TAFT INSTITUTE SEMINAR IN JULY AT UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY

The School of Education and the Graduate School of Public Affairs of The University at Albany will conduct a graduate seminar entitled, "Bi-centennial 1976-What has Survived from Our Founders' Dreams?" daily from July 6 to July 16 from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The program will include lectures and discussions on a range of topics including pressure groups, reform and grass roots politics, the mass media and politics, elections 1976, and the United States in the year 2000.

Participation will be limited to 30 elementary and secondary school teachers of social studies, civics, or government classes. For those accepted, scholarship grants awarded by the Robert A. Taft Institute will cover full tuition charges for three graduate credits in History of Education (Ed. His. 617) and required textbooks. A \$40 registration fee will be charged upon acceptance.

WILBUR TO GIVE BICENTENNIAL LECTURE APR. 8 AT UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY

W. Allan Wilbur, visiting assistant professor in the department of history, The University at Albany, will give the fourth lecture in the Alumni Bicentennial Series at the university on Thursday, Apr. 8, at 8 p.m. in the Recital Hall of the university's Performing Arts Center. His subject will be "The Significance of the American Revolution to Black Americans."

Long before the ban on Blacks in the United States Army, the Black man served, often with distinction, in the American Revolutionary Armies. Between 8,000 and 10,000 served in varying capacities. Their involvements represented significant accomplishments by the Black men of yesteryear.

Dr. Wilbur has received Ford Foundation and Fulbright awards and has edited books and articles on early national politics and law. He recently published essays on Congressional investigating committees in the post-Civil War era. Presently he is completing study of the legal and political history of Fries' Rebellion in eastern Pennsylvania in 1799-1800.

The public is invited to the lectures for which there is no charge.

O'LEARY NAMED CHAIRMAN OF NATIONAL COUNCIL

Vincent O'Leary, professor at the School of Criminal Justice, The University at Albany, and a leading authority on the nation's parole system, has been elected chairman of the research council of the National Council on Crime and Delinquency. The group serves in an advisory capacity to the national council in developing major policy statements and priorities.

Currently Professor O'Leary also is serving a three-year term on the Advisory Board of the National Institute of Corrections. Prior to joining the School of Criminal Justice at Albany, in 1968, he has served as head of the parole systems of the states of Texas and Washington and as an advisor and staff member to several Presidential commissions in the area of crime.

In his new post Professor O'Leary succeeds Elmer K. Nelson, School of Public Administration, University of Southern California.

45 VISITING FULBRIGHT-HAYS SCHOLARS TO CONFER AT UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY

The University at Albany, in cooperation with the Council for International Exchange of Scholars, will host the Eastern Regional Conference for Visiting Fulbright-Hays Scholars. The conference will be held from May 13 to June 3 in the new Alumni House.

Approximately 45 visiting scholars from throughout the world, who are being hosted this year at colleges and universities in the Eastern United States, will participate. Among the many countries which will be represented are Finland, United Kingdom, Korea, Poland, Yugoslavia, Turkey, Iran, Portugal, India, Japan, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, China, Rumania, France, Argentina, Netherlands, Denmark, Spain, Lebanon, Norway, Austria, and Israel. The scholars also represent a wide-range of academic fields, including language and literature, bio-sciences, sociology, art, archaeology, chemistry, journalism, engineering, psychology, geography, physics, law, mathematics, economics, political science, music, and business administration.

The theme of the program is "Goals of Higher Education in an Interdependent World." Two major speakers will address different aspects of the parochialism and isolationism, preservation of cultural diversity, and the role of the university in assisting developing countries.

A highlight of the conference will be a tour of the Empire State Mall and a meeting with Lieutenant Governor Mary Anne Krupsack and other members of the New York State Government. The Faculty

Wives Club at the university will provide services to the families of the participating scholars which will include visits to points of interest in the Capital District.

A university spokesman said that hosting the conference provides an opportunity for the institution to contribute to world understanding and to seek ways in which colleges and universities can assist government and other agencies to solve common problems.

ALBANY UNIVERSITY FAMILY COLLEGE SLATED FOR AUGUST

University Family College '76 will offer alumni and friends of The University at Albany an opportunity to experience the diverse dramatic roles played by New Yorkers in the nation's early history. The three-day program scheduled to begin Aug. 2, will be headquartered at the new Alumni House.

Four programs make up University Family College '76. Sung Bok Kim, of the university's Department of History, will present "The American Revolution Came to New York." Dr. Kim, an author and lecturer on American history, will look at the diverse philosophies prevalent among New Yorkers in the mid-Eighteenth Century and at the conditions affecting their attitudes at the beginning of the American Revolution.

"Revolutionary Rhetoric, 1763-1776," will be the topic of Kathleen Kendall's presentation. Dr. Kendall, an associate professor of rhetoric and communication at UA, has authored numerous articles on the rhetoric of Edgar Allen Poe, Frances Wright, and Horace Mann. She will explore the Revolutionary arguments, language, strategies, and tactics as illustrated in pamphlets, broadsides, ballads, resolutions, demonstrations, and boycotts culminating in the Declaration of Independence.

Stefan Bielinski, senior curator of history, New York State Education Department, will examine "New York in the Revolution: A Theater of Military Operations." The two-part presentation will

deal with the importance of New York City and colony in pre-war British planning and opposing American strategy, the American expedition against Canada in 1775, the British invasion of northern and southern New York in 1776, the three-pronged British campaign of 1777, border warfare in central New York in 1777, and the Sullivan-Clinton expedition of 1779. Mr. Bielinski is a specialist in the history of Eighteenth Century New York.

Dean Snow, chairman of the university's department of anthropology, will conduct an "Exploration of Pre-Historic and Revolutionary Battle Sites in New York's Northern Frontier." Dr. Snow, an active archaeologist who supervises digs at Saratoga Battlefield and other sites, will lead tours through the Schuylerville Farmhouse and adjacent archaeological sites, Victory Mills, and the Saratoga Battlefield.

Registration is \$100 per person for double occupancy university housing (\$10 extra for single occupancy), \$55 per person without meals or lodging, and \$50 per child 16 years of younger. Senior citizens with cards will receive a 10 percent discount.

The on-campus fees include a two- or three- bedroom suite with private bath, cafeteria style breakfasts and dinners, and a performance at one of the area cultural centers.

Reservations, with a deposit of one-third the total fee, must be received no later than June 15.

ALBANY UNIVERSITY'S DEAN MYREN RECEIVES NATIONAL HONOR

Richard A. Myren, dean of the School of Criminal Justice at The University at Albany, has been honored by the American Society for Public Administration Section on Criminal Justice Administration in recognition of his "significant national contribution to the advancement and professional development of criminal justice administration."

The distinctive honor is conferred annually to four persons. Dean Myren's citation for the award reads: "To Richard A. Myren, for integration of a broad interdisciplinary curriculum into a pioneering model at the university graduate level, thereby improving the study of criminal justice administration."

Dean Myren, who has served as dean of the Albany school since 1966, will become director of the Center for Administration of Justice at American University in Washington, D.C., on July 1. The educator, who enjoys both a national and international reputation in his field, served two years ago as president of the Association of Criminal Justice Scientists, an association of professors of criminal justice in the United States. In 1973 he was elected to membership in The American Law Institute.

UNIVERSITY FOUNDATION AT ALBANY RECEIVES GRANT FROM TEXACO

A \$5,000 grant has been received by The University Foundation at Albany from Texaco, Inc. It will be used in pollution studies by the Atmospheric Sciences Research Center of The University at Albany.

Volker Mohnen, director of ASRC and associate professor in the university's department of atmospheric sciences, said, "The unrestricted fund will be used to promote our understanding of pollution levels found in rural and remote areas of New York State. Of particular interest is the origin--anthropogenic or natural--of trace gases such as ozone found in areas distant from any major man-made emissions."

Dr. Mohnen added, "This unrestricted fund recognizes ASRC's ability to work with scientists from other state agencies, notably the Department of Environmental Conservation, in a joint effort to improve the quality of the air. The assessment of air quality requires sound scientific measurements and a thorough scientific understanding of the highly complicated chemical and physical interaction that exists within the trace gas cycles. The ASRC is grateful for this unrestricted fund."

EXPERIENCE: Dr. Bean joined the General Electric Research Laboratory in 1951. He has given courses at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute where he has been appointed Adjunct Associate Professor of Physics. Dr. Bean has taken active part in several international conferences and was a consultant to the United States State Department for the 1958 World's Fair in Brussels. He was a Visiting Scientist in a program sponsored by the American Institute of Physics. After joining the General Electric Research Laboratory, Dr. Bean's principal field of research was magnetism. Since about 1960 he has divided his time between programs in the fields of superconductivity and biophysics. He has attended schools in biophysics at Yale University and the University of the Saar (Germany). He was chairman of the Gordon Conference on "The Science and Technology of Bio-Medical Materials" in 1968. In 1970 he was awarded a Coolidge Fellowship by the Research and Development Center. In addition, in the same year he (with R. W. DeBlois) was given an IR 100 Award for the development of a sub-micron particle analyzer.

He is a Fellow of the American Physical Society, a member of the Society of the Sigma Xi, a member of the Biophysical Society and is a member of the Council of that Society. Dr. Bean is a past member of the Board of Editors of the Journal of Applied Physics and is the Associate Editor of the Biophysical Journal. Currently he is a Guest Investigator in neurophysiology at The Rockefeller University in New York. In addition, he is currently a Director of the Bellevue Research Foundation and a Trustee of the Dudley Observatory.

Every age has pictured the nervous system in terms of the engineering of that age--ours is no exception. JOHN SAWHILL TO BE COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER AT THE UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY

John Crittenden Sawhill, president of New York University, will be the speaker at the 132nd commencement exercises at The University at Albany on Sunday, May 30. The program will take place on the football field behind the Physical Education Building, beginning at 1:30 p.m.

Dr. Sawhill, the 12th chief executive of New York University, is the first alumnus ever appointed to the post. The 39-year-old economist and educator assumed leadership of the 144-year-old university, one of the largest private institutions of higher learning in the United States, in September 1975 after achieving nationwide recognition as a management expert in the private sector and in the Federal Government where he served as Federal Energy Administrator.

The NYU president earned a Bachelor of Arts cum laude from Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs in 1958. Later, in 1963, he received a Doctor of Philosophy in economics, finance, and statistics at New York University. From 1960, when he enrolled in NYU's Graduate School of Business Administration, until his resuming a business career in 1963, he held several academic and administrative posts at the university.

They are Dan Lockwood, School of Criminal Justice, a resident of Sprakers, NY, and Carol Trilling, School of Criminal Justice, who lives in Albany.

The Graduate Research Fellowship Program provides financial support for doctoral candidates writing dissertations in crime-related fields. Fellowships are awarded for a one-year period. The grants, depending upon need, include a maximum award of \$10,000.

Mr. Lockwood's dissertation will be "Sexual Aggression Among Prison Inmates". Ms. Trilling's work will be entitled "Re-evaluation of Deterrence."

The only awards to students in a criminal justice criminology program were to students at The University at Albany. Proposals were judged on the basis of the perceived need for the subject matter in the criminal justice body of knowledge, the originality of the research subject, the quality and feasibility of the methodology, and the applicant's qualifications to produce an acceptable dissertation.
