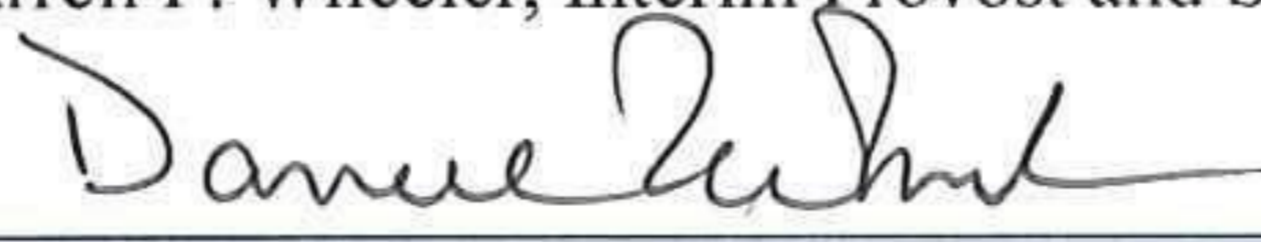

Section 3.2. Proposed New Program

- a) Describe the new program and the rationale for converting the existing coursework to a separately registered program.

The MS in Higher Education is increasingly recognized as an important credential for those seeking entry level and mid-level administrative employment in colleges and universities -- working in student life, residence halls, academic advising, college athletics and so forth. The higher education track in the existing MS in Educational Administration and Policy Studies was developed in response to the need to provide a high quality educational experience for those individuals seeking a career in higher education institutions. However, given the shifting market expectations that students have a degree in "higher education and/or student affairs", a track within the existing degree is no longer a sufficient signal to employers of the academic experience our students are receiving. Having only a track within a more generic degree structures puts the onus on the students to explain to potential employers the relevance of their degree to a career in higher education. Awarding the standalone degree will be an improved indicator to employers that that graduates have gained the necessary knowledge and skills to be effective managers and leaders in the higher education workplace.

The program has five primary components:

- 1) Academic Core: three courses (9 credits) in organizational leadership, social analysis, and quantitative methods*
- 2) Support Discipline: two courses (6 credits) in a focused disciplinary area that advances theoretical understanding of higher education*
- 3) Higher Education Courses: three courses (9 credits) in areas that specially advance the students understanding of leadership and management of higher education institutions.*
- 4) Electives: three courses (9 credits) that advance the students theoretical, research, or practical understanding of higher education institutions.*
- 5) Research Capstone: 1 course (3 credits) in a research capstone experience.*

The curriculum is specifically designed to provide students with a strong theoretical and practical base, enabling them to effectively use research and theory in their day-to-day lives as higher education leaders and to prepare students to pursue doctoral education.

There is anticipated to be little impact on the existing program. The most significant impact is expected to be a shift in enrollments from the existing program to the new program. However, these programs will continue to be strategically aligned, sharing courses and faculty similar to what now happens between the different tracks in the current program.

The department has recently hired two new faculty members with higher education expertise to support anticipated growth in this area. However, it is anticipated that no other adjustments will be needed as the program will continue to operate in alignment with and utilizing the resources of the existing degree program and in the current departmental structure.
