| "Most people execpt College students are interested in education, Education gives enlightenment to people, rather than speed in inereasing the pay envelope and decreasing working hours. A liberal educeation is one which frees the mind and makes one oers Colleges from lieing liberal is that the presidents must lee mo-getters; they must sell celucation." These remarks were made Sundiy night by 1)r. Exerett Dean Martin, director of the Comper Union Formm, New York city, in the third of the serics of Norman Mendelssohn Open Formm lectures, conducted by the Jewish Community center. His topic was "The Meaning of a Liberal Education." <br> "Americans have a resistance to enlighteument, and perhaps too much speed and proficiency, he said. We are an emolional rather than a ra- timal people. We think more of good intentions than right thinking. The have put humanitarian sentiment in the phace of reason. Our utilitarianism, this short cut to cocrything. stands in the way of a liberal celucition." | "It is the spirit of a College rather than a device of organization which makes it a University," said Dr. Martin. <br> "We give more attention to and are more interested in moving pictures and in 'Legs' Diamonsl than in college professors. Wie do mot realize how much richer our lives may le for four years of daily association with some of our college professors.
