UALBANY SIGNS FOUR WOMEN'S BASKETBALL STUDENT-ATHLETES FOR 2007-08

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany women's basketball coach Trina Patterson announced today that four student-athletes have signed national letters of intent to play for the Great Danes in the 2007-08 academic year. Kim Clements, a 5-foot-10 guard/forward from Waterbury, Conn. (Holy Cross H.S.), Amira Ford, a 5-foot-5 guard from Friendswood, Texas (Clear Brook H.S. / Blinn Junior College), Felicia Johnson, a 5-foot-4 guard from Newport News, Va. (Woodside H.S.) and Tiffanie Johnson, a 5-foot-11 forward from Richmond, Texas (Crockett H.S. / Panola College) have each made their commitment.

"(Amira) Ford and (Felicia) Johnson bring lightning speed to our team at the point guard position," UAlbany coach Trina Patterson said. "It was a high-need position for our program and they will both play immediately. (Kim) Clements and (Tiffanie) Johnson are small forwards who are solid three-point shooters and very good weakside rebounders. This is a highly-talented group that improves our offensive punch with their scoring ability."

Clements led her team to the CHSCA Class M state championship, the first title in the program's history, with a perfect 26-0 record. She was named to the *New Haven Register* all-state second team and was an honorable mention selection by the *Hartford Courant*. Clements, who totaled 15.0 points and 10.0 rebounds per game, has been chosen to play in the CHSCA East-West All-Star Game. A consensus all-state second-team performer as a junior, Clements was named the Naugatuck Valley League Tournament MVP.

Ford was a starter on two Blinn Junior College squads that posted a pair of 20-win campaigns. She averaged 5.3 points, 5.6 assists, 4.7 rebounds and 1.2 steals in earning honorable mention All-Region XIV recognition. The Lady Buccaneers made the regional tournament finals with a 22-11 record. Ford, who is originally from Long Island, ranked 15th nationally and third regionally in assists per game. As a high school player, Ford was voted the district defensive player of the year and to the all-district first team.

Felicia Johnson was named to the *Hampton Roads Daily Press* second team and Peninsula all-district first team as a senior. She averaged 15.0 points, 5.0 assists, 4.0 rebounds and 5.0 steals. Johnson, who is from the same hometown as Coach Patterson, led the Wolverines to a 20-6 record and an appearance in the Eastern Region playoffs. She has been chosen to participate in the Virginia High School Coaches Association East-West All-Star Game.

A transfer from Panola College in Texas, Tiffanie Johnson contributed 7.6 points and 3.1 rebounds, plus made 40 three-point field goals last season. The Fillies finished with a 21-10 record. Johnson, who played in four games as a freshman at New Mexico State in 2005-06, was the District 21-Class 3A MVP at Crockett (Texas) High School. She averaged 15.0 points, 5.0 assists and 5.0 rebounds in leading the Bulldogs to a 29-5 record. Johnson earned second-team all-region and first-team all-district honors as a senior.

FOOTBALL COACH BOB FORD RECEIVES CITIZEN OF THE UNIVERSITY AWARD ON FRIDAY

Albany, N.Y. – The University at Albany Alumni Association will honor head football coach Bob Ford with its Citizen of the University Award on Friday, June 1. The presentation will take place at the Gala Awards Banquet, which begins at 6:00 p.m. at the Desmond Hotel & Conference Center. The dinner and awards are part of the Association's Alumni Weekend.

The Citizen of the University Award recognizes outstanding contributions to the University by a non-alumnus or alumna through leadership, service or a special gift. The list of previous recipients includes former UAlbany basketball coach Richard "Doc" Sauers.

Ford, who has been UAlbany's only head coach since football was reinstated at the club level in 1970, has guided the program through a transition to the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (formerly Division I-AA) level. He has a 34-year varsity record of 208-136 at the school, and his 217 career victories ranks second among active NCAA FCS coaches.

Coach Ford's teams won a pair of Northeast Conference championships in 2002 and 2003. His UAlbany squads have a 78-41 record for a .655 winning percentage over the last 11 years. In 2006, the Great Danes posted a 7-4 record and recorded their first-ever wins over national top-25 squads. As a Division II program, UAlbany captured the 1997 and 1998 Eastern Football Conference championships. The '97 team established a school record with an 11-1 campaign. Ford received the Gordon White-Herschel Nissenson Division II Coach of the Year Award by the Metropolitan New York Football Writers Association.

Ford has been a member of the American Football Coaches Association's Board of Trustees for 13 years and served as the AFCA president in 2000. He received the New York State Athletic Administrators Distinguished Service Award in 2005.

UALBANY ANNOUNCES WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL SCHEDULE FOR 2007 SEASON

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany Vice President and Director of Athletics Lee McElroy announced today the school's women's volleyball schedule for the 2007 season. Head coach Kelly Sheffield has entered his team in five tournaments and put together a three-game swing through the state of Alabama. The Great Danes, who reached the NCAA Tournament last year as the America East Conference champion, will host the UAlbany Classic on Sept. 14-15 at University Gymnasium and play a 12-game conference slate.

UAlbany opens the season at the Northern Arizona Invitational in Flagstaff, Ariz. on Aug. 24-25. New Mexico State, ranked 23rd nationally in last year's final AVCA national poll, is the first-round opponent. The Aggies, who posted a 33-4 record, are one of three teams on the schedule who were in the 2006 NCAA field. The Great Danes will also meet the Northern Arizona and UC-Davis.

UAlbany will host its own tournament in September. The field includes Brown, Northeastern and Eastern Michigan. The Great Danes are also entered in the VCU Thanksgiving Classic (Nov. 23-24), Sheraton-Penn Invitational (Sept. 22-23) and the Western New York Invitational (Sept. 1-2).

The Great Danes are slated to make a three-game swing through the state of Alabama on Sept. 9-10. UAlbany travels to Jacksonville State, before playing both Alabama State and Troy in the state capital of Montgomery. America East play begins on Sept. 28 against Hartford.

UAlbany finished with a 19-13 record last season in winning the America East crown for the second time in the last three years. Ashley Crenshaw, who averaged 3.02 kills per game, heads the list of returnees as a first-team all-conference selection. Kamisha Kellam, a 6-foot-1 middle hitter, earned second-team all-league recognition with 2.25 kills and 1.35 blocks per game.

GERED BURNS WILL JOIN GREENE AND PALLOZZI AT NCAA TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Albany, N.Y. – Gered Burns (Guilderland) has been selected to compete at the 2007 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships, as announced on Tuesday by the NCAA Division I Men's and Women's Track and Field Committee. The national championships will take place at California State University, Sacramento's A.G. Spanos Sports Complex on June 6-9. He joins teammates Joe Greene (400-meter hurdles) and Marc Pallozzi (javelin) in this year's NCAA competition.

Burns earned an at-large selection based on his school-record 1:48.20 time in the semifinals of the 800-meter run at the IC4A championships. Burns, a senior from Altamont, N.Y. who won this year's America East Conference title, becomes the fourth UAlbany male athlete to compete at nationals in the program's Division I history.

Greene and Pallozzi (Lansingburgh) each advanced to the NCAA championships for the second straight year with top-five finishes at last weekend's East Regional meet. UALBANY SET TO PLAY NO. 15 ARKANSAS IN NCAA REGIONAL BASEBALL TOURNAMENT

Albany, N.Y. – UAlbany will meet seventh-seeded Arkansas in the first round of the 2007 NCAA Division I Baseball Championship on Friday at 8:00 p.m. ET, as the national tournament bracket was unveiled on Monday afternoon. The Razorbacks, who will host the Fayetteville Regional on June 1-4, are ranked 15th nationally with a 41-19 record. Oklahoma State (38-19) and Creighton (44-14) are also in the regional which will be played at Baum Stadium at George Cole Field, a 10,737-seat facility.

UAlbany (29-27) is making its first-ever NCAA appearance after capturing the America East Conference championship with a 1-0 victory over top-seed Binghamton last Saturday. The Great Danes, who have won eight of their last 10 outings, including three straight in America East postseason play, own the second-highest win total in school history. Steve Wyland, a first-team all-conference third baseman, batted .379 with 23 extra-base hits and 44 RBI. He drove in the game's lone run in the A-East championship game. Right-hander John Naples tied the program's single-season record for pitching wins with an 8-2 mark and a 3.29 earned run average.

"We are excited to go to Fayetteville," said UAlbany coach Jon Mueller, who has been the Great Danes mentor for all eight seasons at the Division I level. "I think the selection committee showed us some respect by placing us with seventh-seeded Arkansas. They must have felt that we have been playing some very good baseball after we won our conference tournament in three games."

Arkansas is making its 20th NCAA appearance, plus has advanced the College World Series on five occasions. The Razorbacks are hosting the regional tournament for the fourth time, including three of the last four years. Arkansas came up just short of winning its first Southeastern Conference (SEC) title after falling to top-ranked Vanderbilt in the conference championship last weekend. Pitchers Nick Schmidt (10-3, 2.85 ERA) and Jess Todd (9-2, 2.49 ERA) each earned first-team All-SEC recognition. First baseman Danny Hamblin totaled 22 home runs and 60 RBI.

Oklahoma State is in the NCAA field for the 35th time. The Cowboys, who have reached the CWS 19 times, finished third in the Big 12 Conference regular-season standings. Second baseman Tyler Mach (15 HR, 79 RBI), outfielder Corey Brown (19 HR, 65 RBI) and second baseman Ty Wright (.417 BA) each made the all-conference first team.

Creighton captured its first-ever Missouri Valley Conference championship. The Blue Jays are making their eighth NCAA appearance and reached the CWS in 1991. MVC Player of the Year Darin Ruff is hitting .377 with eight home runs and 56 RBI. Ben Mancuso, the MVC Pitcher of the Year, has a 10-2 record with a 2.28 ERA.

Tickets are on sale to the general public at the Razorback Ticket Center or online at www.hogwired.com. As of last Wednesday, approximately 1,600 reserved tournament books remained. Tournament books are \$70 for the regional. Individual game tickets will only be available on game day. All game day tickets, reserved and general admission/HogPen are \$15 each. 2007 NCAA DIVISION I BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP BRACKET ANNOUNCED

INDIANAPOLIS – The field of 64 teams competing for the 2007 NCAA Division I Baseball Championship was announced today by the NCAA.

The national top eight seeds are Vanderbilt (51-11), Rice (49-12), North Carolina (48-12), Texas (44-15), Arizona St. (43-13), Florida St. (47-11), Arkansas (41-19), San Diego (43-16).

The Atlantic Coast Conference leads all conferences in the number of teams in the championship field with seven, followed by the Big 12 with six. The Southeastern Conference has five teams, while the Big West, Conference USA and Pacific-10 has four teams each.

Twenty-nine of the 64 teams were not in the field last year, including Albany (N.Y.) (AQ), Brown (AQ) and Wofford (AQ), making the championship for the first time. Lafayette last was in the field in 1990, while Memphis is in the field for the first time since 1994 and Sam Houston St.'s last appearance was 1996.

Miami (Fla.) is in the field for the 35th consecutive year, extending its own record. Florida St. is making its 30th straight appearance, second all-time. Other long consecutive streaks: Clemson (21), Cal St. Fullerton (16), Rice (13) and Oral Roberts (10).

Of the 283 championship eligible Division I institutions which sponsor baseball, Vanderbilt has the most Division I wins with 51. Twenty-six other teams won at least 40 Division I contests and all are in the field.

Each of the 16 regionals features four teams, playing a double-elimination format. The regionals are scheduled to be conducted from Friday, June 1, to Monday, June 4. Selection of the eight super regional hosts will be announced on www.NCAASports.com, Monday, June 4 at approximately 11 p.m. (ET).

The 61st Men's College World Series begins play Friday, June 15, at Rosenblatt Stadium in Omaha, Nebraska.



JOE GREENE & MARC PALLOZZI RECORD TOP-FIVE FINISHES AT NCAA REGIONALS

Gainesville, Fla. – University at Albany's Joe Greene and Marc Pallozzi each advanced to the NCAA championships in the 400-meter hurdles and javelin, respectively, for the second straight year on Saturday at the NCAA East Regional Outdoor Track & Field Championships. The two-day regional meet was held at the University at Florida's James G. Pressly Stadium at Percy Beard Track.

Greene placed third in the 400-hurdles final, the best finish by a UAlbany athlete in regional competition. He eclipsed his own school record by sprinting 50.18 seconds. He set the previous standard of 50.52 in the NCAA Championship's semifinal roundlast year. Georgia's Justin Gaymon, who took third at the 2006 regionals, was first in 49.61, while South Carolina's Thomas Hilliard grabbed second in 49.83. The top five finishers advance to nationals on June 6-9 in Sacramento, Calif.


Marc Pallozzi (Lansingburgh) finished fifth in the javelin by recording the second-best throw in school history of 226-feet, 8-inches on his final attempt. Pallozzi, who was tenth in this event at the 2006 nationals to earn All-America honors, set the UAlbany standard of 228-2 at last year's NCAA East Regional.

Mike McCadney and Jessica Ortman were edged out in their bids for a top-five finish. McCadney tied for fifth in the triple jump by breaking his own school record with a leap of 50-feet, 11.50 inches. However, he was placed sixth after the tie was broken with Georgia Tech's Alphonso Jordan based on a better second attempt in the final. Ortman, who set a UAlbany record in the 800meter run in qualifying, was seventh in the championship race with a time of 2:07.32. Both athletes will be considered for NCAA at-large bids by a committee, with the announcement due on Tuesday.

Gered Burns (Guilderland) led UAlbany to a school-record effort in the 4x400-meter relay, as the Great Danes shattered the existing mark with a time of 3:08.86 to finish sixth. Burns ran 47.9 seconds on the third leg, while Junior Burnett and Joe Greene posted 46-splits in their sections. Pat Weider went 48.3 on the second leg of the relay. Florida won the competition in 3:06.31 as the top three relays qualify for nationals.

FOUR UALBANY PLAYERS ON 2007 USILA DIVISION I ALL-AMERICA LACROSSE TEAM

Baltimore, Md. – University at Albany's Frank Resetarits leads a group of four players who have been chosen to the 2007 USILA All-America Team, as announced on Saturday, May 26 by the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association. Resetarits, a finalist for the Tewaaraton Trophy, becomes the first Great Dane to earn first-team All-America honors at the Division I level.

UAlbany's Jordan Levine (second team), Merrick Thomson (third team) and Brett Queener (honorable mention) were also recognized on the USILA All-America squad. Luke Daquino, an honorable mention selection two years ago, had been the lone All-American in the lacrosse program's history since the Great Danes upgraded to Division I in 2000.

"These players have put the UAlbany lacrosse program on the national map," said UAlbany coach Scott Marr, whose team was ranked second nationally for six consecutive weeks during the season. "Their selection to the All-America team shows how much we have grown and the respect UAlbany has gained across the country."

Resetarits, the 2007 America East Conference Player of the Year, ranks third nationally in scoring with 57 goals and 23 assists for 80 points, the third-best total in UAlbany annals. The senior attackman tied a career-high with eight points (6 goals, 2 assists) in the conference tournament championship against UMBC. Resetarits, a three-time first-team All-America East standout, finished his career with a 49-game scoring streak, which equaled the longest mark among active Division I players. He ranks second on the school's all-time scoring list with 241 points (158 goals, 83 assists).

Levine, a junior midfielder, totaled 23 goals and 16 assists. He ranked 17th nationally in ground balls at 5.06 per game, plus set the program's Division I single-season record with 91. Levine, who scored multiple goals against eight opponents this season, equaled a career-best with five points (2 goals, 3 assists) vs. Loyola in the NCAA's opening round. He scooped up a career-high 11 ground balls against both Stony Brook and UMBC in America East postseason play.

Thomson was voted all-conference four times, including a pair of first-team selections, during his career. He netted 56 goals and ranks third among the nation's leaders at 3.11 per game. Thomson was named the America East Championship's most outstanding player after accounting for 10 goals and two assists in the postseason tournament. A native of Stony Creek, Ontario, Thomson participated in the 66th Annual USILA North-South Classic along with UAlbany teammate Frank Resetarits. He finished as the program's career scoring leader with 188 goals and 56 assists for 244 points.

Queener, a senior goalkeeper, posted a 9.68 goals against average and a .520 save percentage en route to setting a school record with 14 victories in the cage. He made double-figure saves on six occasions during the spring, including a season-high 14 against top-ranked Cornell in the NCAA quarterfinal round. Queener, who was also used as an attacker in man-advantage situations, added two goals and five assists.

UAlbany (15-3) captured its fourth America East championship in the last five years this spring. The Great Danes established a single-season record for victories, defeated seven top-20 opponents, recorded the first NCAA Division I win in the athletic program's history, and reached the national lacrosse quarterfinals for the first time.

UALBANY CAPTURES AMERICA EAST CONFERENCE BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Farmingdale, N.Y. – Alexander Beaulieu recorded his tenth save of the season by striking out two batters in the ninth inning, as UAlbany captured its first-ever America East Conference championship with a 1-0 victory over Binghamton on Saturday afternoon at Farmingdale Park. The Great Danes earned an automatic NCAA Tournament berth.

Beaulieu, a junior closer, was called upon after Binghamton's Joe Charron tripled into the right-field gap with one out off reliever Sean Gregory. The right-hander struck out Pat Haughie swinging with a fastball before walking Henry Dunn. Beaulieu then sealed the verdict when he caught lead-off hitter Justin Smucker looking with a slider on the third strike to end the game.

UAlbany starter Cory Warrings (Cairo-Durham), who had won two of his last four regular-season starts, went 6.1 innings on the mound. He allowed three hits and struck out two to earn the championship's most outstanding player award. Warrings, a 6-foot-4 left-hander, allowed Matt Simek's one-out double in the sixth, but then stranded him by recording a pop out to second and ground out to third.

UAlbany (29-27) scored the game's lone run in the fifth when Leo Corvino (Columbia) walked with two outs and then moved to second base on a wild pitch. Steve Wyland, a member of the all-championship team, followed with a RBI single to center field. Sean Gregory, who relieved Warrings in the seventh, worked out of trouble twice. Charron walked and advance to second via a sacrifice bunt, before Gregory retired both hitters he faced in the inning. Simek, who went 2-for-3 at the plate, doubled down the right-field line with two outs in the eighth. But Gregory forced Jeff Monaco to ground out to the shortstop.

"This was a hard-earned win," said UAlbany coach Jon Mueller, whose team recovered from a four-game sweep by Binghamton in April to make the America East postseason on the last weekend of the regular season. "Our seniors never gave up after that first conference series. (Cory) Warrings got in a comfort zone and kept his pitch count down. He got us to the best bullpen we've had since I've been here. I am going to take a deep breath and enjoy this magical ride."

Jeff Dennis pitched six solid innings for the Bearcats, who dropped an 8-7 decision in the second round to UAlbany following a five-run ninth. Dennis gave up three hits, struck out eight and walked six in this pitcher's duel that produced the first 1-0 result in conference tournament history. Reliever Greg Lane was even more effective as he threw three hitless innings.

"It feels great that I came through for the team," offered Wyland, whose bases-clearing double was the key hit in the previous night's two-out, ninth-inning rally. "Our pitching was unbelievable today. We knew they had to play that early game, so I think we had more energy and were a little fresher (for the championship). We played with the experience of having been in the tournament before. No one was nervous."

Binghamton (28-19), the championship's top seed after winning the regular-season title, reached the America East final earlier in the day by defeating Maine, 13-4, in an elimination game. Brendon Hitchcock, the conference's player of the year, had three hits, including a solo homer in the first, and drove in four runs.



UALBANY RALLIES WITH FIVE-RUN NINTH TO ADVANCE IN A-EAST TOURNEY PLAY

Farmingdale, N.Y. – Sean Donovan's game-winning single capped a five-run rally in the ninth inning to lead UAlbany to an 8-7 victory over Binghamton in the second round of the America East Conference Baseball Championship on Friday evening at Farmingdale Park.

The Great Danes advanced to the championship round on Saturday at 3:35 p.m. in this double-elimination tournament. The America East champion receives an automatic NCAA berth. The Bearcats will meet Maine, who upended second-seeded Stony Brook earlier in the day, in the loser's bracket at 12:05 p.m.

Binghamton (27-18) had put together a solid performance for the second straight game prior to the ninth inning. The Bearcats, who captured the conference's regular-season crown to earn the No. 1 seed, built a 7-2 lead heading into the bottom of the eighth.

Matt Simek, who went 3-for-4 at the plate with two runs and three RBI, helped get his club off to a good start. In the second, Kyle Klee was hit by a pitch and then worked his way to third base via a fielders' choice and a sacrifice bunt. Klee then came across on Pat Haughie's ground out to the shortstop. Binghamton scored three times in the third off UAlbany starter Casey Walsh. Justin Smucker and Ryan James started the uprising with back-to-back doubles. Smith delivered a runscoring single through the left side, before Klee lined a RBI double down the left-field line.

The Great Danes, who defeated Stony Brook, 5-2, in the first round, would later slice the deficit in half. Second baseman Al Barbato belted a solo homer, his third of the year, over the right-field fence in the third. First baseman Steve Sayre scored Tom Hill, who had walked to lead off the fourth, with a sacrifice fly to left field.

Binghamton put together three consecutive singles in the fifth inning off reliever Josh Willimott. Simek, a first-team all-conference infielder, had the run-scoring hit in that sequence, and then smacked a solo homer in the seventh for a 6-2 advantage. Haughie scored in the seventh when he reached on a fielding error before coming across on a wild pitch.

UAlbany (28-27) started its two-out rally when Mike Konstanty ripped his third home run of the spring to left. The Great Danes then loaded the bases off closer Khalid Afify, who had five wins and six saves prior to being called in from the bullpen. Steve Wyland tied the contest by drilling a 3-1 fastball into the left-field gap for a bases-clearing double. After Hill was intentionally walked, Donovan delievered a soft-liner to center field that scored Wyland with the winning run.

"It's the most remarkable game that I have been a part of," said UAlbany coach Jon Mueller, whose team is in the America East championship final for the first time in the program's history. "We have been playing with our backs against the wall for six weeks. I guess we just have thick skin after worrying about getting into the tournament for so long. I probably used up a few four-leaf clovers with the baseball gods after this one."

Barbato, who scored three runs, and Donovan each finished with three hits for the Great Danes, who have won eight of their last 10 outings. Binghamton's James had two hits and scored twice.



JOE GREENE AND JESSICA ORTMAN ADVANCE TO FINALS AT NCAA REGIONAL MEET

Gainesville, Fla. – University at Albany's Joe Greene and Jessica Ortman each advanced to the finals through qualifying in the 400-meter hurdles and 800-meter run, respectively, on Friday at the NCAA East Regional Outdoor Track & Field Championships. The two-day regional competition is being held at the University at Florida's James G. Pressly Stadium at Percy Beard Track.

Greene won his heat and posted the third-best time in the preliminary round. He ran 50.56 seconds, just four-hundredths of a second off his school record set in the NCAA Championship's semifinals last year. Hampton's Andrew Peresta had the best mark in qualifying of 50.18, while Georgia's Justin Gaymon sprinted 50.37. Gaymon was third in the 2006 NCAA regional meet. Greene, a sophomore from Geneva, N.Y., will compete in the finals on Saturday at 7:10 p.m. ET. The top five finishers will advance to the NCAA Championships in June.

Ortman, a sophomore from Williamsville, N.Y., eclipsed her own UAlbany record with a time of 2:06.63 in the preliminaries. She broke a standard that was established at the 2006 USA Junior Nationals when she finished fourth in 2:06.94. Ortman, who did not advance to the regional 800 finals as a freshman, turned in the fourth-fastest time in qualify. The championship race is scheduled for 7:00 p.m. ET.

Gered Burns (Guilderland) was not as fortunate in men's 800-meters despite placing second in his heat by running 1:50.03. Burns, the America East champion and IC4A runner-up, finished just over one second out of the top-eight qualifying group. He could still possibly be granted an at-large perth to nationals based on his time.

"Joe (Greene) looked good today and I think he is ready to break 50 seconds," said UAlbany coach Roberto Vives, whose men's and women's outdoor teams captured this year's America East outdoor titles. "Jessica (Ortman) went out hard and is peaking at the end of the year. She has experience and is really prepared. Gered (Burns) was a bit unfortunate. He got boxed in, then almost tripped, and ran in a slow heat."

Felipe Reyes (Christian Brothers Academy) placed 10th in the long jump final with leap of 24feet, 1.75-inches. Luke Schoen tied for 15th in the pole vault as he cleared the bar at 16-feet, 1.25inches. Junior Burnett (100m-dash) and the 4x100-meter relay failed to advance out of the preliminary round.

Marc Pallozzi (Lansingburgh), who finished 10th at nationals one year ago, will compete in Saturday's javelin championship. Mike McCadney and Sarah Charles are entered in men's and women's triple jump, respectively. Burns, a senior from Altamont, N.Y., will run the third leg on UAlbany's 4x400m relay.

NAPLES PITCHES UALBANY TO AMERICA EAST FIRST-ROUND WIN OVER STONY BROOK

Farmingdale, N.Y. – Senior right-hander John Naples (Catholic Central) went seven strong innings to pick up his eighth win of the season in leading UAlbany to a 5-2 victory over Stony Brook in the first round of the America East Conference Baseball Championship on Thursday evening at Farmingdale Park. The Great Danes will meet Binghamton, a 9-3 winner over Maine, on Friday at 7:05 p.m. in the winner's bracket of this double-elimination tournament.

Naples, who allowed just a lead-off home run in the first inning, scattered seven hits while striking out one and walking one. He worked out of trouble on three occasions in the middle frames. He benefited from an unusual play in the third when Chris Sipp hit an apparent sacrifice fly to right field, but Robert Dyer was called out on an appeal play when he left the third-base bag early. After Stony Brook pitcher Tom Koehler recorded the second out on a strikeout, shortstop Sean Donovan lined a two-run double that bounced off the turf and over the left fielder's head. Wyland would then come across on a wild pitch.

The Great Danes, the championship's No. 3 seed, would add a pair of runs. Mike Konstanty singled and scored on a wild pitch with the bases loaded in the fourth. Tom Hill, who went 2-for-5 at the plate, doubled to lead-off the seventh and then came home when Steve Sayre (Columbia) drilled a two-bagger off the left-field wall for his 33rd RBI of the season.

"I thought Naples was a rock on the mound," said UAlbany coach Jon Mueller, whose team has lost their previous two America East opening-round games in 2004 and 2006. "He just threw quality pitches when he was in trouble and never caught too much of the plate. This is a confident group that thinks they have a chance in this tournament."





FIVE UALBANY PLAYERS NAMED TO ALL-AMERICA EAST CONFERENCE BASEBALL SQUAD

Boston, Mass. – University at Albany's Tom Hill leads a group of five players who have been named to the 2007 America East All-Conference Baseball Team as announced by the conference at the annual postseason championship banquet on Wednesday evening. Hill, a senior catcher, earned first-team recognition for the second consecutive year.

Joining Hill on the all-conference first team was senior third baseman Steve Wyland, sophomore outfielder Dave West and junior relief pitcher Alexander Beaulieu. Sophomore shortstop Sean Donovan was named to the all-conference second team for the second year in a row.

Wyland, a second-team honoree as a junior, leads the Great Danes with a .379 average. Hill, who splits time between catcher and designated hitter, is batting .322. He is second on the team with 57 hits, including a team-best 20 doubles, and has driven in 32 runs while scoring 32 times. Hill, who was named conference player of the week once this season, is third in home runs (19) and third in doubles (37) on the school's career charts.

West received his first all-conference honor after playing 37 games as the Great Danes' primary center fielder. A safety on the UAlbany football squad, West hit for a .303 average, with 40 hits, including 10 doubles and four home runs.

Beaulieu also earned his first all-conference award after leading the pitching staff with a 2.25 earned run average. Beaulieu, who made 22 appearances out of the bullpen as UAlbany's closer, recording nine saves, the second-best single-season mark in the program's history.

Donovan finished the regular season second on the team with a .327 average off 50 hits, while also scoring 33 runs and driving in another 32.

Binghamton's Tim Sinicki was named coach of the year after leading the Bearcats to their first regular-season title. Binghamton senior Brendan Hitchcock was named player of the year, while Maine's Myckie Lugbauer earned rookie of the year honors. Stony Brook's Gary Novakowski took home the conference's pitcher of the year hardware.

UALBANY SENDS 17 ATHLETES TO NCAA TRACK & FIELD EAST REGIONAL

Gainesville, Fla. – Seventeen athletes, the largest group in the track and field program history, will represent the University at Albany at the NCAA East Regional Outdoor Track & Field Championships on May 25-26. The regional competition will be held at the University of Florida's Percy Beard Track at James G. Pressly Stadium.

The list of UAlbany qualifiers include Junior Burnett, Gered Burns (Guilderland), Ricardo Estremera, Joe Greene, Raphael Jean-Baptiste, Gabriel Lopez, Mike McCadney, Marc Pallozzi (Lansingburgh), Felipe Reyes (Christian Brothers Academy), Luke Schoen, Pat Weider, Freddie Wills, Adanna Andrews, Sarah Charles, Jenn Gurrant, Brenna Militello and Jessica Ortman. The top five finishers in each individual event and the top three relays in the 4x100m and 4x400m will automatically qualify for the NCAA Championships on June 6-9 in Sacramento, Calif.

Burnett will compete in the 100-meter dash after winning his first America East Conference title. He is also a member of America East champion 4x100-meter and 4x400-meter relays. Burns, a senior from Altamont, N.Y., qualified for the NCAA East Regional in the 800-meter run. He posted a first-place finish at the America East championship and placed second at the IC4A meet. Burns ran a season-best 1:48.75 at the UAlbany Spring Classic in April.


Greene, a regional qualifier in both the 400-dash and 400-hurdles, will concentrate this weekend on the hurdles. He holds both school records in the 400-dash and 400-hurdles. The sophomore became first UAlbany track and field athlete to win two consecutive IC4A outdoor championships at the Division I level with a season-best 50.65 seconds in the hurdles. He will also compete as a member of the 4x100 and 4x400 relays.

Pallozzi, the first UAlbany field athlete to earn All-America honors after placing tenth at nationals in 2006, will compete in the javelin for the third straight year. He has consistently thrown over 200-feet en route to garnering his second America East title and first IC4A crown this spring. Pallozzi holds the school standard with a toss of 228-feet, 2-inches. McCadney will compete in the triple jump after finishing second at the America East championship. He bested the UAlbany mark, established by Peter Rugel in 1991, by leaping 50-feet, 9.25-inches.

Reyes broke the long jump record, previously set by Luis Soto in 1998, with a mark of 24-feet, 6.5-inches in qualifying for the NCAA regional meet. Lopez won the long jump at the America East championship. Schoen, a freshman, is a regional participant after placing second at the America East championship in the pole vault with a school-record mark of 16-feet, 8.75-inches. Estremera won his first America East 3,000-meter steeplechase championship with a time of 9:03.46.

Ortman, a sophomore, qualified for NCAA regionals in two events, but will focus on the 800-meter run. She won the America East 1,500-meter run championship and recorded second-place finishes in the 3,000-meter steeplechase and 800m. She became the first UAlbany athlete to capture a Texas Relays' title with a winning effort in the 800-meters.

Charles, a senior from Central Islip, N.Y., eclipsed the UAlbany triple jump mark with a leap of 41-feet, 2.25-inches at the UAlbany Spring Classic. She also posted a second-place showing at the America East championships. Andrews, Gurrant and Militello won America East titles in the 800m, long jump and high jump, respectively, to qualify for regional competition.

UALBANY'S RESETARITS AND THOMSON WILL PLAY IN USILA ALL-STAR GAME

Baltimore, Md. – University at Albany's Frank Resetarits and Merrick Thomson have been selected to play in the 66th Annual United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association (USILA) North-South Classic which features the nation's finest senior collegiate players. The all-star contest will be held at Calvert Hall High School in Towson, Md. on Friday, May 25 at 5:45 p.m. The game is part of the NCAA lacrosse championship weekend at Baltimore's M&T Bank Stadium.

Resetarits is currently third in the nation in scoring with 57 goals and 23 assists for 80 points, the third-best total in UAlbany history. Hempstead, N.Y. – Ashley Monceaux had three hits, including a home run, and drove in four runs in leading Baylor to a 10-0 victory over UAlbany in the NCAA Softball Championship's Hempstead Regional Final on Sunday afternoon at Hofstra Softball Stadium. The Bears, who are ranked seventh nationally, advanced to the Super Regionals on May 25-26.

Starting pitcher Lisa Ferguson was in complete control after allowing a lead-off single to UAlbany's Amber Maisonet in the first inning. Ferguson, who improved to 23-7 in the circle, mowed down the next 12 batters before giving way to reliever Kirsten Shortridge in the fifth. The right-hander struck out four.

Baylor (48-13) took a 1-0 lead in its first at bat when Monceaux and Shortridge started with back-to-back singles. Monceaux, a first-team All-Midwest Region first baseman, would later score on catcher Chelsi Lake's sacrifice fly.

The Bears, who are in the Super Regionals for the second time in the last three years, and will host Michigan next weekend, scored three times in the fourth. Tiffany Wesley, who went 3-for-3 with two runs, singled and stole second base before Kelsey Sage walked. After Alex Colyer sacrificed the runners to second and third, Wesley scampered home on Miriam Romero's single deep into the hole on the left side on the infield. Monceaux followed with a two-run double that rolled to the wall in the left-field gap for a 4-0 lead.

Baylor added a six-run fifth inning to put the game away. Wesley delivered a run-scoring double, before an error and a wild pitch led to more trouble. Monceaux, who was 3-for-4 on the day, capped the uprising with a long two-run homer over the center field fence, her 18th of the season.

"We wanted to send a message that we were the best team in this region," said Lake, who had two home runs and six RBI in Baylor's three regional games. "We scored a lot of runs and had some great pitching. We are excited about going home to play in front of family and friends."

UAlbany (35-17) lost to Baylor, 8-2, in this double-elimination tournament's first round on Friday, but then battled through the loser's bracket on Saturday to make its first-ever regional championship appearance. The Great Danes, who won the America East Conference title, defeated Harvard, 1-0, and Hofstra, 4-2, for the first-ever NCAA wins in the program's Division I history. Casey Halloran, who had a brief stint as a reliever to finish out the fifth inning for starter Leah McIntosh, finished her career as the school's all-time leader in wins (73) and strikeouts (595).

"We didn't play as well as we wanted," said UAlbany coach Chris Cannata, whose program reached the 35-win mark for the third straight season. "But we are proud that were playing in the (regional) finals. It was huge for our program to be here."

UAlbany (23-10) posted back-to-back 20-win campaigns for the first time since 1990.

DeNeal, who has a 3.57 GPA in a dual major of criminal justice and psychology, is a nominee for America East Woman of the Year. She shared this year's ECAC Merit Medal with Kate Fontana as the top senior female student-athlete. A native of Muncie, Ind., DeNeal was selected first-team all-conference for the second year in a row. She was voted the 2006 America East Championship's most outstanding player after recording 13 kills and a career-high 37 digs in a come-from-behind victory over UMBC in the final. DeNeal, a senior outside hitter, and the school's all-time digs leader, led the program to its second NCAA appearance in the last three years.

Thomson, a senior attackman from Stoney Creek, Ontario, has a 3.05 GPA in sociology with a minor in business administration. He was selected to the All-America East Conference men's lacrosse squad for the fourth straight season and was one of 17 players on the Tewaaraton Award Watch List. Thomson, who ranks third nationally in goals per game, has 54 goals and 13 assists this season. He is currently first on UAlbany's career scoring list with 242 points (186 goals, 56 assists). The Great Danes won their fourth America East title in the last five years and posted the school's first-ever NCAA Division I win in last Sunday's first-round triumph over Loyola.

Chrobak, a senior cornerback on the UAlbany football team, earned a 3.56 GPA as an undergraduate and is currently enrolled in the school's criminal justice program. He was chosen as his team's top defensive back for the third straight year after making 43 tackles and recording a team-high nine pass break-ups. Chrobak, who totaled 188 tackles, 29 pass break-ups and six interceptions as a collegian, was a member of the 2006 Division I FCS Athletic Directors Academic All-Star Team and received an ECAC Merit Medal as the top senior male student-athlete. UAlbany had a 7-4 record and tied for second in the Northeast Conference standings.


UALBANY'S KELLY OGDEN NAMED SECOND-TEAM ALL-NORTHEAST REGION

MERRICK THOMSON SCORES FIVE GOALS AS UALBANY RECORDS NCAA FIRST-ROUND WIN

Albany, N.Y. – Merrick Thomson scored five goals and added one assist in leading UAlbany to a 19-10 victory over Loyola in the first round of the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Championship before a record-crowd of 2,953 on Sunday afternoon at John Fallon Field. The Great Danes posted their first NCAA win in the program's history and advanced to face Cornell in the quarterfinals on Saturday, May 19 at Princeton Stadium.

UAlbany (15-2) leaped to a 3-0 lead in the opening four minutes of play. Derek Dale finished off a crossing pass from Jordan Levine following a Loyola miscue. Mike Ammann, a junior midfielder, then scored back-to-back goals. He drove from the left and placed a hard shot inside the far post, before advancing from the right side where he went one-on-one with goalkeeper Alex Peaty.

The Great Danes, who were hosting a NCAA Tournament game for the first time as the championship's No. 5 seed, moved out to an 8-2 lead with 4:32 left in the second period. Matthew Green scored unassisted when drove in from the left point and ripped a shot into the top right corner to fuel a three-goal run. Goalkeeper Brett Queener, who made eight saves, stopped two shots that led to a pair of fastbreak opportunities. Dale cleaned up on a left-to-right crossing pass from Thomson, before Levine went all the way from the midfield line and switched to his left hand for a six-goal margin.

UAlbany increased its advantage in the third quarter to 13-4 with another three-goal outburst. Thomson, a senior attacker, started that stretch by scoring in transition after a turnover. Levine, who tied a career-best with five points, then split two defenders en route to the cage. Thomson, who had five-plus points for the 25th time in his career, used a two-man advantage situation to find the net from right of the crease.

Loyola (7-6) ended the third stanza by ripping off three unanswered in a 46-second span. Greg Leonard scored an extra-man goal before his team won the following face-off. Shane Koppens, who had a pair of goals, finished off that possession to slice the deficit to 13-7. But the Great Danes put the game away in the final quarter by netting six of the game's next seven goals. Thomson scored twice in that stretch, and Frank Resetarits and Eric Wolf combined on two other scoring plays.

"We were very prepared," said UAlbany coach Scott Marr, whose program had lost their previous three NCAA opening-round games. "We've been waiting a long time for this after missing the playoffs last year. We go into every game anticipating Frank (Resetarits) and Merrick (Thomson) will be shut off, or some special defense will be on them. That's what happened today. When Frank and Merrick don't get their looks, it just opens things up for everyone else."

UAlbany showed its balance with eleven players reaching the scoring column. Resetarits, a Tewaaraton Trophy finalist, finished with two goals and two assists, while Corey Small and Wolf each scored twice and had an assist. Paul Richards and Andrew Spack had two goals apiece for the Greyhounds, who made the NCAA field for the first time since 2001.

"I really felt like we had to match their energy," explained Loyola coach Charlie Toomey, whose team finished second in the ECAC standings behind Georgetown. "They didn't let us back in, they stayed on top of us today. They had an answer for everything. Albany got some good looks at the goal; they proved they can score with their weak hands."

Burns, who set a school record in qualifying, posted a time of 1:50.13. Burnett finished third in the 400-meter dash, as he crossed the line in 47.65 seconds.

In the 24th annual ECAC competition, Sarah Charles finished fourth in the triple jump with a leap of 40-feet, 10.25-inches. Jessica Ortman took sixth place in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:13.10.

UALBANY BASEBALL TAKES SERIES FINALE FROM UMBC, 14-8

Albany, N.Y. – Steve Wyland went 4-for-4 with two home runs to lead UAlbany to a 14-8 victory over America East Conference rival UMBC on Sunday afternoon at Varsity Field. Wyland also had one double, one triple and five RBI in the game, which took place on Senior Day.

UAlbany started the game strong, as centerfielder Dave West led off with a triple in the first inning. He was driven in by right fielder Leo Corvino (Columbia) who followed with a double. Corvino later crossed home plate on a sacrifice fly by Wyland, for his first RBI of the game.

Wyland also drove Corvino in the third inning, as he hit his first long ball of the day to give the Great Danes a 4-0 lead in the bottom of the frame.

UAlbany (23-25, AE 10-10) extended its lead with a five-run fourth inning, paced by back-to-back singles by Sean Donovan and Mike Konstanty. The Great Danes got their third run of the inning as Wood scored on a wild pitch by UMBC hurler Bo Sauter. Corvino recorded a sacrifice fly to score Barbato, while Wyland hit a double to drive in West for the final run of the frame.

UMBC (12-36, AE 3-17) posted two runs in the following inning, but UAlbany tacked on another run in the bottom of the frame to hold a 9-2 advantage. After allowing the Retrievers to score twice in the top of the sixth, the Great Danes recorded four runs in their half of the inning, paced by back-to-back homers by Wyland and catcher Tom Hill. Konstanty added a two-run shot of his own in the inning, giving UAlbany a 14-4 lead.

The Retrievers would score three runs in the top of the seventh, and add on one more in the eighth, but reliever Sean Gregory would sit down the final three batters in order in the ninth to preserve the win for the Great Danes.

UAlbany starter Cory Warrings produced five strikeouts in five innings of work to earn the win for UAlbany. Matthew Herrick tossed 1.2 innings of relief, fanning two. Sauter picked up the loss for UMBC, striking out three and allowing 10 runs off 11 hits. All nine of UAlbany's starters finished with at least one hit.

First baseman Steve Gale finished with two runs scored and two RBI off two hits for UMBC. Designated hitter Will Delawter also finished with two RBI.

The Great Danes will host Le Moyne in a non-conference doubleheader on Tuesday starting at 2 p.m. before heading to Vermont for the final regular-season conference series on Friday. -agate-

UALBANY CAPTURES THIRD CONSECUTIVE AMERICA EAST CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP

Boston, Mass. – Sophomore shortstop Meagan Butsch singled in the go-ahead run in the fifth inning to lead UAlbany to a 6-4 victory over UMBC in the America East Conference championship game on Saturday afternoon at BU Softball Field. The Great Danes, who earned an automatic NCAA Tournament berth, became just the second program in conference history to capture three consecutive league crowns.

UMBC (32-18) took a 4-3 lead in the top of the fifth after UAlbany pitcher Casey Halloran (Columbia) walked the bases loaded with one out. The Retrievers' Krissy Licursi then lined a ground ball to infielder Kelly Ogden who stepped on third base to get a force out. However, Ogden threw wide to home plate attempting to get lead-runner Kali Shirk. Ashley Gray then came around to score from first base with the second run of the inning when UAlbany catcher Kat Smith committed another error while trying to gun her down at third as she advanced on Odgen's miscue.

UAlbany (33-15) went back ahead in the bottom of the frame. Amber Maisonet and Michelle Connors (Shenendehowa) each walked and were aboard with two outs. Ogden, a senior third baseman, then singled on a 1-2 pitch the other way to right field to tie the contest. Butsch followed with a single through the hole on the left side to drive Connors across for a 5-4 advantage.

The Great Danes added an insurance run in the sixth. Laura Gremillion walked and was then lifted for pinch-runner Shane Pais, who moved up to second base on a groundout. Maisonet, who went 3-for-3 at the plate, then smacked a RBI single to right field. Halloran, who was in and out of trouble throughout the game, retired the first two batters she faced in the seventh, but then Gray singled and Licursi was hit by a pitch. However, Halloran came back to strike out Carla O'Rourke swinging on a 3-2 count to end the contest.

"I made a mental error on that fielding play," offered Ogden, whose team reached the conference championship final for the fourth time in the last five years. "But I knew my experience would get me through it. She had been throwing outside to me (with her pitches) and I was able to take it to right field. I was focused and it was a great feeling to pick up my teammates."

The Retrievers, who got to the championship game for the first time when they rallied for a 3-2 win over Hartford earlier in the day on Licursi's walk-off homer, grabbed a 2-0 lead in the first. First baseman Amanda Fefel belted her 13th home run of the season, a two-run blast with two outs, over the left-field fence. UAlbany rallied in the bottom of the inning when Butsch, who had four RBI, drilled a three-run homer to dead center, her seventh of the year.

"We answered back all day," said UAlbany coach Chris Cannata, whose team was seeded fourth and narrowly made the championship field on the last weekend of the regular season. "They were coming off an emotional high from winning that early game and we knew we had to keep it close. Casey (Halloran) didn't have great stuff, but UMBC has great hitters and she got them out when she needed. It was so hard to win that second championship last year, but this is very satisfying."

Halloran, the championship's most outstanding player with two tournament wins, improved to 18-9 by fanning 10 and walking six. She recorded double-figure strikeouts for the fifth time this season. UMBC's Gray fell to 13-9 overall. The right-hander struck out three and walked three, plus went 2-for-3 at the plate. UAlbany's Leah McIntosh, Ogden, Maisonet and Butsch joined Halloran on the all-championship squad. The NCAA field will be announced on Sunday at 3:00 p.m. -agate-

UALBANY REACHES AMERICA EAST CONFERENCE SOFTBALL FINAL WITH 2-0 VICTORY

Boston, Mass. – Freshman Leah McIntosh fired a two-hit shutout in leading UAlbany to a 2-0 victory over UMBC in the second round of the America East Conference Tournament on Friday afternoon at BU Softball Field. The Great Danes advanced to Saturday's championship, scheduled for 12 noon, in this double-elimination event.

"That play by Amber (Maisonet) changed the tone of the game," said UAlbany coach Chris Cannata, whose program will now play for its third consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament. "It's been a roller-coaster season with all these freshmen. We have had to play the last three weeks like it was the playoffs. Now that we are here, we seem relaxed and are playing with composure."

McIntosh, who improved to 10-5 on the season, upped her consecutive inning scoreless streak to 17 straight. The right-hander struck out six and walked one against UMBC (31-17), a club that was averaging 5.5 runs prior to the contest and had swept the three-game regular-season series with the Great Danes. Ashley Gray was the tough-luck loser, as she scattered five hits and registered three strikeouts in a complete-game effort.

"I think we are in a position where we have been playing like there's nothing to lose," explained Ogden, a senior who drove in the game-winning run by swinging at the first pitch she saw that was up in the strike zone. "We have a couple of veterans and lot of freshmen who have stepped it up. In the first inning, the team's confidence grew with some great defensive plays." -agate-







UALBANY ATHLETES EARN HONORS AT SEVENTH ANNUAL GREAT DANE AWARDS

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany Vice President and Director of Athletics Lee McElroy presented Ashley DeNeal, Kate Fontana and Ryan Chrobak with ECAC Merit Medals on Monday evening at the seventh annual Great Dane Awards, held at SEFCU Arena on campus. The event celebrates UAlbany Athletics in the 2006-07 academic year. Presidential Scholar-Athlete Awards were given to Stephan Hall and Alyssa Lotmore. Each of the 19 intercollegiate men's and women's teams handed out their most valuable player awards.


DeNeal, a senior outside hitter on the women's volleyball team, has a 3.57 cumulative grade point average in a dual major of criminal justice and psychology. DeNeal was named the 2006 America East Conference Championship's Most Outstanding Player after leading the Great Danes to a five-game, come-from-behind victory over UMBC in the tournament championship. DeNeal, a first-team all-conference selection for the second year in a row, led the program to a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances during her career.

Fontana, a senior midfielder on the women's lacrosse squad, has a 3.72 GPA in criminal justice. She is the first player in the program's history to be chosen to the All-America East Conference team in four consecutive years, including three first-team selections. Fontana had 38 goals and eight assists for the Great Danes, who made their first-ever appearance in the conference championship game. She finishes her career as the school's all-time scorer with 156 goals and 36 assists for 192 points.

Chrobak, who had a 3.56 GPA as an undergraduate, is currently enrolled in UAlbany's criminal justice program. He was voted the football program's top defensive back for the third straight year after making 43 tackles and recording a team-high nine pass break-ups. UAlbany posted a 7-4 record and finished second in the Northeast Conference standings. Chrobak, who had 188 tackles, 29 pass break-ups and six interceptions as a collegian, was voted to the 2006 Division I FCS Athletic Directors Academic All-Star Team.

Hall, who is pursuing a master's degree in information technology systems, was a two-time All-America East Conference midfielder in men's soccer. He started 74 career matches and totaled 10 goals and 15 assists. Hall was named to the ESPN The Magazine University Division Men's Soccer Academic All-America national first team for the second consecutive year. He earned his B.S. in urban planning last May with a 3.98 cumulative GPA and received the Chancellor's Scholar-Athlete Award.

Lotmore, a senior distance runner on the women's track and field and cross country teams, has a 3.85 GPA in social welfare. Lotmore won two events at the 2007 America East Conference Indoor Track & Field Championships by finishing first in the 3,000- and 5,000-meter runs. She posted a season-best time of 9:51.40 in the 3,000 and was first across the line in the 5,000 by nearly 24 seconds. Lotmore was named to the America East indoor track all-academic team.

UALBANY WINS MEN'S & WOMEN'S AMERICA EAST TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Baltimore, Md. – Joe Greene was named the championship's most outstanding performer as UAlbany captured its fourth America East Conference men's track and field championship in the last five years on Sunday afternoon at UMBC Stadium Complex. The Great Danes also won the women's championship for the second consecutive year.

Greene, a sophomore, placed first in the 400-meter dash and 400-hurdles for the second year in a row, plus was a member of the winning 4x400 relay, as the Great Danes set a meet record with 268 points. UAlbany held the previous standard with 230 points in 2003. Greene sprinted the 400-dash in a school and championship record of 47.09 seconds. He posted a 400-hurdles' time of 52.95 seconds.

Junior Burnett earned the Coaches' Award by scoring 23 points, as he won the 100-meter dash and was a member of two winning relays. Burnett crossed the finish line in the 100 with a time of 10.90 seconds. He ran the second leg on the 4x100 relay that was clocked in 41.37. Burnett teamed with Weider, Greene and Gered Burns (Guilderland) to set a meet record in the 4x400 relay of 3:10.85.

Burns was among six individual men's champions on the day, as he took the 800-meter crown in 1:50.15. Pat Weider was first in the 200-dash (21.76) and ran the lead-off leg on both winning relays. Freddie Wills won the triple jump with a leap of 46-feet, 10-inches. Renauld Buck was second in the shot put (48-2.50) and David Parker (Niskayuna) finished third in the decathlon with 5,830 points.

UAlbany recorded its second straight women's track title by scoring 162 points. The Great Danes, who were in fourth place in the standings after the first day, edged New Hampshire for the crown. Jessica Ortman captured her second consecutive 1,500-meter championship with a time of 4:29.65. Ortman, a sophomore, also had a pair of second-place showings in the 800-meters and 3,000m steeplechase. Adanna Andrews held on against her teammate to win the 800 in 2:11.28. Brenna Militello won the high jump with a mark 5-feet, 7-inches after finishing fifth last year.

The Great Danes showed balance with five athletes taking second in their respective events. Anisha Andrews posted a time of 56.76 in the 400-dash and was six-hundredths of a second behind champion Keisha Short of Binghamton. Kamilah McShine (100-hurdles), Sarah Charles (triple jump), Ritshell Verdier (discus) and Valerie Maignan (heptathlon) were also second.

BOSTON U. WINS THIRD CONSECUTIVE AMERICA EAST TITLE IN VICTORY OVER UALBANY

Stony Brook, N.Y. – Lauren Morton scored four of her five goals in the opening half in leading Boston University to a 17-9 victory over UAlbany in the America East Conference women's lacrosse championship on Sunday afternoon at Stony Brook's LaValle Stadium. The Terriers, who won their third consecutive conference crown, earned an automatic NCAA berth.

Boston U. (13-5) ran off six unanswered goals to take an 8-1 lead with 4:36 remaining in the first half. Morton, a junior attacker, scored three times in that stretch. She drilled a sidearm shot over top of a defensive double-team for a five-goal advantage. After freshman midfielder McKinley Curro drove from behind the cage to find the net, Morton ended that run by converting a free-position attempt.

In the women's competition, Gurrant won the long jump with a leap of 18-feet,3-inches. Jessica Ortman was second in the 3,000-meter steeplechase with a time of 10:56.65. Ashley Lewis finished fifth with a javelin throw of 105-feet, 2-inches. Valerie Maignan is in second place after day one of the heptathlon with a score of 2,385, just 130 points behind Binghamton's Marsha Fiesinger.

UALBANY WINS AMERICA EAST LACROSSE CHAMPIONSHIP IN 15-14 VICTORY OVER UMBC

Albany, N.Y. – Frank Resetarits totaled six goals and two assists as UAlbany held off UMBC, 15-14, to capture the America East Conference men's lacrosse championship before 1,293 fans on Saturday afternoon at John Fallon Field. The Great Danes, who earned an automatic NCAA Tournament berth, have won four of the last five conference tournament titles.

UAlbany (14-2) built a 13-8 lead by scoring three straight times in a one-minute-and-24-second-span late in the third quarter. Merrick Thomson, the championship's most outstanding player, found the net off a rebound when UMBC goalkeeper Jeremy Blevins saved Corey Small's initial attempt. Jordan Levine won the following face-off and found Frank Resetarits in the front of the goal 11 seconds later. Matthew Green tallied the second of his two goals when he drove from the left point and rifled a shot into the far top corner.

UMBC (10-5) rallied in the fourth quarter with five of the game's next six goals. P.J. Kimener, who scored three times, drilled a bounce shot inside the right post to close the gap to 14-11 with 9:33 remaining. Freshman Cayle Ratcliffe then converted from the top of the crease off Drew Westervelt's past from behind. Alex Hopmann, who totaled three goals and one assist, cut the margin to one with 5:21 to play when he finished off a series of three shot attempts at the UAlbany cage.

The Great Danes, who dropped a 19-10 decision to UMBC in last year's championship final, came back 13 seconds later. Levine, a junior midfielder who tied a career-high with 11 ground balls, won the subsequent face-off when he saved a rolling ball from going out of bounds. Chris Schongar, a sophomore long-stick midfielder, collected the ball in mid-air and connected on a bounce shot into the lower right corner for a 15-13 advantage.

The Retrievers, ranked No. 13 in both national polls, would slice the deficit in half one more time as Hopmann connected again from the right side off a pass from behind by midfielder Terry Kimener with 1:11 left. After UMBC picked up a slashing penalty, the Great Danes were poised to run out the clock. But a defensive double-team caused a turnover and the Retrievers' Kelvin Moulden raced the length of the field into the offensive box. However, Moulden lost control of the ball and UAlbany midfielder Mike Ammann, who had a career-high five assists, picked up the ground ball to seal the outcome.

"I wanted to go to Merrick (Thomson)," Schongar explained. "But they pressed out on him and the defense parted like the Red Sea. At that point I decided to go for the goal with a low bounce shot. Dan Barnes did a great job on the face-offs. If you dominate the face-offs, you have a good chance to win. We didn't dominate on the scoreboard, but we won the game."

UAlbany reversed an early 2-1 deficit with five unanswered goals. Resetarits, who tied a career-high point total, ended that run with back-to-back goals. The Great Danes, who are No. 11 in the latest USILA rankings, led by four on two occasions in the second quarter before settling for an 8-5 halftime lead.

"I don't think we let this one slip away," said UMBC coach Don Zimmerman, whose team had its six-game winning streak halted. "They're a great team. We didn't play a great first half, but we came back in the fourth quarter."

The Retrievers' Andy Gallagher had two goals and one assist, while Kyle Wimer and Ratcliffe each scored twice. Goalkeeper Jeremy Blevins made 15 saves. UAlbany's Brett Queener turned aside 12 shots, including Gallagher's point-blank attempt with just over four minutes remaining.

"We have worked to get back to this point since last May", said UAlbany coach Scott Marr, whose program has made three previous NCAA appearances. "We knew UMBC wouldn't go away in that fourth quarter, but I didn't think it would be that tough. I thought we concentrated on each possession the last five minutes. Brett (Queener) came up with a huge save (on Gallagher) and our team made the plays when they had to." -agate-

UALBANY UPSETS TOP-SEED STONY BROOK IN AMERICA EAST SEMIFINAL ROUND

Stony Brook, N.Y. – Sarah Spillett scored four goals, including two in each half, as UAlbany rallied in the final period for a 10-7 upset victory over top-seed Stony Brook in the semifinal round of the America East Conference Tournament on Friday evening at LaValle Stadium. The Great Danes, who advance to the championship for the first time in the program's history, will play for the title and an NCAA berth on Sunday at 1:00 p.m. Boston University upended New Hampshire, 16-4, in the other semifinal contest.

Stony Brook (13-4) led 6-4 midway through the second half. But the Great Danes, as the fourth seed, responded with three goals in a two-minute-and-two-second stretch to go in front. Spillett, a senior who tied a career-high goal total, ignited that run when she converted a free-position attempt from the right side. Freshman Christine Grueniger, who had three goals, then found the net in transition after Kate Fontana scooped up a turnover in the Seawolves' midfield and started the break. Kayla Best (Guilderland) gave her team a 7-6 lead fifteen seconds later when she sent a right-handed shot to the left of goalkeeper Jen Sandtorv.

UAlbany (8-8) would score three more times over the next eight minutes. Best, a freshman midfielder, changed direction and place a low shot into the cage. Rory Redmond connected when she finished off Jane Bush's feed while cutting to the top of crease. Spillett pushed the margin to 10-6 with 5:38 remaining when she drilled a sidearm shot in a free-position situation. Goalkeeper Jen Daly, who made nine saves, was also instrumental during this decisive three-goal stretch, as she twice stopped free-position attempts by SBU's Kimberly Quartier and Leggio.

"We were too emotional and got frustrated at one point in the second half," said UAlbany coach Lindsey Hart, whose team suffered a 17-13 setback on this same field during the regular season on April 21. "(Sarah) Spillett and (Jen) Daly came up huge. They have been here for four years and they believed they could do this. We slowed their fastbreak and made some big stops defensively."

The Great Danes, who had lost their previous three America East postseason games and did not make the field one year ago, leaped to a 3-0 lead in the opening eight minutes as Grueniger scored a pair of goals. The Seawolves, who had won 10 of their last 12 contests to earn a share of the conference's regular-season title, regrouped with five unanswered. Leggio, the America East player of the year, netted two of her three goals in that outburst.

"We went to the goal and played with confidence," explained Spillett, a first-team all-conference attacker. "When we beat UMBC last week to get into the tournament, we started to see the results of everything that we had worked hard for. The seniors realized that there was no more perfect time to come together."

UALBANY ADVANCES TO AMERICA EAST LACROSSE CHAMPIONSHIP WITH 17-5 VICTORY

Albany, N.Y. – Merrick Thomson scored a season-high seven goals, including five in the first half, to lead UAlbany to a 17-5 victory over Stony Brook in the semifinal round of the America East Conference Tournament on Thursday evening before 1,288 fans at John Fallon Field. The Great Danes advanced to the Saturday's championship. UMBC defeated Binghamton, 11-7, in the other semifinal contest.

UAlbany (13-2) used a run of nine unanswered goals to erase an early 1-0 deficit. The Great Danes scored five times in a five-minute-and-40-second span of the first quarter to go ahead. Frank Resetarits buried a shot from the right side before Thomson connected with the man-advantage. Corey Small, who totaled three goals and two assists, found the net off a rebound when SBU goalkeeper Brendan Callahan stopped Thomson from point-blank range. Thomson completed that outburst when he netted Derek Dale's crossing pass.

The Great Danes, who will play in their sixth consecutive America East championship final, would push their margin to 9-1 midway through the second period. Small, a sophomore attacker, scored twice in that stretch, including a drive from the right side that he finished off with his left hand by placing a shot inside the left post. Dale ended that decisive run by hitting a bounce shot after Thomson came up a ground ball to keep the play alive.

Thomson, who posted the second-highest point total of his career, added an extra-man goal in the third period. He gave his team a 14-5 lead with 9:11 left when he scored from the top of the crease off Small's feed from the right.

"We were ready to play," said Thomson, who last scored seven goals against Binghamton on April 9, 2005. "We wanted to put the two losses we had in the last part of the season behind us. The conference tournament is a new season and the seniors do not want to go out without a championship."

Owen Adams, a junior midfielder, finished with three goals for Stony Brook (8-5), the tournament's fourth seed. Larry Cerasi and Ryan Hughes added the other goals, while Callahan had 11 of his 15 saves in the opening half.

"UAlbany is bigger, faster, and stronger (than us) right now," explained Seawolves coach Rick Sowell, whose team suffered a 14-5 setback to the Great Danes during the regular season. "They're pretty darn good – good seniors, good coaching. I give UAlbany all the praise, they played well very tonight."

UAlbany's Resetarits finished with a pair of goals to extend his consecutive game scoring streak to 46 straight. Dale added one goal and two assists as 11 Great Danes reached the scoring column. Brett Queener, who made his first start in goal since April 20 after injuring his ankle, made eight saves and had two assists as an attacker on the extra-man unit.

Both teams feel they have been the best two in the conference throughout the year."

UALBANY HAS FIVE ON AMERICA EAST ALL-CONFERENCE WOMEN'S LACROSSE TEAM

Stony Brook, N.Y. – University at Albany's Kate Fontana leads a group of five players who have been selected to the 2007 America East All-Conference Women's Lacrosse Team, as announced this evening at the championship tournament banquet. Katelyn Primomo (Bethlehem Central) and Sarah Spillett joined Fontana on the all-conference first team.


Fontana, a senior midfielder, becomes the first UAlbany player to be voted to the all-conference squad for the fourth consecutive season. She is making her third straight appearance on the first team after leading the Great Danes in scoring with 35 goals and eight assists. Fontana, who netted three or more goals against eight opponents this season, ranks fifth among the NCAA Division I leaders in caused turnovers (2.6 pg) and averages 2.67 ground balls per game. She became the school's all-time scoring leader on April 28, and ranks 15th in goals (153) and 20th in points (189) among active NCAA career scorers.

Spillett is a member of this year's America East first team after earning a spot on the second-team unit the previous two seasons. The senior attacker totaled 20 goals and six assists. Spillett is sixth among the program's all-time scorers with 137 points (85 goals, 62 assists). Primomo, a senior defender, was chosen to the first team for the second straight year. She totaled five goals, two assists, eight caused turnovers and 25 ground balls as a 15-game starter.

Kayla Best (Guilderland) and goalkeeper Jen Daly were selected to the All-America East second team. Best, who was also picked to the all-rookie squad as one of the league's top freshmen, was second on the UAlbany team in scoring with 27 goals and nine assists. She enters the postseason with an 11-game scoring streak, including four points in the regular-season finale against UMBC. Daly, a senior who is the school's all-time saves leader with 652, posted a 10.89 goals against average and a .447 save percentage. She has made 66 consecutive starts in the cage.

Freshman Christine Grueniger, along with Best, is on the conference's all-rookie team. Grueniger accounted for 24 goals and three assists and produced seven multi-point games this season. In addition, Daly, Fontana, Primomo and Spillett were named to the America East women's lacrosse all-academic team. Each student-athlete has a 3.4 cumulative grade point average or better.

UAlbany begins America East postseason play on Friday, May 4. The Great Danes meet Stony Brook in the semifinal round at 7:00 p.m. The winner advances to the championship on Sunday at 1:00 p.m.

UALBANY PLACES TEN PLAYERS ON ALL-AMERICA EAST MEN'S LACROSSE TEAM Frank Resetarits and Scott Marr Voted Major Awards by League's Coaches

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany's Frank Resetarits leads a group of 10 players who were voted to the 2007 America East All-Conference Men's Lacrosse Team, as announced this evening by the conference office at the tournament championship banquet. Resetarits was chosen the America East Player of the Year, while Scott Marr was named Coach of the Year.

Resetarits, a senior attacker, leads the nation in goals and scoring with 65 points on 46 goals and 19 assists. He becomes the first Great Dane since Luke Daquino in 2003 to be picked as the conference's top player. A native of Hamburg, N.Y., he has netted four or more goals against seven opponents this season. Resetarits, who makes his third consecutive appearance on the all-league first team, leads all NCAA Division I scorers with 227 career points (148 goals, 79 assists). His 45-game scoring streak is the second-longest nationally.

Merrick Thomson (Albany Academy) is a member of the all-conference squad for the fourth consecutive year. Thomson, a senior attacker from Stoney Creek, Ontario, has 39 goals and 10 assists entering postseason play. He scored five goals on three occasions this season. Thomson is third on the school's all-time scoring list with 224 points (171 goals, 53 assists).

Jordan Levine, Brett Queener and Craig McDonald joined Resetarits and Thomson on the all-conference first team. Levine and Queener are on the first unit for the second straight year. Levine, a junior midfielder, has accounted for 18 goals, 12 assists and a team-leading 59 ground balls. Queener, who is in his second season as the program's starting goalkeeper, has a 9.34 goals against average and a .514 save percentage. He also plays on the extra-man grouping as an attacker. McDonald, a junior defenseman who was a second-team selection in 2006, has 41 ground balls with a pair of goals.

Steve Ammann, Mike Ammann, Derek Dale, Garrett Pedley and Tom Trapani were each named to the All-America East second team. Dale, a junior attacker, is third on the team in scoring with 17 goals and 16 assists. Mike Ammann (9 goals, 14 assists) and Steve Ammann (11 goals, 7 assists) have been productive as junior midfielders. Trapani, a senior, and Pedley, a sophomore, are starters on defense that is allowing 9.21 goals per game.

In addition, Thomson, Pedley and the Ammann brothers earned a spot on the America East men's lacrosse all-academic team. Freshman Kyle Brunk was selected to the all-rookie squad.

UAlbany's Marr receives the conference's top coaching award for the second time. Marr, who also was tabbed in 2002, led the Great Danes to a share of the America East regular-season crown. UAlbany established school records for most wins in a season (12) and the program's all-time mark for consecutive victories (11), breaking a standard that had stood since 1972. The Great Danes have won 10 or more games in four of the last five seasons and made three NCAA appearances.

GREENE, MCCADNEY, AND GURRANT EARN TRACK & FIELD WEEKLY AWARDS

Centerville, Mass. -- University at Albany's Joe Greene has been chosen the ECAC Track Athlete of the Week, while Mike McCadney earned the same award for field events. Jenn Gurrant was named the conference's women's field performer of the week. Greene and Gurrant also received America East Conference weekly awards.

Greene posted a season-best time of 51.27 seconds to finish second in the men's championship 400-meter hurdles at the Penn Relays. He lowered his NCAA-qualifying time with the effort, and was just behind South Carolina's Jussi Heikkila (51.06). A day later, Greene anchored the sprint medley relay that set a school record and placed second. The relay finished right behind champion Florida State with a time of 3:17.09, more than four seconds better than the previous UAlbany standard. Greene ran sub-47 seconds on the 400m leg in leading the team to the fastest finish by an IC4A squad.

McCadney finished second in the men's college triple jump with a wind-aided distance of 50-feet, 9.25-inches at the Penn Relays. He lowered his NCAA-qualifying mark with the performance. St. Augustine's Andre Tillman won the event with a leap of 51-3.75.

Gurrant posted a personal-best mark of 19-feet and 0.25-inches to finish seventh in the women's eastern long jump at Penn Relays. Gurrant's leap placed her in the ECAC championship field. She also represented the Great Danes in the triple jump, placing 15th with a leap of 36-feet and 5.5-inches.

UALBANY'S STEVE SAYRE NAMED ECAC BASEBALL PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Centerville, Mass. – UAlbany first baseman Steve Sayre (Columbia) has been selected as ECAC Player of the Week in baseball. He was tabbed as the America East Conference player of the week on Monday.

Sayre hit .571 in last weekend's four-game conference series with Maine. The senior recorded eight hits, including three home runs, scored six runs and drove in another six to lead the Great Danes to three wins against the Black Bears. Neff was a three-year varsity letterwinner at Lehighton, where her team won four consecutive conference titles and two district crowns. She was an All-Mountain Valley Conference honorable mention as well as an all-state honorable mention for the Indians. Neff, who also played soccer during her high school career, was a Majestyx Field Hockey Club member. Hough was a four-year varsity starter and senior captain. She was a two-time second-team Mountain Valley Conference all-star and was named to the All-MVC first team as a senior. Hough was also named to the all-state second team and was an all-area honorable mention. Hough, who also played with the Mystic Hockey Club, was a four-year letterwinner in basketball and won three soccer varsity awards.
