Change name from Public Policy to Public Policy and Management

This change is to align the name of the degree with the content of the curriculum. Coursework focuses heavily on topics related to management such as managerial decision making, organizational design and structure, organizational politics, and organizational behavior. The curriculum balances attention to public policy and management.

The request that the degree name include the term "Management" fits the intellectual evolution of public sector studies. Over the last twenty years the term "public management" largely has supplanted the term "public administration" in the establishment of new programs and professional associations, largely to convey that the field now draws on a wider range of disciplines touching on managerial processes. In the past ten years two major new professional associations have been established—the Public Management Research Association and the International Public Management Network, both including the word Management. Thus, a degree designation of "Public Policy and Management" would correspond to this intellectual evolution.
