congress, the South African Council of Churches, the Congress of South African Trade Unions, and the National Union of Mineworkers of South Africa have called upon U.S. organizations working for justice and democracy in South Africa to join in the international campaign to end all support for the government of South Africa and its policies of apartheid.

Royal Dutch/Shell, through its subsidiary, Shell South Africa, provides the South African police and military with fuel vital to their efforts to enforce apartheid.

The government of South Africa defines oil as a "munition of war", and any oil company operating in South Africa is governed by a law which allows the South African government to operate the company's facilities in time of national emergency.

Major U.S.religious, civil rights, labor, and anti-apartheid organizations have responded to the call from leading South Africans to join the campaign to end apartheid and suspend business with Royal Dutch/Shell, until Royal Dutch/Shell, in consultation with its workers and unions, disinvests from and severs all ties with South Africa.
