MILNE TO PLAY MOHAWK TONIGHT
VARSITY VICTORIOUS OVER ALUMNI
WIN BY SCORE OF 25-17

Tonight at 8:00 in the Page Hall Gym the Milne team will meet Mohawk High School. With four won games to their credit, the team will endeavor to make this game the fifth.

The starting men will probably be as follows: McHarg and Blocksidge, forwards; Rosenstein and Norvell, guards, and Simmons, center. The substitutes will be Smith, Dearstyne, and Kneller, the latest candidate to receive a suit.

On last Friday, in the Page Hall Gym the Milne basketball squad turned back a strong Alumni quintet by the score of 25-17. It was the fourth win for the varsity as against one defeat.

The game was very close until the last few minutes. In the first half, the lead changed hands a number of times with the Alumni holding a 10-9 advantage at half-time. Toward the closing moments of the second half, the Milne basketeers rallied to score three field goals and to clinch the game.

"Doug" McHarg led the Milne attack with twelve points, as a result of six field goals. "Howie" Rosenstein was runner-up with six points. Lee Reynolds led the Alumni quintet with eight points and was the star of the "grads," both offensively and defensively. Other former Milnites who played for the Alumni were "Bill" Sharpe, "Herb" Wilson, "Al" Mayberry, "Bill" Blatner, "Dick" Thompson, "Ray" Pafunda, and "Bob" Harding.

GERMAN STUDENTS INTERVIEWED

After a week of school Otto and Kurt still like Milne. Our two new German students, Kurt Eben and Otto Schaler hail from Gotha and Nurnburg respectively. They have been living in Albany since January 9. They are surprised to find that Milne is so much like their own schools, although they took nine or ten subjects. In their former schools the pupils did not change rooms, but the teachers change with subjects. Gym is more compulsory and four hours a week is required. Their vacations are much shorter than ours and they have to attend school on Saturdays. They do not play basketball, but play soccer, hand ball, and tennis. Although there are no societies in the German high schools, Otto and Kurt are already members of the Theta Nu society in Milne. After observing classes for a few weeks, they will take part in the work. They remarked that although they have few school dance in Germany, the students do not jump and hop about as much as we do.
