## FIRST SCHOOL PAPER IN AMERICA Had NO NENS

The first high school newspaper published in this country started in 1829 at the Boston Latin School, the first secondsry school in Americs.

It can not resilly be called a. dewspaper because it contained no news, and haid only one pace on which were two storios, one beginning:
"There are some who question the propriety of pulling noses and call it sn unmanly sud unhandsome propensity; but in my opinion it is the noblest satisfaction a man can take on another man Who has done him an injury," and ending with the moral, "Acquire impudence by some means or other and you will rise to ominonce."

Comparison of that first newspaper with a modern high school newspe.per shows the vast amount of progress made in 101 yeurs.
