Description: We are revising the program requirements to be in compliance with SUNY regulations requiring 24+ credits at the 300+ level and a course in inequalities that may be taken at the lower level (SUNY transfer pathway). We have upgraded two of our required courses (Social Research Methods, Sociological Theory) to the 300-level. We have added a requirement for a course in inequalities. There are four possible options for this course (2 at the 200-level and 2 at the 300 level). Any student will be able to complete this course at the lower level and the two lower level options will be listed on the SUNY transfer pathway for UAlbany. But, some of our current UAlbany students may prefer a 300-level option so we have left this flexible. Finally, we have specified that 24+ credits must be at the 300+ level.

Given the current situation with COVID-19, we are submitting the Distance Education Form so that our students could complete the degree online if we need to continue extensive online offerings for health reasons. We traditionally have offered some sections of some of our classes online. We would like the flexibility to adjust our format depending on the pandemic situation and future unexpected scenarios.
