The building will be used mainly for education courses in the professional semester but Biology 20 will also be taught there.

Prospective Frat Teams Come in View With Start of Intramural Football Season

Although graduation has cut heavily into the massive Potter line, the backfield has not been touched. Potter's attack will center around veteran quarterback, Don Nolan. The halfback positions will be filled by Harry "The Hands" Millet and Lou Call, and Pete Saverio will be in the tailback position. Owen Davis, All-Star halfback, will not see action until late in the season because of an injury sustained in the first week of practice.

In the line, the returning veterans, Jacquays, Hayes, Gebhardt and Altman, will have their work out for them due to a lack of depth. However the power is there and with any sort of conditioning, it will be another easy year for the blocking backs.

In the end positions Kafka and Dally will be in the starting spots with Costello, Smith and Stewart trying to unseat them.

Kappa Beta hopes to field a team that will be strong both offensively and defensively. Captain Dick True feels that his team should surpass the excellent season it had last year. Veterans Returning: Veterans returning this year include All-Stars Gary Lynch and Joe Gilbert and stalwarts Larry Breen, Sherwin Bowen, John Eckleman and Dick True.

New Speed and Power: New speed and power join the team in Tom Ellis, Dick O'Connor, Joe Burton, Jim Warner and Bob Battaly.

Sophomore Jim Healey has surprised everyone with his excellent punting ability. He is also one of the four candidates trying for the position of quarterback.

Overall it looks like 1959 will be a great one for the Blue and Gold.

Modified Single-Wing

The men of APA will be employing what Pollero terms a modified single-wing attack. The major difference is that the Blue and White will use two blocking backs rather than the usual one.

Big Line

Southgaw Quarterback

Most of the passing chores will be handled by Bob Pollero. Although Bob is left-handed, he is accurate to all points on the field. Bob's receivers will consist of Bruce Bibbins and Jim Dougherty at the end positions and John Modder working from the wing-back slot.

SLS

The SLS football team is looking forward to another fine season. The squad is composed mainly of last year's team which remained undefeated, untied and unscored upon until the last game of the season.

Six players will form the nucleus of this year's team: Gary Lewis—200 pound guard rated as one of the finest linemen in the league.

Ed Vesnoske—195 pound quarterback, consistently one of the school's finest pass throwers. Paul Harris—fleet wingback named unanimously as the All-Star team.

Bob Sischo—elusive end whose fine offensive and defensive play has dominated the league for four years.

Bob Baker last year, leading scorer and possibly the league's finest pass catcher.

Pete Spina—team captain and All-Star end whose fine offensive and defensive play rate him one of the best in the league.

The remainder of the squad consists of Fred Thumhart, last year's fullback; Bill Kelly; Gary Sabin, Bob Vitale, Russ Wheatly, Barry Janason, Ken Herman, Bill Pasquerella and Tom Parker. Much is expected also from Gary Jones, last year's Sayles star, and from John Johnson, one of the fastest men in the school.

APA

This looks like a rebuilding year for APA. Coach Bob Pollero is faced with turning 15 prospects into a winning unit.

Among the potential starters are Dave Colburn, a Rose, New York boy who joined the varsity last year, and Ed Walsh, a Florida transfer who played varsity ball last fall. Both stood out in Wednesday's tilt and should be a big factor in the plans of coach Joe Garcia during the ten game schedule.

Marty Borko and Art Hackett played their usual good games in the backfield and should be starters tomorrow, as should sophomores Franz Zwickbauer and Gerstenberger.

Either Bill Thompson, an all-around athlete of Dick Cox will start in the back as "safety" duties, located by Gus Tillman, a fall are still up for grabs. Prospects from Herb Coslak also may be led as Coslak's performances of late have not gone unnoticed and the sophomore may find himself seeing a fair amount of action tomorrow and in future games.

Another potential starter is Chuck Reverso, winner last spring of the most improved athlete award, whose play both in the Williams game and elsewhere gave notice that he may do place somebody on the starting eleven.

The Peds appear stronger than a year ago when they dropped their first game to FDU by a 4-3 score at Bleecker. They have never beaten the New Jersey squad, having dropped one-point decisions in both 1957, when the rivalry began, and in 1958.

Situations
