



UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY ANNOUNCES FOOTBALL PROGRAM WILL FORFEIT THREE VICTORIES FROM 1995 SEASON

ALBANY, N.Y. -- The University at Albany will forfeit its three victories from the 1995 football season following a self-report to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) which detailed a secondary rules infraction by a team member, as Director of Athletics Dr. Milton E. Richards announced today.

The Albany student-athlete participated in nine football contests while enrolled in less than 12 credit hours, which is contrary to the provisions of NCAA Bylaws. The University's action to forfeit its three victories from a team which posted a 3-7 record last fall was deemed "representative and consistent" with NCAA policies. In a letter dated March 13, the NCAA required no further action by the University in this self-reported case.

"When it became clear that the student-athlete in question did not enroll for the appropriate amount of courses during his season of competition, we acted quickly to inform the NCAA," Richards said. "Although we are disappointed to forfeit victories on the field of play, our athletic department is committed to competing by established NCAA rules. With the addition of a full-time academic adviser and upgraded computer information systems, I feel confident this situation will not occur in the future."

"The University will always maintain the highest ethical standards with regard to its intercollegiate athletics program," Vice President for Student Affairs James Doellefeld added. "This situation highlights the need to monitor student-athlete eligibility prior to each contest. Dr. Richards is to be commended for his vigilance and for a timely and appropriate action."

The Albany football program competed at the NCAA's Division II level for the first time last season.

The University is providing a bus to take administrators and team members to the funeral.

In addition, head coach Roberto Vives was named the NCAA Division II East Regional Women's Track Coach of the Year, after he guided Albany to the Collegiate Track Conference indoor title and a second-place finish at the ECAC championships in the program's first Division II season.

UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY TRACK & FIELD STANDOUT KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

ALBANY, N.Y. -- **Kimberly Toone**, 22, an All-America track & field athlete at the University at Albany, died in a tragic auto accident on Wednesday afternoon while returning to campus from the New York City area for a practice. Toone was scheduled to compete in this weekend's NCAA Division II indoor track & field championships in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Toone lost control of the automobile she was driving northbound on the Taconic State Parkway near the town of Milan in Dutchess County, when the vehicle skidded on ice, spun sideways, and struck another car that was pulled off to the side of the road. She suffered a fractured neck in the fatal accident. Toone's teammate Xiomara Diaz, a passenger in the car who had also qualified for the NCAA meet, was knocked unconscious by the collision, but has since been treated and released.

"Yesterday, the University and our athletic family suffered a devastating loss," Director of Athletics Dr. Milton E. Richards said. "Kimberly was not only a tremendous athlete, and a committed student, but a special person, who although she appeared reserved and quiet, cared deeply about the world around her."

A native of St. Albans, N.Y., Toone would have been a competitor in both the long jump and 55-meter hurdles at the NCAA Division II championships. She captured the ECAC indoor long jump title last Sunday, and was a member of the winning 4x200-meter relay, which set a school-record with a time of 1:45.46. Toone had also won the Collegiate Track Conference (CTC) indoor long jump and 55-hurdles events in February. In a triangular meet on January 13 at the Recreation and Convocation Center, she established the school's indoor long jump record and qualified for nationals with a leap of 19-feet, 2-inches.

Toone did not compete on the high school level in track & field at Bronx High School of Science, and became a collegiate track athlete just two years ago. Under the supervision of head coach Roberto Vives, she qualified for both the NCAA Division III indoor and outdoor championships in 1995. Toone, a two-time Albany captain, was a three-event CTC outdoor champion in the long jump, 100-meter hurdles and 400-hurdles last year, and claimed the conference's indoor long jump and 55-hurdles crowns.

An outstanding student, Toone received her undergraduate degree in criminal justice from the University at Albany last spring, and was working on her master's in the same discipline. She received an ECAC Merit Medal as the school's top senior female scholar-athlete during the 1995-96 academic year. Toone, who had a 3.76 cumulative grade point average as an undergraduate, was selected to the 1995 GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America District I At-Large Team. A Presidential Scholar and Phi Beta Kappa student, she had hoped to attend law school.

Funeral arrangements for Kimberly Toone are pending. She is survived by her parents, Walter and Gwendolyn, and one sister, Kira.
