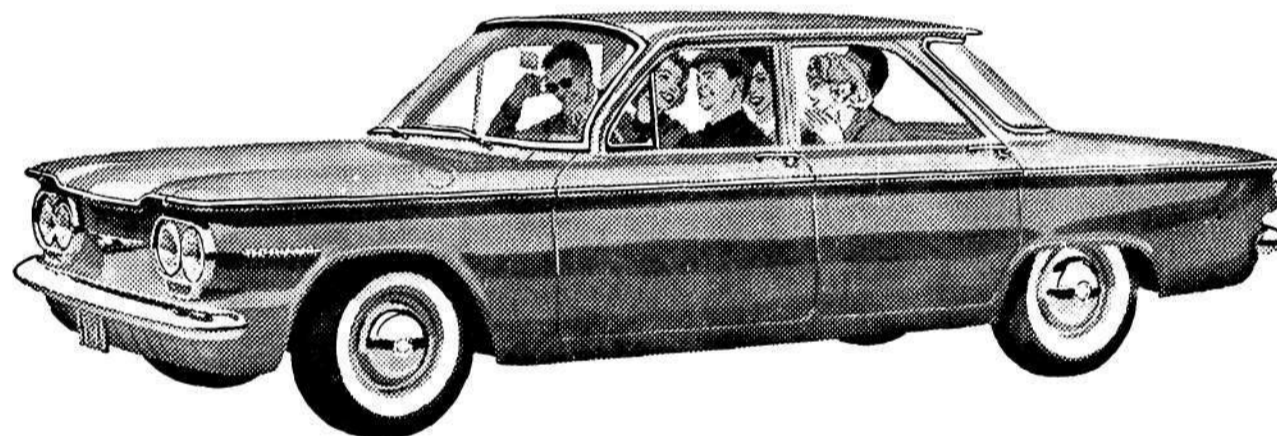

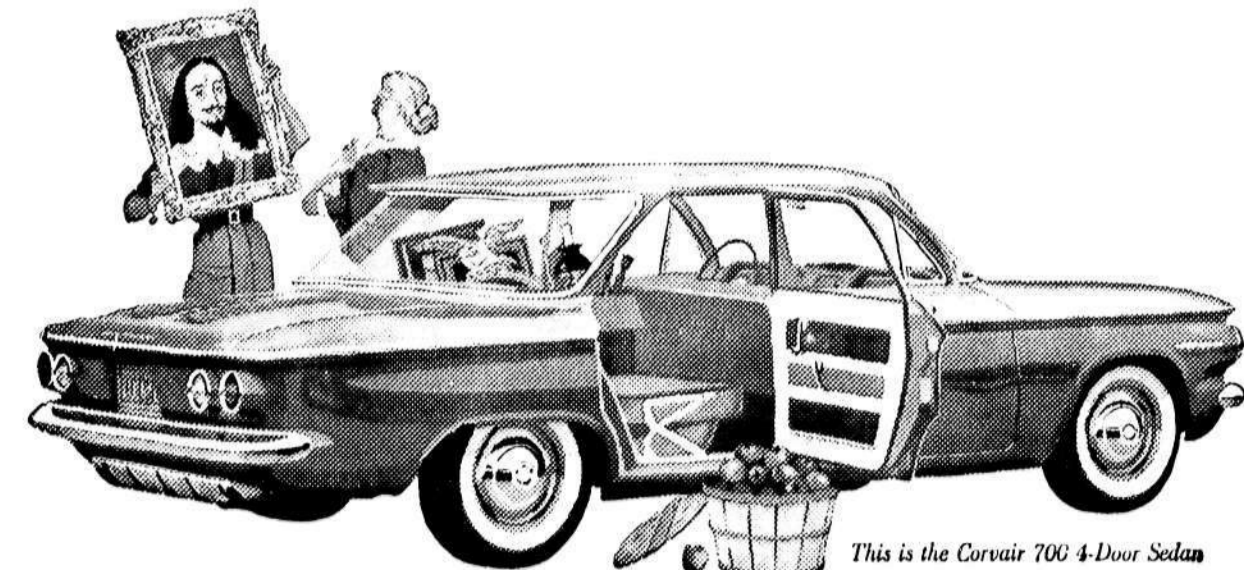

Senate:

Senate OK's News Budget; Rivalry Cost Is Questioned

The State College News will have a surplus of approximately one thousand dollars for their 1959-1960 budget. News Board requested that \$725 of this surplus be incorporated into a new line for the purchase of a new typewriter and addressograph. This line addition was approved by Senate.

The 1960-1961 budget for Student Senate was approved. The estimate of the cost of Rivalry was questioned and the Vice-President was asked for a breakdown of Rivalry expenses. After leafing through an important looking folder, she was unable to come up with anything, but things being as they are, the budget was passed without further questions. Senators should at least wait until their questions are answered before voting.

To date only six organizations have submitted their budgets. The dead-

line was March 15. If these organizations and their Treasurers cooperated, Student Government would have the chance to at least be efficient. The brunt of the criticism falls on Senate, but without the cooperation of all the organizations, Senate cannot possibly do a good job.

In order to have a good working Senate, representing all the students at State College, the Junior Class is going to have to get out and vote. At least one hundred Juniors must vote in order to even validate the election. Let's get together Juniors and elect at least interested people. Elections which began yesterday will continue through today.

Juniors Feature Dean Lanford Announces College Doctoral Program

Nominations for the Junior Prom Court opened yesterday and will continue until 4 p.m. this afternoon. Any girl who is nominated and wishes to decline may do so Monday. Primary election for members of the court will be held Tuesday with only Juniors voting. Final elections for the Queen will be Friday.

Bids for the Junior Prom weekend are now on sale for the general student body at a price of \$4 per couple. This will include the Prom and the Masquerade Party. Admission to the jazz concert will be free. Anyone wishing to attend the Masquerade Party only may purchase a ticket for \$1. However, anyone wishing to attend the Prom only must still pay \$4.

The Masquerade Party will be held at the Polish Center next Friday from 8-12 p.m. with music by the Crusaders. Costumes may be anything from a Roman toga to Bermudas.

Richard Maltby and his famed orchestra will play at the Crimison Cotillion Saturday, March 26, at the Sheraton-Ten Evex from 10 p.m. to 2 a.m. The jazz concert Sunday will be at Brubacher from 3-5 p.m. and will feature music by the St. James Society.

State Hosts STA Science Conference

The Twelfth Annual Eastern New York Science Congress will be held Saturday, March 26, from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in Husted and Richardson Halls. This event is sponsored by the Science Teachers Association of New York State, Eastern Section. All State students are invited to attend.

The Twelfth Annual Eastern New York Science Congress is part of a state-wide program whereby Junior and senior high school students compete for various prizes and the chance to qualify for the State Finals. As a State Finalist, the student has the opportunity to win a scholarship as a reward for outstanding research in the field of science.

Students participating in the program must prepare a project dealing with some phase of biology, chemistry, or physics. Students must carry out the research for their projects entirely on their own. The culmination of their efforts comes when they set up a demonstration of their project in the Science Congress. These are judged according to technical skill, thoroughness, originality, and presentation.

Dean Oscar E. Lanford, Dean of the College, has announced informally that the Regents of New York State have authorized a Doctoral program for the New York State College of Education at Albany. This program will enable graduate students to obtain a degree of Doctor of Education. It is anticipated that the program will commence in September of 1960.

Fields of Availability
The Ed.D degree will be available in the field of School Administration. Primarily, this program is for the preparation of principals, vice-principals, and other chief school officers. However, this is only one phase of the program. It is expected that other programs for the preparation of school guidance officers, school psychologists, and other positions of education specialization will be added as the program gets underway. Similarly, it is also expected that a Doctoral program for the training of college teachers, mainly in the Social Sciences and the Humanities, will be added.

Duration of Study
This program will enable a student to receive a Doctorate degree in the field of Education in a minimum of three years beyond a Bachelor's degree. If the student has ample credit toward his Master's degree, and if his Master's degree is relative to the field of his Doctorate degree then it is expected that the student could obtain his Doctorate degree in three years.

Dean Comments
However, it was stressed by Dean Lanford that there is no assurance of a student completing this program in three years because the emphasis will be placed upon the competence that a student acquires rather than the total semester hours of credit that he accumulates. The main purpose of this plan is to develop competence and ability in the student in certain specified areas of education. Dean Lanford said this about the program: "This program is based upon the philosophy that Education is rooted in the society that supports it. The educational leader bears direct responsibility for advancing public welfare. It is based on the philosophy that programs in administration should be built upon a thorough knowledge of the disciplines of the Social Sciences and the Humanities."

Pod Seasonal Statistics

Statistics released by basketball publicity director George Hurlburt this week show that junior Don Cohen eclipsed five of Gary Holway's records in leading his team to a 16-10 record, earning him a co-captain roll, along with Sherwin Bowen, for 1960-61.

The new marks include: Total points in one season—523; Most field goals in one season—188; Most free throws in one season—147; Most rebounds in one season—419; and Most rebounds in one game—26.

The former Albany High star also became the second high scorer in State's history as he combined seasons of 99, 315 and 523 to bring his three year total to 957. Holway holds the all time record of 1851 for four seasons.

The sport is entering its second season of varsity competition this spring.

Court magnificents such as Dave Baum, Lou Wolner, Bob Austin, Steve Myslinski, Carl Penrod, and manager Pete Wheaton, who managed to produce some items from thin air, will spearhead the 1960 edition of the team. The Pods lost three from last season, including their number one and two men, Bob Kampf and Ed Veselicki.

John Robinson was also lost to the Pods after folding down the fifth spot in 1959.

Austin saw action mainly as a doubles player. Myslinski saw some varsity action, while Wolner was fourth man and Penrod played in the third position.

Baum, who was in sixth position in his freshman season last spring, is a tough competitor on the court with his steady game and should play a major role in his second year of competition.

Penrod and Wolner should move up to the top two brackets.

Wolner, who reportedly will turn up in good shape Monday, was a starter for Joe Garcia's sophomore in the fall and will be seeing the number one spot vacated by Kampf.

Points Determine Winner
Tennis is played on a point basis, with the team gaining the five of nine possible points a match. Each match is worth one point, with a meet consisting of nine matches, six singles and three doubles.

Albany State's wrestlers wrapped up their season this week by electing Dave Pause and Dick O'Connor co-captains for next year. They will lead an experienced team that should make next year a banner year for wrestling at State.

Injuries Hurt

This team was plagued all year by an injury jinx, with only six varsity wrestlers able to finish the season. These six, Lou Biolsi, Jay Katzel, Pause, O'Connor, Paul Turse, and Tom Ellis, often wrestled against great odds but they were never outscraped. Four times this season they outwrestled the opposition but lost the meet because of forfeits. Despite these heartbreaking losses, their spirit never wavered and they earned the respect of everyone. From their coach Joe Garcia, to their reporter and all the fans who followed the team.

Pause Honored Twice

As the season ended, Pause was honored twice by his teammates—once as most valuable wrestler and once as co-captain.

He was elected most valuable wrestler on the basis of his leadership, inspiration, and performance, but when asked for a statement on the recognition, Pause said, "It's an honor."

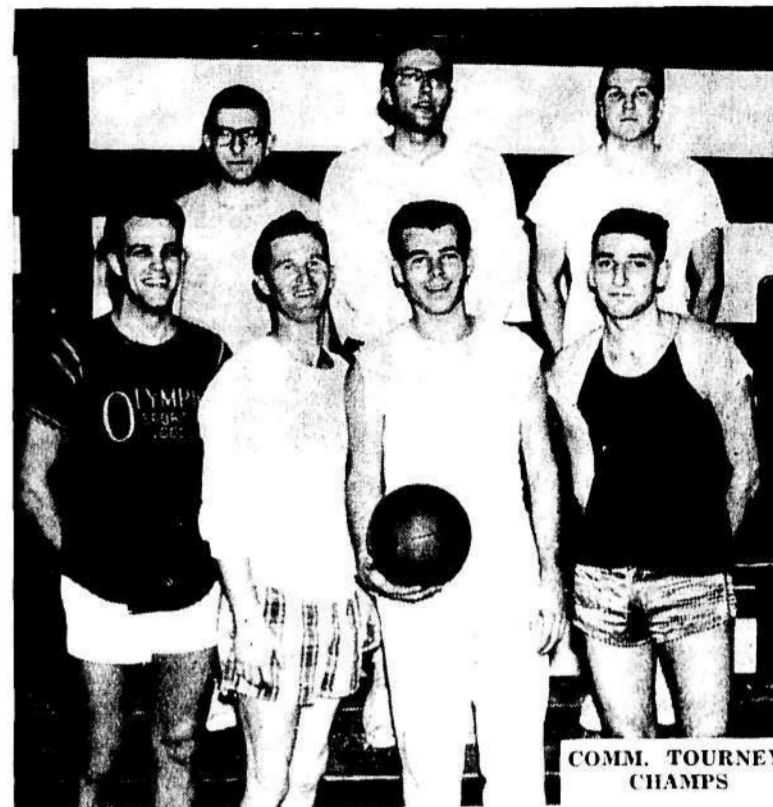

Perhaps character is giving the followers of Me-tooism the benefit of the doubt as their only character is that of an entire group and they are merely parrots of the group. Unless these pathetic characters have a chance to echo me-too, they are living non-entities.

You can find them congregating in doorways, in the halls, or around the tables in the Union, where they lap up verbal crumbs of a few leaders. Later, they are found in other groups utilizing the ideals, witticisms and cliches of their previous gatherings.

As an applicant for admission to this school, I was led to believe that leadership was one of the main criteria for admittance. I now have an idea that I was deceived or the Administration has changed its policy. A third possibility is that the neophyte scholars are awed by the largeness of the group or by the vast knowledge of the group clowns. "It's a great big puddle..." Perhaps some of the "frogs" retain this point of view throughout their college career and carry this doctrine into the field. Your opinion is precious and you have a right to express your ideas. As an "authority," this right almost becomes an obligation, for you and your students.

Student Federation Opposes Loyalty Oath

The National Young Democratic Student Federation today called for the passage of legislation which would repeal the use of the disclaimer affidavit and the loyalty oath of the National Defense Education Act. The group's nine member National Executive Committee meeting in Washington urged in a strong resolution the organizing of letter-writing campaigns on American campuses to members of Congress informing them of the wide student protest of section 1001 (f) of the NDEA. The group in a resolution stated that the Act "represents an unwarranted invasion, on the part of the United States Government, into the traditionally private area of personal belief." The Student Young Democrats further charged that "the security, and may even harm it by preventing otherwise well-meaning students from accepting funds under the Act."

The Executive Committee, speaking for more than 500 college chapters of the Young Democrats, terminated the provisions presently included in the NDEA as "insulting the American academic community."

The Democratic Party has earlier stated its objection to the disclaimer affidavit and loyalty oath through statements issued by the Democratic Advisory Committee and resolutions passed by the national convention of the young Democratic Clubs of America.
