

Bridgeport Next Foe As Peds Pulverize Oswego

The full head of steam gathered by the goal-getters of State was pointed at Bridgeport, Connecticut today by Joe Garcia as the Peds prepare to repeat their blast of last weekend on the sacred grounds of Bridgeport tomorrow afternoon.

Going after their fifth consecutive win at the expense of the Purple Knights as well as the sixth in seven starts, the Purple may be without the services of Bill Bonesteel who was injured in a winning cause Saturday. The half-back was not sure as the paper went to press if his ankle will respond to treatments during the week.

It was Warren Dunham, however, who personally handed the Lakers of Oswego their crying towels when the young upstart in the Junior Class twice gave the Orange goalkeepers in the third period to count for two of the four State tallies.

This bit of meanness was preceded by the ice-breaking goal of Carl Maxson who had given the ball a ride in the first half to tie the score. This was followed by Dunham's two goals and Bobby Backer's tally to rub salt in the wound.

Crowd Treated To Defensive Feats
It was more than once that the peppy crowd was treated to some great defensive play as halfbacks Dammer and Delsignore were aided by Carl Maxson in substituting for goalie Guglielmino who had wandered so far from home that it behooved the backs to make saves in preventing the Orange team from taking the free score offered them.

The good crowd included a contingent of freshmen who were on hand to watch the fast moving pair of ball games as the varsity game

was preceded by a Jayvee affair resulting in a 1-1 tie after 88 minutes of rugged play. The fledgling Peds gave Joe Garcia and the early birds on hand a preview of the '57 squad in their tie with the Albany Athletic Club. Looking good were several freshmen including Bill Hohn whose play impressed Coach Rebel.

The final game of the home season was a fitting climax to the season of 1956 which saw a dismal prospect turned into a shining success as the booters remained undefeated on their home grounds to bring honors to the colors of State. A small crowd at each game was treated to fast and exciting soccer as the squad treated the final and biggest crowd to their best effort before going on the road for their final three games with Bridgeport, Union, and Panzer.

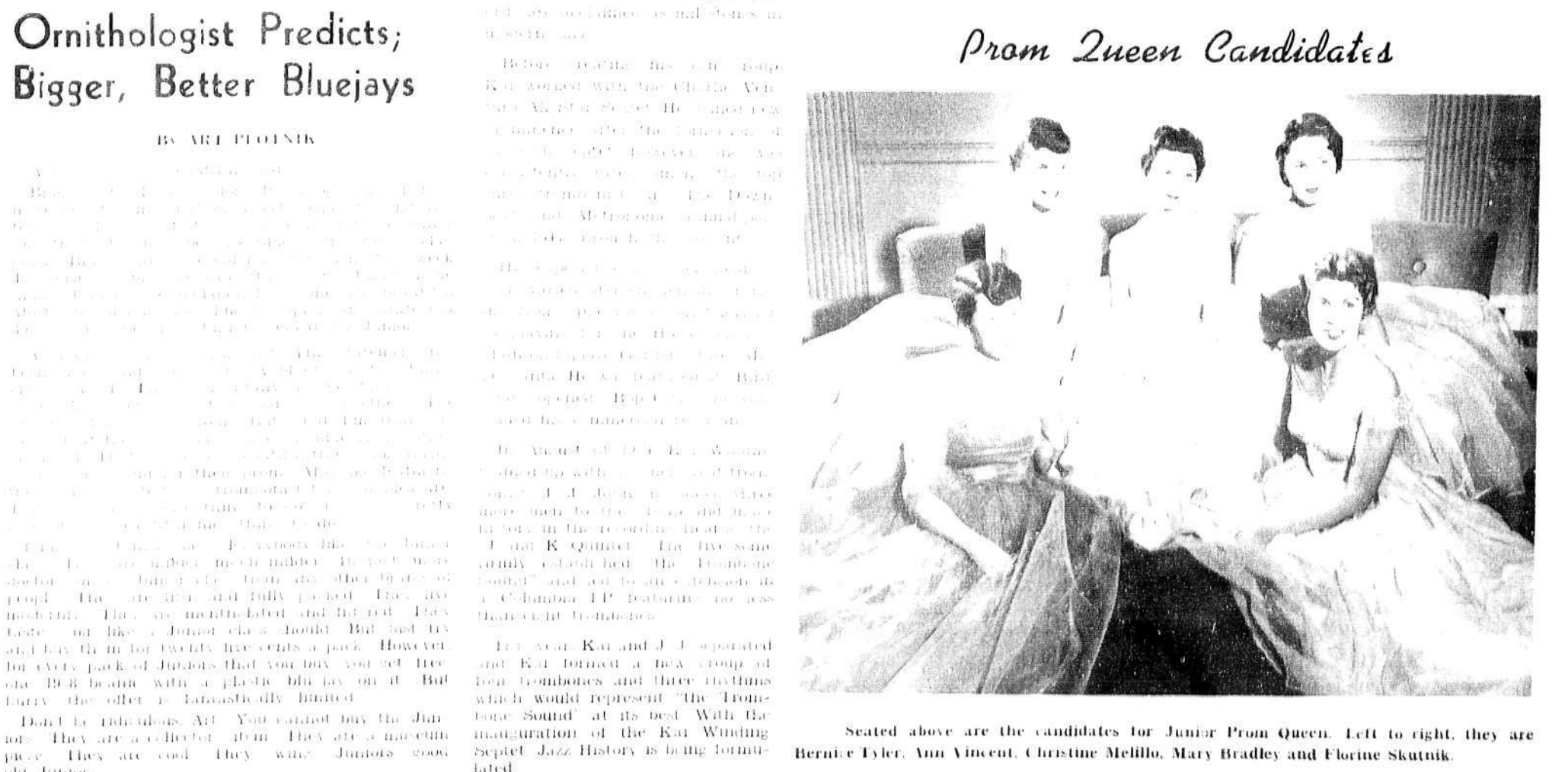

Former Dean Of Women Succumbs

Miss Anna E. Pierce, State College's Dean of Women from 1923 to 1934 and a graduate of this college, died Tuesday night at the age of 90.

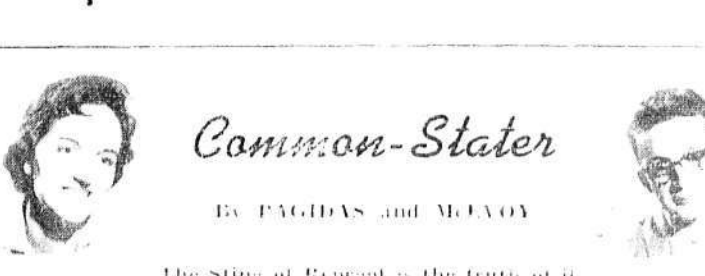
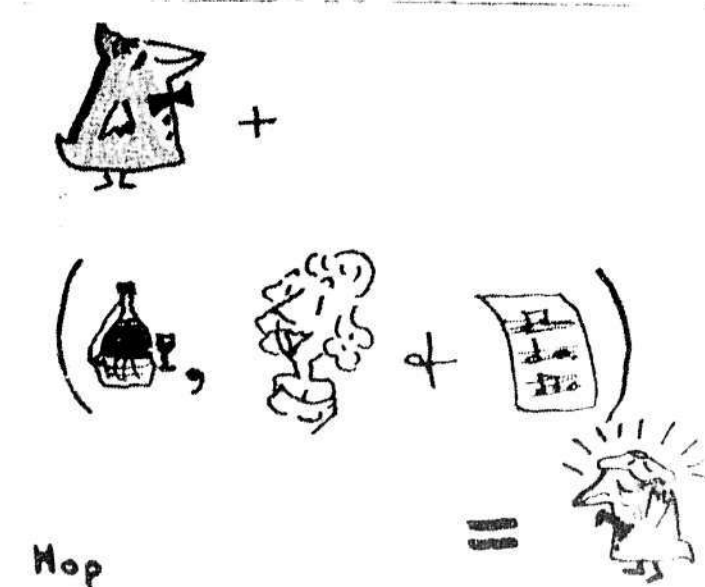
The former Dean's long career in education began when at the age of fifteen she assumed the teaching duties of a one room school house in Broome County. She joined the faculty of State, then known as the State Normal School, in 1883 as secretary to the president and substitute teacher, becoming Principal of the primary department of the Model School, known today as the Moline School. Miss Pierce was awarded the Master of Pedagogy degree by State College in 1920.

During the years of her retirement, she resided with students of the college at South Hall, then a residence hall located at 234 Ontario Street.

Miss Pierce, in 1935, was the honored guest at the planning of the cornerstone for Pierce Hall, the women's dormitory named in her honor. An old picture of the building, now done by David L. Hoot from above the center staircase at Pierce Hall.

A City of Albany Association member, she served as President of the Hall County Club and served as a board member of the Association and the Benevolent Association of State College. The organization that controls campus residence houses.

Funeral services for Miss Pierce will be held the morning of 11 am at the Lehigh Memorial Chapel, 126 State Street.

Fire Destroys Structure
On Future Dormitory Site

Fire Tuesday night caused heavy damage to a former State College women's dormitory, College House, at 295 Western Avenue. The vacated building was one of six structures soon to be razed in order to make room for a new dormitory.

The blaze was reported about 8:30 p.m. and the first fire engines, as well as several official and police vehicles, soon appeared on the scene. The area from Ontario Street to Partridge Street was immediately blocked off, and by 9:15 p.m. the conflagration was reported under control. For two more hours, however, the block remained closed to traffic while firemen stayed to completely extinguish the fire. The firemen also prevented the flames from spreading to the neighboring houses. Three of the neighboring structures as well as the burned house had been empty since April. Gamma Kappa Phi Sorority had used two other nearby houses until three weeks ago, when they secured new quarters.

Most of the damage was done to the roof and back of the building although the whole house was almost completely gutted.

Fire department officials reported that the cause of the blaze is as yet unknown.

Two new dormitories, one for 200 residents and another for 300, are planned for this Washington Avenue site, completing a quadrangle of buildings around Dorn Field. Although no obvious work has been done on the project, plans are already underway for the demolition of the six empty buildings. Wrecking of the surrounding buildings and actual work on the new dormitories will begin soon.

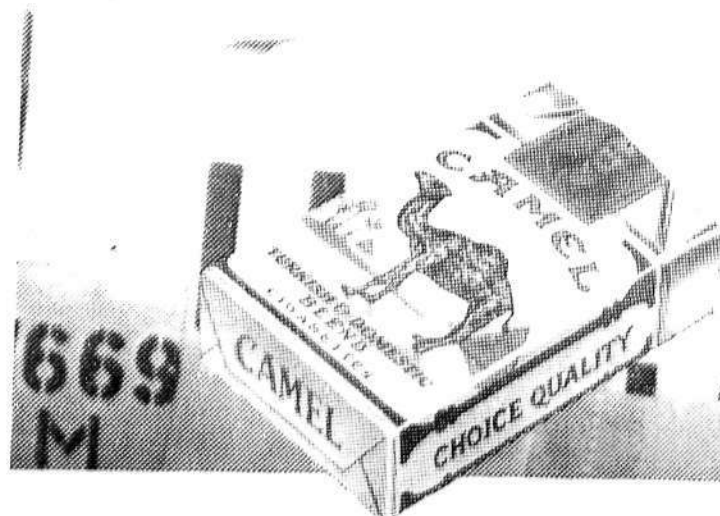
