STUDENT VOTE SELECTS HELWIG

Juniors Elect Paul Hooker As President

The Presidency of the Junior Class will pass from Robert Helwig, the new Student Association President, to Paul Hooker, Vice-President, at the annual meeting of the Junior Class on Saturday, February 21, at 8 p.m. in the Student Center. The Class will elect the new Secretary and Treasurer for once again they are Donna Harris and Catherine McGowan, respectively.

25 Votes Decide Presidency; Dougherty Serves As Veep

The race for the Presidency of Student Association was won by Robert Helwig by a total of 25 votes. Out of the 939 votes cast, Helwig received 412 and Douglas Penfield received 387. A total of 140 blank ballots were cast. It should be noted that the number of votes cast was only two more than the number cast in the Hinck-Tate election in 1957. Since then the student body has increased in number, but apparently decreased in political enthusiasm.

Vice-President
James Dougherty won the election for the Vice-Presidency with a total of 538 votes against a total of 401 blank ballots. Dougherty served as a member of Senate for the past year and as Sports Editor of the State College News.

Helwig has served his class in the position of President in both his Freshman and Junior years. He is active in dramatic productions here on campus.

Senators

Four of the seventeen candidates for Senate were eliminated by a Myskania preference. The following ten were elected: Elizabeth Aceto, Robert Battaly, Rose Carbone, Ann Foley, Charles Fowler, Patricia Genovese, Audrey Hurd, Jean Knapp, Joyce Donohue, Nancy Rishel.

Voters

There were 207 ballots cast for Junior class officers. This made the quota 31.

In the race for President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer the following deserve mention: Douglas Penfield, David Mead, Josephine Petrucci, and Rose Carbone, respectively.

Don Donato Will Head Class Of '61

The Class of '61 elected Donald Donato as President by a total of 108 more votes than his nearest opponent, William Pasquarella.

Lois Wolner won the Vice-Presidency by a total of 47 more votes than his nearest opponent, Bradford Mundy.

Gail Kasparian was elected Class Secretary, and Lucille Jacobson was elected Treasurer.

Statistics

The quota for the class was set at 41. This is 19 per cent of the voting members of the class. The number of voting members was 273.

The Sophomores had four candidates for President, six candidates for Vice-President, four candidates for Secretary, six candidates for Treasurer, and thirty-three candidates for Senate.

Eliminations

Donato was eliminated from the Senate race by preference. Also, Miss Shepherd was eliminated from the race for Treasurer by a Senate preference.

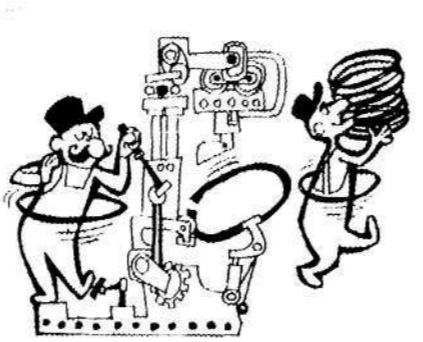

Albany Seeded Third

The eight teams invited to play in the tourney were selected on the basis of their Dunkel rating of February 23. The final results in order of seed are:

M & M Boosters will be sold today from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and will also be sold tomorrow evening.

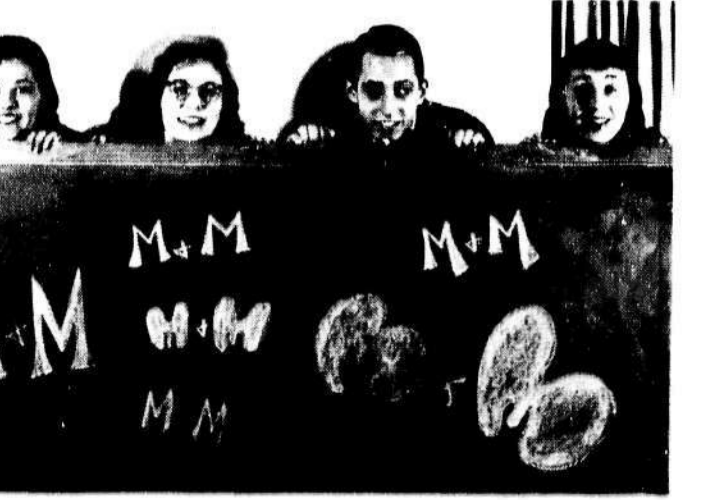
Booths And Shows
