The Executive Committee of the Normal School
met pursuant to a call of the Chairman.

President Waterbury and Architect Wright
were also present by invitation.

Mr. Draper from the special committee appointed
to supervise the sale of the Old School presented the
following report:

To the Executive Committee of the State Normal School:

Your special committee, appointed to super-
vise the sale of the old Normal School property,
beg leave further to report that the entire purchase
price of said property, being the sum of twenty
thousand one hundred and fifty dollars (\$20,150.)
has been paid to the treasurer of the committee by
the purchaser, and that the committee's deed of
conveyance has been delivered to said purchaser;

that out of said purchase money the treasurer has paid the following bills, namely:

To Jacob H. Simmons for his services as auctioneer and for expenses of advertising the sale of the same, one hundred and sixty-two dollars (\$162.).

To Henry D. Harper for repairs upon the property, eighty one dollars and thirty four cents (\$81.35).

To Rotut H. Hir and Rotut Bryce for services in appraising the value of said property the sum of fifteen dollars (\$15.) each.

That the treasurer has paid the balance of said purchase money, being the amount of nineteen thousand, eight hundred seventy six dollars and sixty-four cents (\$19,876.65), into the treasury of the State, as provided by chapter 280 of the Laws of 1885.

That the committee has filed with the Board of Commissioners of the Land Office a statement of the transaction together with the received bills for the payments above mentioned and the receipt of the State treasurer for the amount of the balance of said purchase money, and that the Commissioners of the Land Office have issued, and the Governor has executed, a conveyance of said property, which has also been delivered to the purchaser.

Resolved, that, in as much as Dr. David Munay has been put to much additional labor and care as treasurer in connection with the erection of the New Building and has received no compensation therefor, that he be paid the sum of one fourth ($\frac{1}{4}$) of one per cent of the money disbursed by him for the purposes of said New Building —
The Committee then adjourned.
