"It would be a sound investment," he said, "for the State to provide adequate pay and sufficient manpower to open our armories up so the general public would have a better appreciation of their importance."

# **Emergency Meeting Held** By Nassau Non-Teachers In School Budget Crisis

than 1,000 members of the Non-Teaching Section of the Nassau Chapter, Civil Service Employees Association, was held in the Hempstead Elks' Club June 20 to find a way to protect their jobs.

About 1,500 non-teaching school employees in 11 Nassau Countyarea school districts face possible layoffs or loss of hard-won pay raises and even regular yearly salary increments, as a result of non-ratification by taxpayers of the schools' budgets. Minimum raises of \$200 a year were won in the last legislative session for all State employees, through vigorous campaigning by the C.S.E.A., which has 87,000 public employee members in New York State. If this happens, there is danger that school officials will scrap planned pay raises and regular salary increments for all nonteaching personnel, and lay-off many of them temporarily.

Although details have yet to be worked out, the layoffs appear virtually certain under terms of the State Education policy. It proterity budgets from spending teachers' salaries and essential operating expenses.

Nassau Chapter President Irving Flaumenbaum and Edward Perrot, chairman of the Chapter's Non-Teaching Section, said it all boiled down to this: "Non-Teaching employees in the austeritybudget schools might have to bear the whole brunt of the financial squeeze. "At least half of them may get lay-offs, and the rest may not only be denied the new pay raise, but may not even get their regular scheduled yearly increments. The teachers, on the other hand, will not feel the squeeze at all.

"While we certainly don't want to see the teachers hurt, we are even more anxious that our nonteaching members should not be hurt. But if the austerity budgets go into effect, the teachers should not be favored at the expense of the non-teaching employees."

Mr. Flaumenbaum said that if the treatment of non-teaching personnel as against teachers is only a matter of State Education Department policy, then this policy should be changed in order that these non-teachers may also get their normal increments and the new pay raises.

C.S.E.A. President John F. Powers and other Association officers are also working on the problen direct from C.S.E.A. headquarters in Albany. Mr. Powers sent a two-page letter last Friday to State Education Commissioner James E. Allen, Jr., expressing the Association's grave concern over the outcome of the problem.

"A school program cannot be turned on and off like a water tap," said Mr. Powers, "Perhaps the greatest asset an employer has is his work force. The elimination of salary increments or other justified pay raises could not but strike a crippling blow at the morale of that work force. Wholesale layoffs would utterly devestate employee morale."

A large percentage of New York City employees are covered by the Post offices will be open the Standard Leave Regulations of the Career and Salary Plan. These will be made on July 3. Operations simply state that the employees under C&S don't have to work on any of 11 scheduled holidays, including Memorial Day and the Fourth of July. Saturday being a normal day off. C&S people wouldn't work that day anyhow.

Employees of the Department of Education are largely governed by their pupils' holiday schedules. The school system must maintain a certain number of school days in the year.

Some City employee units not under the Career and Salary Plan follow its provisions for holidays.

# People To Do the Job

WiEREVER LARGE SUMS of money are handled, you haveto have a strict standard of procedure, strictly kept. Otherwise, you open the doorto trouble.

The Support Bureaus of the Domestic Relations Court collected last year more than \$16,000,000 for neglected families. That's more than three times the total for 1946, and indications are that it is still going up.

During the dozen years that this work load boomed, the staff of the five Support Eureaus also increased-from 57 to 677 employees. If an employee falls sick, goes on there a long time and done a vacation or quits, the Bureau is in a hole. So are the abandoned families who need the support money.

Cash that comes in from the definquent men must be mailed on the same day. So the understaffed organizations have to cut corners. It is a wonder that big trouble hasn't cropped up yet.

John Warren Hull, Presiding Justice, has warned that if things are allowed to rock along as they are, the Court cannot be held responsible for whatever unpleasant situation develops. More people are badly needed, to let the Bureaus do at least an adequate job.

# Vets' Pension, Vets' Compensation -How Do You Tell the Difference?

among veterans about "pension" and "compensation," reports the New York State Division of Veterans Affairs. The terms are not interchangeable, it is stated. There are definite differences.

A veteran's pension is payable to a veteran of World War I. World War II, or the Korean Conflict who is permanently and totally disabled from a disability which is not connected with his service; and waich is not the result of the veteran's wilful misconduct or victous habits.

If the veteran has a total and permanent non-service-connected disability, and if he is unemployable and meets the service requirements, the VA will pay him monthly pension of \$66.15. If he is rated permanently and totally disabled for a continuous period of 10 years, or upon reaching the age of 65, and is unem-

# Kings DA Clerks Ask Higher Pay

The clerical forces in the Kings County (Brooklyn) District Attorney's office have protested their salary slot and grade in an appeal filed with the State Civil Service Commission.

# Questions Answered On Social Security

than proof of my age and recent curity? earnings for my social security retirement claims? What about my wife and minor children?

Sometimes other proofs are needed. The exact proofs needed will depend on the circumstances. If your wife is filing at the same time, proof of marriage may be needed. If you or your wife were married previously proof of the termination of the former marriage may be required. When there are minor children, their birth certificates should be brought in. If any of the children are adopted children, a copy of the adoption papers would be necessary.

I was receiving widow's social security benefits from 1957 until May, 1958. I remarried in June of 1958 and my checks were stopped. I heard the law was changed so that I may now qualify for benefits again. Is this true?

The new amendments do make changes in the provisions regarding remarriages. You did not furnish enough information for us to advise you definitely on whether you can now qualify for benefits. You should contact your social security office. They will advise you if you are eligible for benefits under the new rules.

Will I need any proofs other disability benefits under social se-

If it appears that you will continue disabled indefinitely, you should report to your social security office for filing.

I never worked under social security and never served in the armed forces, nor have I worked in railroad employment. Will social security pay any benefits to my wife if I should die?

No. Nothing is payable under situations of this kind.

Although I am 65, I plan to continue working. I understand that I will qualify for \$116 based on my average earnings of \$350 a month. Now that he social security tax is being withheld on \$4,800 (\$400 a month) would ... couple of years earnings at that rate qualify me fo the new maximum of \$127?

Court of Appeals

Grottano v Kennedy, Petitioner walked out of a disciplinary hearing and was then charged with insubordination in addition to the original charges. The court held that the commissioner had the right to try petitioner in absentia. He was found guilty and dismissed from the police force. However, the court found that the insubordination charge could not be sustained since the commissioner was not acting in the capacity of superior officer but as judge when he ordered petitioner to proceed to trial. The matter was remitted to the commissioner to redetermine punishment in the light of the charges that have been sustained.

Appellate Division

Patton v N.Y.C. Transit Authority. The court held that there tion as to petitioner's misconduct, and on examination of the whole record dismissal was not so disproportionate to the offense as to be shocking to one's sense of fairness.

# CSEA Counsel's Report On 1959 Legislative Session

(NOTE: Each year following the close of the 19 day bill period. Counsel for the Civil Service Emplayers association, Inc. reports on civil service measures and other bills of particular interest to public employees that were considered by the State legislature. The Civil Service Leader annually publishes this report for the information of Association mem iers.)

#### (Continued From Last Week) ARMORY EMPLOYEES

Chapter 418 of the Laws of 1959 amends Section 187 of the Militar, Law with respect to the classification and allocation of Armory employees. The amendment is of more technica' than substantive importance Essentially, it formalizes the relationships that occur when an Armory employee is allocated or reallocated, classified or reclassified, to one of the salary grades provided in Section 187. The section also provides that eligibility of Armory employees for increments shall be determined in the same manner as eligibility of employees allocated under the Civil Bervice Law, and that the salary after promotion, demotion, transfer or reinstatement, or reallocation shall be determined in the same manner as provided in the Civil Service Law

## PUBLIC EMPLOYEES -HARNESS RACING

The Governor vetoed one bill which we supported. Thus was a measure which would have permitted a public employee with a salary of less than \$7,500 (except for law enforcement officers) who had been employed at harness racing tracks during 1953 to work part time at such harness racing tracks. While this measure did not coincide with the Association measure which would have raised the limit to \$7.500 irrespective of previous employment, we did support the Albert bill, Senate Intro. No. 1945, Print No. 4397, which would have at least assisted some public employees in connection with employment at harness racing tracks. The Governor's message in disapproving the legislation reads as follows:

"This bill would permit the employment at harness race tracks of public officers and employees whose government salaries are not more than \$7,500 per year, and who were employed at harness race tracks prior to 1954. Presently, only those who receive less than \$6,000 may be so employed. Somewhat similar bill were vetoed in 1956 and 1957. A sufficient showing has not been made that this legislation is either necessary or desirable.

#### BILLS WHICH BECAME LAW BUT WERE OPPOSED BY THE ASSOCIATION -PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS - CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS

Chapter 713 of the Laws of 1959 enacted into law a measure which restricts the practice of Accountancy in the future to two Classes-Certified Public Accountants and Public Accountants. The requirements for Certified Public Accountants are basically what they have always been, but this law requires the enrollment of anyone else who wishes to practice as a Public Accountant. To enroll as a Public Accountant. one must be 21 years of age, a citizen, and a resident of this state. In addition, he must submit evidence that he was engaged in the practice of Accountancy on July 1, 1959 as his principal occupation, or that for six of the last ten years, he, as an employee of the United States, the state, or a political subdivision, performed duties entailing accounting or auditing or the examination or investigation of tax re-

Anyone who wishes to so enroll must do so on or before October 1, 1959.


