JASON MARTIN NAMED AMERICA EAST BASEBALL PLAYER OF THE WEEK Boston, Mass. – University at Albany's Jason Martin has been chosen as the America East Conference Player of the Week in baseball, as announced today by the conference office. Martin, a sophomore catcher, batted .625 with eight RBI in five games last week. Martin, a native of Bloomingburg, N.Y., went 5-for-5, including a homer, and drove in six runs in the nightcap of Sunday's doubleheader with Yale. The Great Danes posted a 14-11 victory in the contest.

Martin, who is hitting .407 on the season after going 10-for-16 at the plate last week, has a 10-game hitting streak. Albany (6-12) begins America East Conference play on April 5-6 with a weekend series at Stony Brook.

FERRUCCI AND HELLER EARN AMERICA EAST WEEKLY LACROSSE AWARDS Boston, Mass. – University at Albany's Maria Ferrucci has been selected as the America East Conference Player of the Week in women's lacrosse, as announced today by the league office. Amanda Heller was voted the conference's Defender of the Week. Ferrucci, a senior attacker, totaled seven goals and one assist in two victories last week. She scored a season-high four goals, as her team rallied for a 12-11 overtime

victory against America East-rival Vermont on March 27. Ferrucci also scored three times and assisted on another in an 18-5 non-conference win over Siena. She ranks eighth among the conference scoring leaders at 2.71 points per game.

Heller, a senior, recorded her first victories as a collegiate goalkeeper after moving from defense in mid-March. She totaled a season-high nine saves against Vermont, and stopped a free-position shot to preserve her team's lead in overtime. Heller also turned aside eight shots and allowed four goals against Siena. She lowered her goals against average to 12.71 on the season.

BASEBALL SPLITS SUNDAY'S NON-CONFERENCE DOUBLEHEADER AT YALE New Haven, Conn. – Jason Martin totaled five hits, including a homer, and drove in six runs in the nightcap, as Albany split a non-conference doubleheader with Yale on Sunday afternoon at Yale Field. The Great Danes won the second contest, 14-11, but lost the opener, 6-3.

Albany (6-12) built an 11-4 lead with a five-run fifth inning, as Martin keyed the frame with a two-run single to right field. Yale (8-9) rallied by scoring six times in the bottom of the inning. Josh Zabar belted a two-run homer, before Dave Fortenbaugh added a two-run double.

The Great Danes upped their advantage to 14-10 with a three-run seventh. Kurt Zimniewicz had an RBI single, while Derek DeGrazio lined a run-scoring double. Yale brought the tying run to the plate with one out in its last at-bat, but Albany reliever Mike Mueller recorded a strikeout and got Zabar to fly out to left field to end the game. In the first contest, Albany carried a 2-0 lead into the middle innings. Brendan Chiavaro scored Joe Lamb, who had tripled, with a sacrifice fly in the first, while Zimniewicz plated a run in third with another fly ball. The Bulldogs came back to tie the contest at two apiece in the fifth on passed ball and Randy Leonard's sacrifice fly to center field. The Bulldogs took the lead with a four-run sixth. Designated hitter John Janco drilled a two-run double into the right-field gap to put his team ahead. Steven Duke scored on a wild pitch, before Zabar delivered a RBI single. The Great Danes won the second game, 7-5, but dropped the opening contest, 4-3.

Nick Ragone (Christian Brothers Academy), who had a pair of hits, doubled to lead off the top of the 11th and then was sacrificed over to third by Fred Estes. After Craig Farley walked, Vallone tripled to the gap to put Albany ahead.

Right-hander Shawn Ryan (Stillwater Central) pitched the final 3.2 innings, allowing no runs and two hits to pick up his first victory of the year. COVERT QUALIFIES FOR NCAA EAST REGIONAL AT RALEIGH RELAYS Raleigh, N.C. – University at Albany's **Teresa Covert** finished second in the 100-meter high hurdles and qualified for NCAA East Regional in May to highlight her team's performance at Adidas Raleigh Relays on Saturday at North Carolina State's Paul H. Derr Track. More than 3,000 athletes representing approximately 110 teams competed at the two-day meet.

Covert sprinted 13.66 seconds to finish behind Donica Merriman, of UNA-Adidas, by 26-hundredths of a second. Pittsburgh's Tamara McGill was third in 13.76. Covert, a senior who placed 20th in the long jump, also qualified for the ECAC championships in the 100-hurdles.

America East Conference indoor champion **Kristof Molnar** was eighth in the 800meter invitational run with a time of 1:52.77, while **Naron Stewart** tied for fifth in the high jump, at 6-feet, 7.50-inches. The Great Danes were ninth in the women's 4x800 relay, and qualified for ECACs. Dinnah Decatus, Erin Goddard, Diane Matthews and Zerlinda Martinez posted a time of 9:13.50. **Joel Vazquez** (Amsterdam) was 19th in the 400-meter hurdles in 53.93 seconds, while **Jennifer Aubin** (Saratoga Springs) took 22nd in the triple jump with a mark of 37feet, 7.25-inches.


JILLIAN SHERMAN WINS LONG JUMP AT WEST POINT INVITATIONAL



UALBANY FOOTBALL BEGINS SPRING PRACTICE ON SATURDAY, MARCH 29 Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany head football coach **Bob Ford** will have 39 returning lettermen, including 15 starters, available, when the Great Danes begin spring football practice this weekend. The first practice is slated for Saturday, March 29 at 9:30 a.m. on the Western Avenue fields. The 15-session schedule continues through Friday, May 2.

Albany captured its first-ever Northeast Conference championship in 2002, plus won the ECAC Division I-AA Classic with a 24-0 victory over Duquesne. The Great Danes, who finished with an 8-4 record, have eight starters returning on offense and seven on defense.

"Every spring you are looking to fill positions vacated by graduation and evaluate the younger people in your program," said Ford, who was voted last year's NEC coach of the year and has a 194-137-1 career record in 34 seasons at the collegiate level. "We need to evaluate our quarterback situation on offense, in terms of a starter and depth, and identify a starting linebacker, free safety and roverback on defense. We also lost an all-conference punter, so we

will be taking a long look at the kickers and special teams."

All-America tailback **Gary Jones** (Ravena-Coyemans-Selkirk) leads the list of returning players on offense. Jones, the NEC offensive player of the year, rushed for 1,509 yards, scored 23 touchdowns, and established nine school single-season records. He will work with a veteran offensive line that includes first-team all-conference tackles **Geir Gudmundsen** (6-6, 310) and **Mike Laroche** (Queensbury H.S., 6-4, 270). Flanker **Matt Crudo** (LaSalle Institute) is the top returning receiver with 37 receptions for 478 yards and five touchdowns, while fullback **Jon George** (Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake) rushed for 642 yards and four TDs. Crudo and George both earned second-team all-league honors.

Ford and his staff will have to replace All-NEC quarterback Ryan Roeder, who passed for 1,366 yards and accounted for 16 touchdowns as a thrower and runner. Justin Kozlowski (6-2, 205) and Anthony Sciarra (6-1, 198) saw limited action in a back-up role last season. Nicholas Bazan (6-0, 190) split time between quarterback and split end, while Colgate transfer Uli Delgado (Gloversville), a 6-foot-1, 208-pound athlete, will also be in the mix. Albany has a strong defensive line returning with second-team all-conference defensive tackle David Parks (6-0, 265) and local scholastic standouts John Bolt (Watervliet) and Matt

Kryzak (Albany Academy). Parks totaled 31 tackles and 5.5 sacks for a unit that ranked fifth nationally among Division I-AA teams in rushing defense at 92.3 yards per game. Bolt, a defensive end, recorded 30 tackles and 3.5 sacks, while Kryzak, a defensive tackle, had 38 total hits, including 5.5 sacks.

The Great Danes will need to offset the loss of All-America inside linebacker Josh Bazan, who finished his career as the school's all-time leading tackler. Senior Victor Camacho (58 tackles) is a candidate for that position. Kurt Campbell (6-2, 217) will make the move from cornerback to roverback during spring drills.







BASEBALL SPLITS DOUBLEHEADER WITH TOWSON





UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY NAMES KALEKENI BANDA WOMEN'S SOCCER COACH

ALBANY, N.Y. – University at Albany Director of Athletics and Recreation Lee McElroy announced today the hiring of Kalekeni M. Banda as head women's soccer coach. Banda, who has coached on the collegiate level since 1980, becomes the second full-time coach in the UAlbany program's history. Banda, a two-time NSCAA national coach of the year, has coached both men's and women's soccer programs during his career. He previously was the head men's coach at the University of Wisconsin, as he brought stability to the program during his five-year tenure. The Badgers improved to the point where they posted a pair of 10-win campaigns in 2000 and 2001. He coached seven All-Big Ten Conference and seven All-Great Lakes Region players.

Banda, who has guided teams to post-season play 10 times and coached 25 All-Americans, previously was the head men's coach at Amherst College in Massachusetts for seven years. He reshaped the program and reached the second round of the NCAA tournament in his fourth season, and was named the 1993 New England Intercollegiate Soccer League (NEISL) Coach of the Year. Banda also took the Lord Jeffs to the NCAAs two years later.

As the women's soccer head coach at University of Massachusetts, Banda put together his greatest successes. From 1982-87, the Minutewomen appeared in six consecutive NCAA tourna-

ments, including five straight national semifinals. UMass was the runner-up in 1987 after losing to North Carolina in the championship. His team posted a 20-2-0 overall record, and he received his second national coach of the year award.

Banda ranks among Division I's top women's coaches in career winning percentage (.806) and victories with a 125-20-10 record. At Massachusetts, he coached 20 All-Americans as well as 31 All-New England players. He was a three-time NSCAA/New England Region coach of the year award recipient. For his efforts, Banda was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1999.

A native of Malawi, Africa, Banda has also been successful as a collegiate track and field coach at both Amherst and Massachusetts. As the women's coach at UMass and both the men's and women's track coach at Amherst, he was responsible for one national champion, 16 NCAA qualifiers and 50 school records.

Banda, 51, participated in both soccer and track and field at the University of Massachusetts, where he received a B.S. in physical education in 1975. He returned to his native country to take the position of sports officer and coach at the Ministry of Sports and Culture. Banda also served as coach of several Malawi National Olympic teams for a three-year period before returning to the United States

The son of a Malawi diplomat to the United Nations, Banda also has ties to the state of New York. He attended Mamaroneck High School in Westchester County, lettering in both soccer and track and field. In recognition of his playing and coaching accomplishments, he was enshrined into the high school's athletic hall of fame on Nov. 7, 1999.





Newark, Del. – Junior attackman Michael Solazzo tied a career-high with four goals and added one assist to lead Albany to a 16-12 non-conference victory over Delaware on Saturday afternoon at Rullo Stadium.

MCGINLAY & HUTCHESON NAMED TO AMERICA EAST ALL-CONFERENCE TEAM Boston, Mass. – University at Albany's Jess McGinlay and Danielle Hutcheson have been chosen to the America East all-conference women's basketball team, as announced this evening by the conference office. McGinlay and Hutcheson, a pair of second-team selections, are the first UAlbany players to earn all-conference recognition since the school joined the league in the 2001-02 academic year.

McGinlay, a senior co-captain, ranked sixth in the America East in scoring at 15.2 points per game. She led the league in three-point field goals made (2.63 pg), and was third in both free throw percentage (.848) and 3-point percentage (.406). McGinlay, of Burke, Va., broke or tied several school records, including three-pointers in a season (71), career three-point field goals (152), single-game three-pointers (7) and singleseason points by a senior (411). McGinlay, a four-year letterwinner, finished fourth on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,109 points. Hutcheson, a 6-foot-4 center, was seventh among the America East leaders in scoring with a 13.9 average, plus was third in rebounding (9.4 pg) and third in blocked shots (1.22 pg). She was also third in double-doubles with 11 and fifth in field goal percentage (.472). A native of Phoenix, Ariz., Hutcheson finished her second year as a collegian with 375 points and 253 rebounds, both single-season totals were school records by a sophomore. She earned America East player of the week honors in January with a 16-point, 11-rebound performance against Binghamton. Albany completed the season with a 9-18 record, including 3-13 in conference play. The Great Danes registered a five-win improvement and bettered their league

record from the previous season under first-year head coach Trina Patterson.


TERESA COVERT FINISHES SECOND AT ECAC CHAMPIONSHIPS







JAMAR WILSON NAMED AMERICA EAST CONFERENCE ROOKIE OF THE YEAR Boston, Mass. – University at Albany's Jamar Wilson has been selected the America East Conference Rookie of the Year in men's basketball, as announced this evening by the conference office. Wilson, a freshman, was also named second-team all-conference. Levi Levine, a 6-foot-6 freshman, and Wilson were both voted to the America East All-Rookie Team. Wilson, who is the second UAlbany player to earn all-conference recognition since the school joined the league in 2001-02, ranked second among the A-East scoring leaders at 19.2 points per game. In addition, he was second in field goal percentage (.496), second in free throw percentage (.812) and eighth in assists (3.2 pg). He scored 20-plus points 12 times, including 30 or more in four contests.

Wilson, a 6'1" guard, was named the America East rookie of the week five times this season and was the conference's player of the week on Feb. 17 after averaging 34.5 points in two victories. He established school freshman records for single-game (39) and single-season scoring with 500 points. The season scoring standard had stood for 47 years, as Gary Holway had 497 in 1955-56. Wilson is the ninth player in school history to reach the 500-point mark in a season.

Levine ranked ninth in scoring (13.0 ppg), 12th in rebounding (6.1 pg), sixth in blocked shots (0.70 pg) and tied for eighth in steals (1.56 pg) among the America East leaders. He has been in the starting lineup in all 27 games this season, and has scored in twin figures 23 times. The freshman tallied a career-high 24 points against Long Island in December.

Levine twice was chosen as the conference's rookie of the week during the season. He finished the regular season with a 14-game, double-figure scoring streak.

The Great Danes, the No. 7 seed, meet second-seed Vermont in the America East Tournament quarterfinals on Sunday, March 9 at Boston University's Walter Brown Arena. Tipoff is 6:05 p.m.



WOMEN'S BASKETBALL – Stony Brook 80, Albany 68

Stony Brook, N.Y. – Danyelle Ingram scored a career-high 29 points on 13-of-15 shooting, as Stony Brook held off Albany, 80-68, in an America East Conference contest on Wednesday evening at The Sports Complex. The Great Danes finish their season with a 9-18 record, including 3-13 in conference play.

Stony Brook (9-17, AE 7-8) led 19-13 with 13:07 remaining in the opening period, but then went on an 18-5 run. Ingram, a 5-foot-9 freshman who made her first 13 fieldgoal attempts, scored 11 points in that span. She completed that decisive stretch with a fastbreak layup to give the Seawolves a commanding 40-18 advantage.

Bojana Bogetic, a 6-foot-4 center, added four of her 13 points, as her team pulled away. "We made a lot of improvement this year," said Albany coach Trina Patterson, who in her first year more than doubled the program's win total from last season. "We still have a long way to go, but we have now learned how to play through adversity. We had a winning record at home and three conference victories, which is better than most people probably expected."

Jess McGinlay, a senior guard who was playing in her final game as collegian,

led the Great Danes with 24 points, on 7-of-17 shooting from beyond the three-point arc. McGinlay, who also grabbed seven rebounds, established the school's single-season record for 3-point field goals (71) and moved to fourth on the all-time scoring list with 1,109 points. Kathryn Hemlock, the third Albany player in double figures with 10 points, handed out a career-high nine assists.



and Layden, who had two RBI, each collected two hits in the contest.



UALBANY SEEDED SEVENTH FOR NEXT WEEKEND'S A-EAST TOURNAMENT Boston, Mass. – Defending champion Boston University will be the top seed for the Choice Hotels International America East Conference Men's Basketball Championship, as announced this evening by the conference office. The tournament's quarterfinals and semifinals will be held at Boston U.'s Walter Brown Arena on March 9-10. The championship will be played on March 15 at the highest remaining seed's home floor, with the winner receiving an automatic NCAA tournament berth.





"We got the ball inside," said Vermont coach Tom Brennan, whose team finished the regular schedule with wins in six of their last eight. "I'm happy with Sheftic's progress. He's a load to stop, and he makes things easier for Coppenrath."

Rhasheed Peterson led three other Albany players in double figures with 14 points and seven rebounds. Levi Levine and Earv Opong scored 11 and 10, respectively. Vermont clinched second place in the final conference standings and will meet Albany in the opening round of the America East tournament on Sunday, March 9 at Boston University's Walter Brown Arena.

that spurt.


