#### Westinghouse Locals

Voting on Contract Locals in Westinghouse Electric Corporation are voting on a proposed contract settlement which would give them a raise of 8 percent, with a fine-cent minimum plus a seventh paid holiday, Washington's Birthday.

Westinghouse is second largest in the electrical manufacturing field. GE is the largest.

Westinghouse previously had offered six percent and a pension plan which the negotiation committee called inadequate. A meeting of 5.000 UE members at the Westinghouse plant in Essington voted unanimously to call for a strike vote.

The Westinghouse revised offer for this year was said to add up to the same as that worked out with GE. The seventh holiday concession at Westinghouse was balanced by the GE agreeing to Saturday time-and-a-half for continuous process workers.

The two settlements leave the Westinghouse contract ahead of GE on wage rates and holidays.







### Record Set by UE In '48 Contracts

UE is the first of the big unions to secure wage increases and contract settlements with the major portion of its industry during 1948.

In addition to signing with GE, Westinghouse, GM, Sylvania, and Phelps Dodge, UE has negotiated settlements with approximately 250 smaller firms. The 1948 settlements give about-450,000 members increases of nine to 16 cents an hour.

A defense offered by Supervision in Building 69 in one grievance was promptly turned around by Board Member Stanley Bishop last week to win a six-cent raise in the rate for two girl assemblers.

In the course of a lay-off, supervision claimed two assemblers could not be transferred to a job known as "Plugging Switch 2962" because that job would take "six months to learn." On Bishop's suggestion, Shop Steward Emmet Paige, Jr. handed Foreman Peter Sotile a grievance pointing out that rate should be 60 cents.
