Resolved that before the commencement of each term the Principal be directed to furnish the Secretary with a list of such books and stationery, as will be required during that term, and that the Secretary make the purchases where they can be made on the most advantageous terms.

Resolved that whenever the payment of tuition in the Experimental or primary department is delayed more than one month from the commencement of the term that the bills for such tuition be delivered to the treasurer for collection.

Resolved that the tuition in the experimental school be advanced to sixteen dollars a term beginning with the next term.

Communications were read from several members of the Faculty, and were laid over for future consideration.
