Saxton To Be Business Manager; French Is Announced As Managing Editor

News Board Picks Phetteplace To Serve As Associate Managing Editor

Virginia E. Higgins, '28, managing editor of the STATE COLLEGE NEWS is announced today by the News board as editor-in-chief for next year. Katherine Saxton, '28, is elected business manager. William M. French, '29, now desk editor, is elected managing editor. Elizabeth Phetteplace, '28, is chosen associate managing editor. These four will comprise next year's News board which governs the student newspaper.

A total of fifty-three appointments, the largest in the paper's history, is announced. Two desk editors to succeed French, four senior associate editors, ten junior associate editors, fifteen reporters, and seventeen members of the business department are appointed. More than 100 students have tried out for various positions on the News staff this year.

Miss Higgins will succeed Edwin R. Van Kleeck, '27. Helen Zimmerman, '27, is retiring business manager. Sara H. Barkley, '27, is retiring associate managing editor. The present subscription department was merged into the business department and the two assistants in the former subscription department will become assistant business managers in charge of circulation. Thelma Temple, '27, is retiring subscription manager and fifth member of the present News board. Next year's board will have four members who will be

1929 GETS MASCOT TODAY IN ASSEMBLY

Hunt Will Begin Saturday Night; Winning Class To Score Five Points

Mascot hunt will begin Sunday at midnight and end Saturday, May 7. The mascot, a small white lion, about eight inches long and five inches high, will be presented to Thomas P. Fallon, sophomore president, by Marcella Street, senior president, in the first assembly this morning.

The sophomore class will hide the idol sometime before the hunt begins Monday.

The present junior class hid their mascot last year in a chimney in the chemistry laboratory. It was not found by the freshmen. The previous year it was hidden in a davenport in the Green room, but a ruling has been made since then that the mascot may not be put in the executive offices or in a place not accessible to both men and women. It may not be buried in the ground.

If the freshmen find the idol before the time allotted has elapsed, they will present it to a member of Myskania, and five points will be awarded to the class. If it is not found, the sophomore class will automatically receive five points.

JENSEN IS OUT OF PRESIDENTIAL RACE

Says He Indicated His Choice When He Nominated Griffin

LANE DROPS SENIOR RUN

Curtis Also Withdraws From The Senior President And Ped Editor Fights

Richard A. Jensen, president of the junior class, has withdrawn from the race for the presidency of the student association, he announced this week. This leaves five candidates: Francis R. Griffin, vice-president of the student association; Chrissie Curtis, vice-president of the junior class, Ruth Lane, Florence Potter and Edna Wolfe.

Miss Curtis announced that she will not be a candidate for either the position of president of the senior class or editor-in-chief of the Pedagogue. Ruth Lane, '28, candidate for presidency of the Y. W. C. A. opposing Margaret Stoutenberg, '28, and also candidate for the association presidency, also withdrew from the race for the senior class presidency. This leaves only Gilbert E.
