STUDENTS WILL TRY FOR VARSITY DEBATE TEAMS NEXT FRIDAY

Try-outs for the men and women's varsity debate teams will be conducted next Friday at 4 o'clock in Room 250. Louis M. Klein, '29, president of the debate council, announced today.

"Contestants may speak for five minutes on either the affirmative or negative sides of the subject: Received: That the United States should cooperate with Canada in improving the St. Lawrence river for navigation and power purposes," Klein said. Any member of the student association may compete.

Judges of the try-outs will be Clarence A. Hildy, assistant professor of history; Ray Cecil Carter, head of the English department of the Albany High school; and Stanley E. Heason, head of the history department of the same school.

The men's team will meet the University of Pittsburgh at Chancellor's Hall February 6, according to Klein. "It will also be matched with the debate squad of Union college in negotiations with that institution are satisfactory completed," he said.

The debate council is arranging debates for the women's team with St. Lawrence University of Canton, and with the College of Saint Rose, Albany.

HUNDREDS ACCLAIM QUEEN MILDRED II

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lansley See Daughter Receive Campus Honor

ROYALTY SEES STUNTS

Nominees Kept In Seclusion To Conceal Identity Of Queen

When Mildred Mae Lansley, '29, was crowned as Mildred II, State College's seventh of a line of popular girls was honored by applause from the 800 students and guests who witnessed the coronation ceremony.

Miss Lansley, who was popularly believed to be the queen, even before her appearance in the royal party, is one of the leading senior girls. She is president of the Young Women's Christian association, a member of Myskania, and was formerly editor in chief of the freshman handbook. She is a member of Delta Omega sorority.

She was crowned by Henry C. Hastings, chairman of the English department. Queen Mildred II was attended by two girls from each class and by two train bearers. The train bearers were Anne and Jane Kennedy, daughters of Professor William G. Kennedy, of the chemistry department.

The senior attendants were Joyce House and Juanita McGarty; the juniors, Gladys Bates and Jeanette Harrison; the sophomores, Helen Henderson and Clara Belle Shutt; the freshmen, Marjorie Lockwood and Marguerite Northrop. The sophomore, junior and senior attendants were nominated by the class presidents, and the freshmen attendants were appointed by the two Myskania guardians of the freshman class.

Audience Rises To Greet Queen

The audience rose as the queen entered the auditorium, and remained standing until she was crowned on the platform. After the coronation, Queen Mildred II and her court proceeded to seats reserved for the party in the first two rows of seats.

The six queens who preceded Miss Lansley as wearers of the crown were: Ethel Lusk, '23; Edna Shaler, '24; Mildred Hammerley, '25; Muriel L. Wenzel, '26; Eudora Lampaun, '27; and Ruth L. Lane, '28.

This is the first year to see the repetition of the queen's first name in the records of the crown holders. Many of the other four nominees had elected, the new member of the dynasty would not have been entered as "II," but as the first of that name.

To prevent students from ascertaining the identity of the queen before the coronation march began, the committee in charge kept in seclusion the other nominees for the honor who were at the ceremony.

Before her appearance to the public, Queen Mildred II posed in the green room for newspaper photographs, including the one reproduced in today's News.

Much interest was added to the coronation by the presence of Frank P. Lansley and Mrs. Lansley, mother of the queen.

DROP CROSS COUNTRY, CANCELLING 4 MEETS

Cross-country has been dropped from the State College sport calendar for the present year because of the failure of the men of the college to support the sport. The schedule which included a series of four meets has been cancelled by George Taylor, '30, manager.

The men's athletic council decided last week that inasmuch as there were no more than ten men interested enough in the sport to get out and run, cross-country would be dropped for the present year at least. If the men want a team next year the athletic council will be willing to sponsor a team then, members said.

Cross-country was revived in State College last year after a few years' lapse under the leadership of John Kueschle, '28, and Roy V. Sullivan, '29 who were the most dependable runners to wear the Purple and Gold regalia last year. Sullivan returned to college this year but found it impossible to camp into condition because of ill health.

SMITH IS SWAMPED IN VOTING, 523-210

Roosevelt Loses To Ottinger, 462-266 In Straw Vote Conducted By News

733 STUDENTS VOTE

Roosevelt Receives More Ballots Than Governor Smith, Tally Shows

With more than twice the number of votes polled by his opponent, Herbert Hoover, Republican, leads the STATE COLLEGE NEWS' straw vote in the presidential contest.

Hoover scored 523 votes and Governor Alfred E. Smith, the Democratic nominee, polled 210 votes. A total of 733 ballots were cast in the straw vote conducted last week in the two assemblies by the STATE COLLEGE NEWS.

In the race for governor, Albert Ottinger, Republican, leads his Democratic rival, Franklin D. Roosevelt, by nearly 200 votes. Ottinger scored 462 and Roosevelt scored 266.

Roosevelt polled more votes for governor than Governor Smith for president. Several "split ballots" were noted, in which the voters favored the presidential nominee of one party and the gubernatorial nominee of the other party.

A small number of ballots were discarded, for illegibility. Each of the four nominees polled the greatest number of votes of any one class in the sophomore vote.

The vote conducted Friday by the NEWS is the first straw vote to be conducted on a large scale here. Two years ago, the now defunct Political Science club conducted a gubernatorial straw vote, in which Ogden Mills, Republican, defeated Smith for governor, by the total of 127 to 71. In the actual election, however, Smith was elected governor.
