Pupils See Milk Pasteurized And Ice Cream Frozen

Members of the Excursion Club visited the Normanskill Dairy and Ice Cream Plant on Thursday, March 24. An employee of the company took them through the plant. They saw the milk tested and pasteurized. The pipes are cleaned every day so that the milk passing through them will remain clean. The pupils saw men washing the bottles in which the milk is sold. Then they watched the milk being shipped out.

They were next taken through the ice cream section of the plant. They saw the ice cream mixed and frozen. The temperature is kept at forty degrees below zero.
