Viet Vet Alleged Traitor

BANGKOK, THAILAND U. S. Marine Robert R. Garwood flew out of Vietnam and headed home Thursday after 13 years behind a curtain of secrecy in that war-torn land. He may face charges of collaboration with the enemy in the United States. Pfc. Garwood, 33, of Greensburg, Ind., refused to talk to reporters on arrival at Bangkok airport on a City, formerly Saigon. He later was flown aboard a U. S. military transport to Okinawa, where he is to remain for a few days. In Washington, Marine spokesman Lt. Col. Art Brill said allegations against Garwood are being studied to determine whether there should be a court martial. He said the allegations include soliciting American combat forces to throw down their weapons and refuse to fight; attempting to cause insubordination; disloyalty and refusal of duty among fellow prisoners of war; suspicion of desertion in time of war; unlawful dealings with the enemy, and misbehavior while a prisoner of war. If tried and convicted of all charges, Brill said. Garwood could be sentenced to death. But he noted there have been no executions of Marines before the turn of the century. He said Garwood was advised of the allegations and his rights. Market Highest In 5 Months

NEW YORK (AP) The stock market overcame periodic waves of resistance to reach a five-month high yesterday in a busy session. After what one analyst called "the shootout at 860," the Dow Jones average of 30 industrials posted a 3.55 gain to 861.31, its highest close since it finished at 866.34 last Oct. 17. Several other market indicators also hit new 1979

highs. Volume on the Big Board totaled 34.38 million shares, up from 31.12 million Wednesday. Although the Dow's gain failed to match the 7.45-point advance it chalked up in a late rally Wednesday, the session provided considerable excitement for many technical analysts. The blue-chip and glamor issues that led Wednesday's rally gave a mixed account of themselves. Eastman Kodak was up 1/2 at 65 Black & Decker added 5/8 to 21 3/8, but International Business Machines slipped 1/4 to 315 3/4 and Polaroid was off 3/8 at 40 1/2. The daily tally on the NYSE showed nearly two gainers for every issue that lost ground, and the exchange's composite index added .26 to 57.09.

Moynihan: KGB In UN

current U. S. ambassador to the United Nations, disagreed, saying, "I don't think there's any increase in Soviet influence. I don't think there's any danger of anybody's agents dominating the United Nations." Moynihan said the United States should use every means available to pressure the Soviet Union to remove agents of the KGB, the Soviet intelligence service, from the personnel roster of the United Nations. Young answered that when the FBI can prove Soviet agents are using U. N. cover, those agents are either expelled or arrested and prosecuted. Moynihan and Young commented at a House hearing of the subcommittee on international organizations which is considering proposals to alter the United Nations. Moynihan said he had no reform proposals to make, but he did have comments and omplaints. "The Soviets have been placing KGB agents in the secretariat in direct violation of Article 100 of the United Nations Charter," Moynihan said. The article provides that the international civil service of the United Nations will be strictly neutral in all political issues. As evidence, Moynihan cited the arrest by the FBI on espionage charges of two Soviet members of the U. N. secretariat. They were accused of paying \$16,000 for secret U. S. Navy antisubmarine warfare documents. Both were convicted and later sentenced to 50 years imprisonment each.

State Budget In Flux

ALBANY, NY (AP) Gov. Hugh Carey and the legislative leaders met for two hours of budget negotiations yesterday, but apparently made little progress towards resolving a series of disputes which must be settled before the proposed \$12.7 billion budget can be passed. Republicans and Democrats alike came out of the meeting saying there were still disagreements over tax cuts, school financing, state aid to local governments and other issues. The most serious of the budget disputes — over a bid to force a cutoff of Medicaid funding of abortions for poor women — is largely out of the hands of Carey and the top leaders anyway, because they all opose a cutoff. A rank-and-file movement over the abortion issue is widely expected to hold up passage of parts or all of the budget past the start of the new fiscal year next Sunday, April 1. Carey, just back from an unnounced trip to Florida, WASHINGTON (AP) The United Nations is on the verge of made another pitch for the budget pan as he presented it in "domination" by Soviet spies, Sen. Pope Goes To Poland

WARSAW, POLAND (AP) Pope John Paul II and Polish ommunist Party leader Edward Gierek will meet when the ontiff visits Poland in June, a church source here said hursday. Rumors of a meeting between Gierek and the Polish-born pope have circulated here for months. Gierek paid a visit to Pope Paul VI at the Vatican in 1977, a meeting that resulted in vastly improved church-state relations in communist and overwhelmingly Roman Catholic Poland.
The church source, who declined to be named, said the pope and Gierek would probably meet in Warsaw's reconstructed royal castle. During his June 2-10 visit, the pope will be the state guest of President Henryk Jablonski. Polish bishops began a two-day conference Wednesday at which they were o discuss details of the visit. Vatican emissary Archbishop Agostino Casaroli flew to Poland Thursday to discuss with officials of the Polish church and government final arrangements for the papal visit, which will take Pope John Paul II to Warsaw, Gniezno, Czestochowa, and his former







The rallying students fanned out across the Capitol lawn to take part in the demonstrations, some climbing atop the statue of General Sheridan to unfurl a yellowing 48star flag.





POLITICAL FOCUS

Why Not the



The 1980 presidential elections are not exactly around the corner yet. However, in light of Jimmy Carter's early (and successful) light of Jimmy Carter's early (and successful) run for the presidency in 1976, many hopefuls have started on the campaign already. A handful of Republicans have announced their intention to seek the nomination, and many more are expected to do the same in the coming months. As for the Democrats, Senators Kennedy and Stevenson and California Governor Brown all seem to be waiting for signs of weakness in Carter's democratic support. It is far too democratic support. It is far too presumptuous at this time to venture a guess as to who will win their respective party's nominations. Still the most important question is, can President Carter be defeated?

Let's look at the Republican field first. The major contenders for the Connally, Baker, Reagan, and Ford.
Announced contenders such as Rep. Crane.
George Bush, and Senator Lowell Weicker do not have the wide support necessary to win the nomination this time around. The publicity and exposure garnered now will probably aid in Vice-Presidential possibilities or a 1984 run. These same factors weigh against a relative unknown, though potentialy strong candidate, Governor James Thompson. It looks like the bid will go to one of the four "heavies." President Ford, while very well-liked and respected, does not generate the liked and respected, does not generate the same enthusiasm as his rivals. He seems to have given up the idea of running in the primaries, and if he seeks the nomination at the possible contenders, the answer is, not all, it will be a result of a deadlocked convention. It is questionable whether Ford is willing to give up the lecture/golf life, and risk problems with his wife who has publicly urged him not to run. As for Ronald Reagan, he is without doubt the eurrent favorite. He has norty He is still young and he has just become

latter, his age must certainly be considered when choosing the nominee. Though he looks years younger, Reagan will be seventy-one at the time of the inauguration in 1981. He would be the oldest president ever elected. This is certainly more of a drawback than has yet been realized. Senate Minority, Leader been realized. Senate Minority Leader Howard Baker is an interesting candidate. His liberal views have endeared him to the party's liberal views have endeared him to the party's left-wingers but antagonized the larger right-wing. His strong performance during the Watergate hearings is certainly an impressive point in his favor. Mrs. Baker had drinking problems but this shouldn't affect Baker at this stage of the game. One thing very much in his favor: his pragmatism, as exemplified by his support of such liberal-minded issues as the Panama Canal treaties, might siphon disenchanted democratic votes from a moderate incumbent. Baker's liberal moderate incumbent. Baker's liberal republicanism probably makes him the most electable of the bunch, especially against a president in trouble with his own party. Former Texas Governor John Connally is charismatic, popular, and an excellent campaigner. He also was indicted during the milk scandal in 1973. While later cleared of these charges, this, along with his well-publicized party switch, is still a mark on his record. Connally's best bet is being selected as a compromise candidate, coming between Reagan's conservatism and Baker's liberalism.

A Lesson About Teaching

Probably, many students here would like to special education. me teachers. But when they hear about chances for a job, they become dissuaded. Should you tailor your aspirations to the vagaries of the job market? And are there ons other than a job as a teacher for entering a program in teacher education?

William C. Stewart, Jr. of the Placement Office doesn't believe that the job market is as gloomy as it is often portrayed. His office receives about twenty requests a week for teachers. SUNYA's business education program cannot meet the demand for their graduates. Walter Farmer, coordinator of the program in mathematics and science education reports: "Placement opportunities for both mathematics and science teachers are clearly on the rise. During the past year, we have received more calls to nominate science andidates than there were students available. We have already been notified for several teaching positions in both science and nathematics for September."

As for prospective teachers of English, I certification. have never known one who has failed to get a ob if he were aggressive and persistent in obtaining interviews from school hiring officials.

Currently. New York State has teachingcertificate reciprocity with twenty-one other

Apart from becoming a teacher, there are other reasons for enrolling in a teacher-education program. Such a program gives a background and sometimes satisfies pre equisite for careers in such fields as gui 'ance, college teaching, reading education, school librarianship, bilingual education, the

teaching of English as a second language, and

The program also offers a contribution to one's education in the liberal arts. Teacher education deals with the educational uses of one's field, with human growth and development, with theories of learning, with relationships between communities and schools, with one's values, and with the integration of all this in a guided public school student-teaching experience. This kind of background is valued by business firms and graduate schools. Graduates of teachereducation programs take advanced work not only in schools and colleges of education but also in our most distinguished schools of law, medicine, government, humanities, sciences, and the rest.

For business and liberal arts graduates SUNYA has a master's degree program called Basic Classroom Teaching. The program is designed for those who have not studied teacher education, and it leads toward teacher

Central Council Goes Blind

The issue is not free speech. That is not in question. What is in question is Central Council's misguided decision to use student tax money to pay a representative of the Palestinian Liberation Organization to speak here. Money that not only need not have been offered, but which stands a more than likely chance of being used to support a known terrorist group who openly advocaaes violence as a means to an end.

The \$400 that is to be paid by you and I for Terzi to speak might buy bullets that may end up in the hearts of innocent victims. It might buy bombs that may explode in a public place. It might support assassins, hijackers, terrorists, kidnappers, or any destructive measures that are used by people who are outside any law. It might now, but it might.

Again, the question here does not concern the right to speak. As a newspaper, we repsect the right of anyone, with any philosophy, to espouse it to those who wish to hear it. However, by offering the PLO our money, Central Council has forced you to support what might prove to be a destructive end.

If Central Council considers SUNY's holdings of stock in South Africa an indirect form of racism, then how can they be so blind not to see that they are indirectly supporting terrorism, an equally, if not greater inhumanity.

A bill was introduced two meeting ago to prevent Terzi from being paid. It was defeated. This past Wednesday, the same bill was reconsidered, and redebated. Again, it was defeated. What justification could our representatives possibly over for making a grave mistake, and then making it again.

As our elected representatives, it is the duty of Central Council to protect our interests, spend our money wisely, and proceed only with the interest of the constituency in mind. Unless you support violence as a means to an end, then your interests may be strongly violated, and your money may be terribly misspent. And Central Council is to blame.

Let Terzi come. Why not charge admission to see him, and those who opt to pay can do so? Those who don't won't, and the decision will be with the individual.

If Central Council's judgement is so misguided, and their vision so blurred, then maybe we should sharpen our vision when judging them. Election time draws near.

Racism At SUNYA: Four Black **Students** And Some **Varsity Coaches** Give Opposing Points Of View

Four black students, formerly members on SUNYA's Varsity Football Team have been lodging complaints of racism against Coach Robert Ford and his coaching staff.

The allegations, dased on incidents going as far back as Fall 1976 charge that teammember Fred Brewington was not given fair opportunity to start as quarterback, that coaches treated blacks with disrespect, awarding starting positions to less qualified white players, and that the staff failed to recruit minority coaches and

"I am exploring the complaints lodged against my coaching staff and me, and I hope to be addressing all the issues soon," Ford

The four former players are Fred Brewington, Sam Halston,

Howard O'Bryan and Leander Hardaway.

"I was bigger, faster, quicker, and more agile than Aldrich,"
Brewington said, referring to events of 1977 when Brad Aldrich was chosen starting quarterback over Brewington.
"I worked hard at my position," Brewington said, "I attended

every training session, and conscientiously practiced to improve my football skills."

Brewington said, "It was bad enough not starting, but I got the



State Senator Recommends Resolution To Condemn SA

Senator Martin Solomon (D-Brooklyn) has issued a resolution condemning SA for funding PLO speaker Zehdi Labib Terzi, according to Administrative Assistant to Solomon Rich Weinberg.

"The resolution will state that Solomon is upset with SA for funding a group that kills innocent people. Solomon realizes he has no control over SA expenditures and can't stop SA from funding the speaker. He

doesn't want SA to support terrorism," said Weinberg.

Solomon will not attempt to stop Terzi from speaking at SUNYA, but will make SA aware that Solomon is not in favor of "supporting

The resolution states that Solomon condemns SA for spending \$400 on the PLO to lecture at SUNYA. He believes it is "appalling" that SA should expend funds for a terrorist group that commits violent crimes. should expend tunes for a terrorisage but not a group that "maims innocent people," said Weinberg.

The resolution will be presented to the New York State Senate

sometime next week. If it is passed, "it will do absolutely nothing except make students aware of Solomon's feelings," said Weinberg. Weinberg believes that money should not be appropriated for the event. "If he'll speak for nothing, he can come, I understand that he

wants to express his beliefs. We are not responsible to pay him, though, and this is not a violation of the First Amendment. It comes to a point when there must be a definition of terrorism." - Michele Israel

Chairperson of the Council Budget Committee Sue Gold said, There was a general consensus that there was not enough money for the Dippikill expansion plan without therefore, we agreed to let the students decide on a referendum."

The student referendum, which will be released during spring elections in early May, must have a student body and of that 25 percent, the majority must vote in favor of the innual increase of two dollars in the student activity fee. If these two conditions are met, Central Council will be bound to channel that money exclusively into the Dippikill expansion projects, according to Dave Ruffo.

"If these conditions are not met, then the decision will go back to Central Council," Ruffo claims. "We can raise the student activity fee without student approval, but we ould rather not do that; we'd like to see the students make the decisions on the referendum."

"The ceiling on the annual student activity fee was raised from \$70.00 to the student activity fee \$2.00 per year over five years; this will cover the \$95,000 cost of the Dippikill

Ruffo explained that the average appropriation for Dippikill in a \$42,000. Central Council had proposed two methods of increasing funds for the Dippikill expansion

had planned to raise the money by taking \$30,000 from the General Fund, which is a surplus fund used for major expenditures. SA obtained this fund when a surplus athletic fund was split between the SA and

This plan was rejected because i would reduce the General Fund form \$41,000 to \$11,000. "Each time this fund is depleted, there is little chance of replenishing it. We want to hold on to as much of the General Fund as possible," Ruffo said. He also claimed that this plan was rejected because it would threaten other groups which Central Council funds with an \$11,000 cut.
