BEAGLE IS HIGH SCORER AS MILNE LOSES BY YONE POINT

Coming out on the short end of a 26-25 game, our "Crimson fire" lost to Renselaer High last Friday night. "Woof Woof" Beagle played an excellent game accounting for 10 points which he made by some beautiful shooting. "Tiger" Taft followed with 8 points by making very accurate pivot shots.

The game itself was a "thrilling"

"The Milne team is timid on the court and that can be corrected by more games. Later in the season Milne should take them all."

TAX MUST BE AID BY JANUARY 8

The Student Tax is a compulsory amount of money which must be paid by the Milne students. The latest possible date to turn in the money is January 8, 1937. There are 414 members in Milne this year, and only 330 of these have paid their Student Tax. This leaves 84 students to whom this article is directed. This must be paid or serious measures will be taken by the Council.
