Players to Present Marlowe's 'Dr. Faustus'

The Cleveland Players, recognized as the professional acting ensemble in the nation, will present Christopher Marlowe's "Dr. Faustus" tomorrow night at 8:30 in Page Hall. The performance here is a part of a 38-state tour, made possible by a Ford Foundation grant in 1957 to further the production of professional live theatre around the United States.

An enduring theatre classic, Dr. Faustus is an eloquent recreation of the legend of a man who sells his soul to the Devil. Written in the Middle Ages, the play is a reflection of the popularity at that time of stories concerning man's con-

tracts to the devil. This theme was used by Goethe in his epic "Faust' and also formed the base for Gounod's familiar opera of the same

curity Council at St. Lawrence University in Canton, New York. Representing Albany State as delegates to the Council were Ross Dunn, Jan Dyckman, Roy Knapp, and Robert Rittner. Each of the delegates took Turkey's seat for the discussion of two resolutions concerned with present world problems. Some of the proposals under consideration were U.S. Aggression in Cuba, repatriation of Arab refugees, and the admission of Red China

The Council is intended to be realistic as possible, and many of the delegates and advisors remarked that it was one of the best such imitations of the real Security Council since the founding of the annual event. The assembly was marked by an outburst against the Secretary-General by one of the Soviet delegates, a violent pro-Lumumba demonstration from the audience, and a Russian walkout over the Congo issue. The Turkish (Albany State) delegates took every opportunity to criticize their traditional enemy, the Soviet Union, but made speeches in support of almost all United States policies. The Albany delegates were advised on the Turkish position by Professor Richard Chambers of St. Lawrence University, an expert on Middle Eastern affairs.

Ross Dunn, head of the Albany delegation, received the honorable mention award for best delegate.
