In past games, the jayvees would amass a large lead and then coast to the victory. Mohawk Valley refused to quit when they were behind, and the second half turned into a tight ballgame.



While alleged cheating in SA elections have had visible consequences in the SA Supreme Court, such as in the cases of Marc Benecke and the Kathy Baron - Jim Aronoff run-off, cases of academic cheating are dealt with in a littleknown group called the University Judicial Committee.

Gross bases his argument on a section of the SA Constitution which states that no member of the Supreme Court may concurrently hold a Central Council seat. He also says the Election Regulations Act recently approved by Central Council and now in effect, would prevent Mitchell from running in the

The Act stipulates that no person may be nominated for a position

which they are ineligible to hold. Mitchell says he should be allowed to run for the post and resign as

## New York State Library Moves to South Mall

The New York State Library and State Archives are moving their collection of approximately five and one half million items from the State Education Building on Washington Avenue to the Cultural Educational Center in the South Mall

The move will cost nearly one and a half million dollars and, according to Principal Librarian J. Vanderveer Judd, "is probably one of the largest

The transfer of the library's collection began last Wednesday and should be completed by April I. The collection of the State Archives will begin being moved in late March

The Archives, a repository of historically valuable state overnment records, will as a result the move be able to centralize it holdings in one location. The Archives were created in 1971 and until now its records have been housed in many scattered locations, among them the State Education Building.
For the first time in the library's

history a portion of its stacks will be open to the public. These stacks, which will be located in the tower portion of the Cultural Center, will be protected by electronic

veillance equipment. The library's present card catalogue will also be replaced by a modern system of microfiche and microfiche readers. About 1600 microfiche cards will list the library's holdings by author, title, and

catalogue system by about 3.4 million cards At the end of the year a new

Computerized Collection Management System will be in operation, which will list all of the library's holdings and be cumulative for all new acquisitions.

The Archives will use free standing shelving made by Cor-Craft a division of the Correction Department at Attica Prison. The library's shelving was made by Republican Steel and Hollowell, a Division of Standard Press Steel. The shelving made by Hollowell is unconventional: it will be suspended from the ceiling.



The library has one of the most extensive collections in the nation and contains many rare and valuable documents as well as newspapers periodicals, and books. A special vault has been constructed to house the most precious documents.







Conversations with some of my colleagues and my own classroom experience have me that students are now unable to write university caliber papers. In any class there are bound to be students whose papers are acceptable and there will even be the odd paper that is mechanically perfect, if not elegant. But the overall level of writing has declined markedly, so much so in several of my classes this semester that I have had to ask self if these are really university classes intelligence and seem to put a reasonable amount of work into their papers, but the results. I am sorry to say, are sad. It is not sual in a ten-page paper to find twelve or fifteen missnelled words, a complete inability to punctutate, collections of words that only vaguely resemble sentences, and sentences an paragraphs arranged randomly, without any evidence of logical, systematic development Unless students correct these deficiencies, this will cease to be a university; it will be a place where isolated individuals do university-leve work but where a much larger nur students correct these deficiencies, this will cease to be a university; it will be a place where isolated individuals do university-level work but where a much larger number of students, negative mass, do not. I maintain that the problem is of such urgency that corrective asures are necessary, and herein would like to make a modest proposal to that end. But first. I should like to look at the conditions that brought about the writing problem and consider some of its implications.

Schools in the 1960's introduced new theories of education that emphasized spontaneity and individual creativity. Rather than stifle the youthful mind with mechanica drills or rote learning, teachers encouraged students, it seems to let their fancy take the where it would, assuring them that they would learn to spell and punctuate in good time These same teachers wanted to engage their students' interest by making education relevant: their concern was to make their courses interesting so students would be happy. Unfortunately, the experiment did not work out, at least in some important respect and there is now a trend back to the basics. A publication of the National Education Association, entitled "Learning is Hard Work," sets forth a philosophy that schools are already following. The pamphlet says:

"School is a place of learning. It is not place of entertainment or relaxation, like a theater or like the beach. That means that school is essentially a work place and that the pleasure to be derived from a school is integrally related to the satisfaction derived rm accomplishing a hard job. That means too, that a day at school can sometimes be

Learning is hard work. And the future of all students, parents, teachers, the community at large depends on it.

I happen to agree with these views, but that is neither here nor there. The point is that the pendulum is swinging back and children are now learning skills that were negleleted for omething like a decade and a half. One of my colleagues who recently went to an open hou a local elementary school saw papers that are technically better than those he had just read in an upper division class. That today's children are once again concentrating writing skills has grave consequences for the present generation of university students. It means that they are situated between two groups, one older and one younger, both more erbally adept than themselveves. The former will have moved into jobs and demonstrated skills that will have been recognized and rewarded, and the latter will come up from behind, pushing aside those who are unable to compete. And rest assured that people outsid the university, those who run things, care

about literacy, as a recent incident nicely

One of my former students who will begin ool this fall applied for a position as a legal assistant with a local law firm. The head of the firm himself conducted the interview After asking various questions and getting feel certain, thoughtful intelligent answers he reached into his desk and pulled out a sheet of paper with eight spelling words. He handed over the sheet, gave directions, and waited for the results. Upon seeing that the skills he cared about were nicely in order he offered him the job which was quickly accepted and has since worked out to the full satisfaction of both

Because this semester's papers have been so riddled with mechanical flaws I have had to read them with considerable care, circling mistakes, rewriting sentences, and in som cases suggesting how a paper might have been set up differently. And I have been so ned with the level of writing that in handing back papers I have spent some tim discussing the problem, trying to persuade students that something has to be done. I must say that their responses have been highly encouraging. It is not pleasant for me to tel students that they are verbally deficient and it is not pleasant for them to hear me say it, but i seems to me that they have accepted my remarks in the good spirit in which they were intended. Never have I had so many student come in to see me about their papers, and without exception our conversations have been agreeable but also frank. My impression is that the students I have spoken with nely want to improve their writing and typically they have asked me for advice. In al cases I have said that to write more effectively one must write more often, that one gets bette at it by doing it. This led students to ask what

courses place an emphasis on writing.

Apart from mentioning courses in English composition and a few other courses that I happen to know about. I am unable to answe this question. If I am not mistaken no on else can either, as there is no document that contains this information. Unless inquiries are made beforehand, a student has no idea how many papers will be written, how long the will be or how carefully they will be marked their writing skills don't know quite where to turn. What I should like to propose is that some way be devised to give students this information. My suggestion is that certain courses be asterisked in the schedule of classes which could be done by having faculty respond to a memorandum that would have questions such as: Do you assign one or two papers? Do you assign more than two papers And, do you consider your course a course in functional writing? I must say That I regard the last question as the key one in the light of my own recent experience. It dawned on me that I am now preforming two roles; I teach courses in European history, and I teach courses in functional writing. While to some extent I have always done the latter I do so even more now, and I do it consciously. With all respect to composition courses, it does seem best to me to work at the writing enterprise within the framework of a subjec course, in which learning and writing are organic to one another. Writing involves more than technical skills; it requires an ability to communicate effectively one's understanding of a body of information or problem to another person. This can be done best through

So what I propose is that faculty be asked if they intend to assign papers and whether or not they think of their courses as courses in functional writing. The course catalogue would reflect the responses through a system of asterisks, to be determined by the number and type of questions. I believe the asking of questions would be useful to instructors and I think the results would be valuable to students want to improve their ability to write.

In reference to the ASP's supposed 'expose of the beer Lowenbrau being falsely labeled. the ASP is to be congratulated as being a cuckold of American advertising. In this case the ASP printed a press release as news which attacked Lowenbrau as being mispackaged and therefore false advertising. However, in blindly doing so, you failed to investigate the motivations of the source of the press release information sent to them. In this unwitting nalistic responsibility the ASP has provided what amounts to free advertising to Lowenbrau's competition and a disservice to the American

Some background which the ASP should be aware of will elucidate the situation. First, brewing beer is a prime example of what economics calls a natural monopoly; as quantity produced goes up the cost per unit goes down. This means that it is cheaper for ne producer to brew a given quantity then it is for several producers to collectively brew that same quantity

Secondly, the above idea partly explains the fact that today there are only 40 brewers in America as compared to 400 brewers after Prohibition These 40 are expected to decrease to four by the turn of the century. The been industry knows this and each brewer would like to be one of those four left.

All this helps to explain the current trade war among the beer producers in the US. Three producers are now involved in a struggle to be the largest producer in America The reason for being number one in production is obvious. The more that is produced the cheaper it can be sold which means the lead would be self perpetuating. The three producers are Anheuser-Busch which makes Rudweiser and Micheloh Miller Brewing which makes Miller and Lowenbrau, and Schlitz

This trade war leads us to our present problem Currently the dominance of Anheuser-Busch (AB) is being challenged by Miller. Two contributing factors being the success of Miller Lite and the summer strike of AB employees. With the advent of brewed in America Lowenbrau, a third factor was

This move was a natural one if we again consider the economics of the situation. Lowenbrau is a premium beer. This means that it is lighter in taste and cleaner in texture.

product but then only from the upper moportion (hence its lightness) it pennies more to produce. However since Americans value a lighter brew they are willing to pay a price commensurate with that demand. This translates into a higher price for margin. This higher profit is the reason why Miller would like to have a premium beer on its product line. It also explains why A B whose ium beer Michelob (which enjoys a lion's share of the premium market) would not want Lowenbrau to be successful. Thus when Mille announced plans to market a premium beer under the name of Lowenbrau the New York Times reported that AB's counter advertising strategy would be to point out the false natur of the new Lowenbrau.

This counter advertising has manifested itself in the form of the ASP 'article' we are

Now I am sure that the ASP believed that it was doing the college student a favor by pointing out Lowenbrau's mispackaging. It is true that the new Lowenbrau doesn't corr from Germany as it would seem by its labe However any beer drinker worth his sal should be able to tell the difference from the heavier hodied 'old' Lowenbran and the ighter 'new' Lowenbrau. The point is that it is the beer and not the label the discerning drinker follows. If a competitor has to resor to attacking a label and not the quality of the brew than perhaps there is not much to thos claims that Lowenbrau is an inferior product

Now the point on which I wish to chide the ASP about is their role as a dumb pawn of Madison Avenue: They have taken on fre advertising unaware of the total picture. If all student newspapers or any news mediun failed in their vigilance and became mere dupes of Madison Avenue then the whole of society

Besides placing emphasis on its committees. Central Council is placing increased mportance on the tenant-landlord problems that exist in the dorms.

Late last semester. ## Into The Public Light

Recently, a number of stories have surfaced concerning inequities in SUNYA's handling of evaluations of tenure cases and academic

Though these stories tell of action taken several years ago and may not be of primary concern to students now attending this university, they do have significance. If an academic department becomes low on this university's list of priorities, and gets axed, many students are left out in the cold

It is even worse if these decisions are made on the basis of politics, personalities and variables other than the actual facts of the case. This can only happen when the evaluations are submerged in secrecy without the scrutiny of the university community.

Unfortunately, this seems to be the case at SUNYA. The only reason why stories of improper handling of evaluations such as Comparative Literature and Speech Pathology have come out several years later is because of the secrecy of those proceedings.

Had those proceedings been open to public examination, perhaps there would have been different results. If a department is being reviewed, the students within that department have a right to know how those proceedings are progressing. If a dean is being evaluated and the outcome of that evaluation affects the morale of professors within that department that evaluation and its processes should be open to the

By opening these evaluations to the university community, perhaps politics and personalities won't play as large a role as they apparently already have. And perhaps there won't be stories emerging a few years from now about how these factors affected the deterioration of a program and about how it's too late to do anything about it.

## TAP-ing Carey's Budget

In his 1978-79 Executive Budget, Governor Carey has recommended a \$30 million increase in funding for the Tuition Assistance Program. The Governor's proposal, which would benefit only those attending private colleges, is a slap in the face to SUNY students.

The Miller/ Kremer plan to grant a 20 per cent across the board increase in TAP awards for all eligible students recognizes the fact that economic hardships are experienced by students of both public and private colleges.

Now that an education related program such as TAP has merited an increase in state funding in this election year it is imperative that SUNY students not be ignored.

# **Swimmers Defeat Kings College**

The Albany State men's swim team beat Kings College of Pennsylvania, 73-40, for the first time in Albany's history Saturday. Their record now stands at 6-1.

The first event of the meet proved quite profitable for Albany. The 400yard medley relay team consisting of Dave Rubin, Steve Rehfuss, Bob bach, and Mike Dwyer broke the King's pool record and the Albany State school record with a time of 3:50.4. Legislation which would substantially increase financial aid to Nev York State college students was amended by its sponsors yesterday, according to a spokesperson for State Assemblyman Melvin Miller.

TAP Increases Amended

The new version of the Miller-Kremer bill proposes that TAP aid to students at both public and private schools be increased by 30 percent or \$300, whichever is greater. The total cost of the modifications would be \$20.6 million over one year.

The revised bill incorporates proposals by both Governor Carey and State Assembly Minority Leader Perry Duryea, a possible Republican candidate for Governor, to modify the TAP aid schedule

In his Executive Budget the Governor proposed that the maximum TAP award be increased by \$300 from \$1500 to \$1800 per year, a modification which because of a ceiling on TAP awards, would only benefit private college students.

Duryea had released a proposal last week calling for a 30 per cent across the board increase in TAP aid.

Neither the Governor nor Duryea could be reached for a commen

In its original form the Miller-Kremer bill called for a 20 percent increase in TAP aid, totaling \$28 million over a four year period. The bill had received criticism from private college advocates who found the Governor's proposal far more to their liking.

"It isn't equity but it certainly gives our people a solid shake," said SASU Legislative Director David Coyne of the revised bill

# SA May Stop Funding Club Trips

SA plans to stop funding the trips taken by campus clubs and organizations as part of a change in the philosophy of its Budget chair John Sharkey.

Sharkey said rising costs and inflation, as well as a desire to place a higher priority on those events and organizations which "benefit the ntire student body rather than small groups of special interests" were the principal reasons for the committee's change in posture.

"We're laced with having to work with what we've got, which isn't enough, and at the same time try to make the money go as far as we can for all of our students," Sharkey The SA budget is funded by the

\$66 tax paid by all full-time SUNYA students each academic Budget Committee Chair John Sharkey attributes the planned Sharkey \$14.50 goes to the Athletic Department to help finance varsity sports, and \$2 is allotted to

NYPIRG. The remaining taxes combine to leave the Budget Committee with just over \$400,000 allocate among various campus clubs and organizations.

part to new projects like the Record Co-op and the head shop, SA will be unable to meet all of the requests for funds this semester. A raise in taxes can come about through a referendum, but, according to Sharkey, won't help to meet present costs. "Although probability the tax raise will be put to a vote this spring, for the current semester we'll be forced to work within the present budget," he said

New York State law limits the student tax to a maximum of \$70. and SUNYA's \$66 figure represents, along with SUNY at Buffalo, the lowest tax in the State University system

Sharkey said he hopes the members of the next Budget Committee will be representative of the entire campus community. Last

year's committee, according to SA President Dave Gold, was "a group of white males, not a truly representative body. "We've got quite a diverse group

of people," said Sharkey, "including members of the Feminist Alliance. International Student Associat EOP, Fuerza Latina, and AMIA.
