Applications already are being received at State University College at Albany for the college's Institute in English for Secondary-School Teachers set for next summer.

State University College is one of twenty throughout the country cooperating in the special program, sponsored by the Commission on English of the College Entrance Examination Board and designed to improve the teaching of English in grades nine through twelve to students preparing for college.

Tuition and fees will be paid to the college by the Commission on English which also will assign to each participant a grant of \$350. Estimated expenses for participants will be about \$225.

At the summer session, July 2-Aug. 10, there will be three graduate courses in English -- composition, language, and literature -- scheduled for the morning. At afternoon workshops participants will develop methods and materials which may be applied in their own high-school classes.

Each course carries two semester hours of graduate credit. On the Institute's staff will be David W. Martin, supervisor of English at Milne High School, serving as coordinator; Dr. Gretchen Paulus, Associate Professor of English, State University College at Albany; William C. Kraus, Assistant Professor of Education and Supervisor in the Milne School, State University College; and Dr. Carl Niemeyer, Professor of English and Chairman, Department of Humanities, Union College.
