Wednesday, Jan. 31 - (A.M.) Algebra, Int. Algebra, El. Algebra (Special), Latin III, Latin II (Special), Latin III, Commercial Arithmetic. (P.M.) English I, Plane Geometry, Latin IV, El. Bookkeeping, Commercial Geography.

Thursday, Feb. 1 - (A.M.) English IV, Latin I, Business English, Typewriting. (P.M.) English III, French I, Typewriting, El. Bus. Training.

Friday, Feb. 2 - (A.M.) French II (Miss Smith), French II and III (Miss Crooks). (P.M.) Art, Conflicts.

This schedule has been posted on several bulletin boards and room assignments may be found there. The time of the morning exams will be from nine until twelve o'clock; the afternoon exams, from one until four o'clock.

ROSENSTEIN STARS AS MILNE GAINS FIRST COURT VICTORY OF SEASON

The Milne basketball team gained its first victory of the season Wednesday afternoon by defeating Industrial High School on the latter's court. The score was 32 to 26.

Milne set a fast pace in the first half and compiled a good lead. The score at half time was 24 to 10, but in the second half Milne lost its speed and Industrial slowly shortened the lead.

Howie Rosenstein featured Milne's scoring attack with 14 points.

FACULTY LAUNCHES NEW PERMIT SYSTEM STUDENTS MUST LEAVE SCHOOL BY 4:15

The new rules to stop loitering after school went into effect Monday, as the faculty prepared to clear the building of students by 4:15 P.M. every afternoon. Warnings were issued to everyone to take especial care to have a permit both during school hours and afterwards.

At 2:15 all students must have left the building except those who have special permission to remain on special business. For those who have to wait for appointments, the library and rooms 123 and 124 will be open, but by 4:15 the building must be clear of all students.

In order to enforce this ruling, a member of the faculty will patrol each of the three floors. Public notice has also been made of the fact that a violation of this system will demand the same punishment as being expelled from class. For each offense a pink slip will be filed in the office.

It is the aim of the faculty in enforcing such strict measures to end the loitering in the halls and to make it possible for students to leave school in time to enjoy a bit of sunshine and exercise.

COMMITTEE SELECTS ANNOUNCEMENTS FOR GRADUATION NEXT JUNE
