

The Committee met at the call of the Chairman.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Chairman stated that it seemed important that the school year should commence earlier than now arranged, that it may close before the first of July:

Whereupon after conversation on the subject, it was directed that the ^{first term of the next} school year shall commence on the first Wednesday of September & continue twenty weeks, and that the second term shall commence on the ~~the~~ third Wednesday of February and continue twenty weeks.

The Committee then adjourned.

August 6. 1870. The committee met at the call of the

Chairman, Present the Chairman, Mr. Weaver, Mr. Townsend Mr. Westworth, Mr. Pugh. The minutes of the last meeting were read & approved.

The President of the school Dr. Alden presented the resignation of Mr. Shaw. The Secretary was directed to express to Mr. Shaw the high estimate which the committee entertain of his faithful & able service, & their good wishes for his future happiness. It was resolved that Mr. Wilkinson be continued as a pupil in the model school, and that Mr. Gibson be paid hereafter at the rate of \$200 per Ann. It was also resolved that \$150 be expended in the purchase of books for the general library under the direction of the Secretary and the President. The committee on repairs, Mr. Townsend & the Secretary, were authorized to fit the laboratory for practical work by the students and to cause a side rail to be placed around the stairs on the Lodge street side of the school building.

The committee then adjourned.
