Sehr geehrte Herren,

Mehrere meiner hier weilenden Kollegen haben durch Ihre Freundschaft soeben Visitor - Visa für die U.S.A. erhalten, auf Grund einer für österreichische und deutsche Schriftsteller unternommene Aktion. Meine in New York befindlichen Freunde haben offenbar von dieser Aktion nicht rechtzeitig Kenntnis erhalten und ich wurde daher nicht berücksichtigt, obwohl mein Fall zweifellos im Augenblick ein dringender ist.

Bevor ich jedoch davon spreche, bitte ich darauf hinzuweisen zu dürfen, dass für die Wahrheit meiner Angaben und hinsichtlich meiner Person und meiner Arbeit Zeugnis ablegen können u.a.: Ernst Lothar, New York City, 19 East, 88th Street (der frühere Wiener Reinhardt-Bühnen-Direktor), ferner Erwin Piscator, New York City, 11W.81 the Street, sowie Manfred Georg, Redaktion des "Aufbau" 15 East, 40 the Street.

Geboren am 2.IV.1887 in Wien, war ich dort 30 Jahre lang als Publizist tätig. Ich war Chefredakteur und führender Theaterkritiker der Wiener Allgemeinen Zeitung, Mittagszeitung, des Fremdenblatts, des Morgens, Herausgeber einer eigenen Theaterrevue, Literaturprofessor am Scala-Seminar, Pressechef des Paula Wessely - Films, Theaterautor und Dramaturg.

Infolge meiner langjährigen, in der Wiener Öffentlichkeit bekannten, ja ich darf sagen: populären Haltung musste ich schon im März 1938 nachhaltig Österreich verlassen. Ich überschritt zu Fuß um Mitternacht die ungarische Grenze. Seit April 1938 lebte ich in Paris, dort als Korrespondent einer tschecho-slovakischen Zeitung, als Mitarbeiter verschiedener Pariser, als Vortragender und Pressechef, sowie als Sekretär der Fédération des österreichischen Emigranten tätig. Am 10.Juni 1940 musste ich auch fliehen.

My dear sirs,

Several of my colleagues here have, thanks to your kindness, just received visitor's visas for the U.S.A., because of an undertaking concerning ~~our~~ Austrian and German writers. My friends in New York have evidently not heard of this undertaking in time and I was therefore not considered, although my case is at the moment doubtless an urgent one.

But before I speak of that, may I point out that the following persons among others can ~~give express~~ vouch for the truth of my claims and also for my person and my work: Ernst Lothar, New York City, 19 East 88 Street, (The former Viennese director of Reinhardtbüthen), furthermore Erwin Piscator, 11 West 81 Street, Manfred Georg, editor of the "Aufbau", 15 East 40 Street.

Born in Vienna, April 2, 1887, I was there active for 30 years as a publisher. I was Editor-in-Chief and leading dramatic critic of the Wiener Allgemeine Zeitung, the Mittagszeitung, the Fremdenblatt, the Morgen, publisher of my own Theater Review, Professor of literature ~~at~~ at the Scala Seminary, Press chief of the Paula Wessely films, playwrite and dramatist.

As a result of my long, well-known by the Vienna public and I may say popular attitude, I had to flee Austria already in March 1938. I crossed the Hungarian border on foot at midnight. From April 1938 on I lived in Paris, as the correspondent of a Czechoslovakian paper, working on several other papers, as lecturer and press chief, as well as secretary of the Federation of Austrian Emigrants. On June 10th, 1940, I had to leave Paris too.

My works on French as well as American culture and literature can not only be confirmed by the persons named above, but my personal friends: Franz Werfel, Stefan Zweig, Alfred Polgar, Elisabeth Bergner, Max Reinhardt, Lil Darvas, Molnar, Géza Herczeg, Walter Reisch, Ernst Deutsch, Lotte Lehmann. I need not add how essential in saving our lives and how decisive it is at this time for me and my wife to succeed in going to the U.S. with your help, where I would doubtless be able to get work through my personal connections.

The data on myself and my wife:

Ludwig Ullmann, born April 2, 1887 in Vienna, Austrian citizen, protestant, married.

Irene Ullmann, born February 6, 1887 in Vienna, Austrian citizen, married.

We are both not registered on the quota, because I have counted for two years on a professional visa, that I was to receive as a teacher of drama or film author. But both were not possible.

I ask you once more urgently for help, as I suppose I may call it.

Dear Mr. Piscator:

We have just received a letter from Ludwig Ullmann and his wife who are now in Southern France. He asks us what we can do to help to save them. We hope very much that it will be possible to bring Mr. Ullmann and his wife to this country.

Dear Miss Adams:

I am enclosing a form to be filled out, giving particulars concerning Mr. Ullmann. Will you return this to us as soon as possible?

It is possible to make application for Special Visitor's Visa to the United States for a limited number of outstanding refugees who would be in grave danger if apprehended by the Nazis. Before such application can be made, it is necessary to submit certain documents including affidavits of support and moral sponsorship and a brief biographical sketch of the individual showing that he is endangered.

Are you able to secure these documents for Mr. Ullmann? I am enclosing a sheet of instructions and sample of the form for the affidavit of sponsorship *and copy of* *U.S.* Will you please inform us if you are able to obtain the necessary papers for Mr. Ullmann and his wife and send them to us as soon as possible so that we may submit them to the proper authorities in Washington.

Es ist dies die Antwort auf ein von Z. vor Tagen geschicktes Telegramm, das um Einigung der Ausfolgung der Visa der 2ten und 3ten Liste bat. Damit sind also die Listen vorderhand gefallen.

Wir wuerden Sie nun sehr darum bitten, sich an Rodriguez per Cabel oder Klipper zu wenden, ihm vielle auch mitzuteilen, dass Sie jetzt gerade mit den Vorarbeiten begonnen haetten und ihn bitten, doch noch diese Visa der beiden Listen zu ermöglichen, schon im Sinne einer Aufbauarbeit unseres Projektes. Schon rein menschlich waere das eine Wohltat.

Zweitens: In meinem eigenen Fall und bei Hellweg und Hahn hat das portugiesische Konsulat erklärt, dass wir das port. Visum erhalten werden, wenn wir ein amerikanisches Transitvisum beibringen, anscheinend wird diese Beguenstigung auch dem zuerst ganz erwiesenen Schneck zu Teil werden. Zur Erleichterung des portugiesischen Visums wäre sicher wertvoll, wenn Sie an Minister Ferro schreiben wuerden. Er kennt ja sich schon unser kuenstlerisches Projekt und wird vielleicht sein, uns die Visaerlangung zu erleichtern. And financial assistance would probably keep them from being interned.

So we would verymuch like you to inform us at your earliest convenience of what you believe could be done in this matter, and if you have been able to secure any of the necessary papers for his application so far.

Ludwig Ullmann was born April 14, 1887, in Vienna. He was active as a publisher for thirty years. He was, too, chief editor and leading dramatic critic of the "Freundlichkeit", "Wiener Allgemeine Zeitung", "Willkommen", "Der Morgen"; he published his own theater reviews and was professor of literature at the Dr. L. Seidler, publishing agent of the Paulin Hassely films, a playwright and essayist. In March 1938 he had to flee from Austria. In Paris, he acted as a correspondent to a Czechoslovakian newspaper and wrote for several other anti-Nazi papers; he became a well-known author as well as a secretary to the Federation of Austrian Emigres.



Biographical Sketch  
of Mr. Ludwig & Mrs. Irene Ullmann

Mr. Ludwig Ullmann was born on April 2, 1887 in Vienna, Austria; Mrs. Irene Ullmann ( his wife) was born on February 6, 1887 in Vienna, Austria.

After completion of his studies at the University in Vienna Mr. Ullmann started writing and lecturing about the modern drama and soon became one of the leading Viennese critics. He also published essays and books concerning political questions. He belonged to the staff of the "Wiener Allgemeine Zeitung", one of the Viennese newspapers which for decades defended democracy. Besides he wrote a column for the newspaper "Mittagszeitung", "Der Voron" and run as his own publisher a weekly literary magazine "Die Flodermaus." When he became Editor in chief of the above mentioned "Allgemeine Zeitung", he made the paper the only in Vienna, which led the public campaign against Hitlerism and Fascism in the period of the chancellors Dollfuss and Schuschnigg. In his editorials as well as in his lectures as Professor of literature at the "Scala Seminary" in Vienna he proved his personal courage, his unshakable faith in democracy and his allegiance to the principles of liberty and humanity.

It is well to be imagined that such an upright and thoroughly sincere man who was neither willing to compromise nor to give in was greatly endangered from the very first day when Hitler marched into Austria. On that same evening of March 11, 1938 the Gestapo searched for Mr. Ullmann who a few minutes before had managed to escape to Hungary. There he waited for his wife and then both proceeded to Paris, France. Here again in writing and lecturing Mr. Ullmann did his utmost to convince his own fellow citizens and the French people of the deadly perils of dictatorship. When war broke out he multiplied his efforts and as correspondent of several newspapers in neutral countries warned against the machinations of the fifth column from within and from without. When the Nazis took over Mr. and Mrs. Ullmann had to flee Paris and to seek refuge in southern France, going from one place to another. They now are staying in Marseille, waiting for being rescued. They are extremely endangered by Mr. Ullmann's antinazi activities. It is to be feared that the Nazi authorities in Paris will demand the extradition of Mr. Ullmann.

Of Mr. Ullmann's writings many were devoted to America's way of life. By his numerous publications on American democracy and American literature he considerably enlarged the knowledge about American institutions within his own country. Among the persons in this country and in Europe who highly estimate Mr. Ullmann's personality and work are: Prof. Max Reinhardt, Hollywood, Calif., Miss Dorothy Thompson, New York, Count Nikolaus Coudenhove-Kalergi, New York, Bruno Berchtold, Hotel St. Moritz, N Y, Bruno Walter, c/o Metropolitan Opera, N Y, Miss Lotte Lehmann, c/o Metropolitan Opera N Y, Stefan Zweig, London, (now lecturing in South America) and Felix Salten, Zurich Switzerland (Wilfridstrasse 4).

Since I have known Mr. and Mrs. Ullmann for more than thirty years this information is given from direct personal knowledge.

Dear Mrs. Fagan:

I received your letter this morning and am very happy indeed to hear that you have an entree to Warren's Office. How many cases will you be able to take care of, rather how many inquiries can you make?

We have a large number of cases that are hanging on fire in the State Department, but do not know how many and what kind would be easiest for to to take up.

There is for instance, the case of Ludwig and Irene Ullman, which was submitted last February 18th. On May 14th, 1941, it is supposed to have been cabled to Marseille but it looks as if it had never been cabled. On September 2nd, 1941, we sent an additional relative statement to Mr. George Warren. It seems impossible to receive any definite information on the case.

Generally speaking we have been submitting cases since the end of July, some of them have been with us for a very long time and had to be redocumented. Is there any possibility for you to find out how long it will take for new visas to be granted and whether there is any differentiation made. Is it advisable for us to say in the accompanying letter that the case had already been sent to the President's Advisory Committee or is it better not to mention any possible political affiliations?

It was sweet of you to mention Kilpatrick's "raving" about me. I hope you meant it the same way as I am taking it. I think he is a very nice fellow but not because he said nice things about me but because I think he has some good ideas on the subject which concerns us all so much.

I am still very busy accomplishing not as much as I would like too.

I hope that your health will be improving rapidly so that New York may have the pleasure of seeing you. After all what the Duchess of Windsor can do you should be able to do too.

Dear Miss Toeb:

I have just come back from the State Dept. and will reply to your letter of Oct 27<sup>th</sup> point by point:

Alfred Mendizabal: All reports on his

case have come in and the case is now at the Committee for decision. I have an appointment for the beginning of next week when they will tell me whether a decision has been reached. Thus, it will not be long before that case is decided.

Conrad Flatau: One more intelligence

report is missing, which they hope to get sometime next week, whereupon this case will be presented to the Committee for decision.

Ludwig and Irene Ullman: Three intelligence

Cat# 941

reports are missing for this case, and, of course it will take longer to assemble them. It seems that on each case they investigate the affiant and the person in question. That is what takes so long, as once the reports are in, the cases go to the Committees (of which there are 5) and are quickly disposed of one way or the other.

I spoke to one of the officers at the Visa Dept. and he told me that they had just finished with the cases submitted in July and August. Therefore you had no decisions on your cases up to now. As for the number and kind of cases which I could name up, frankly to me neither the number nor the ~~case~~ kind makes any difference, as long as they are willing to give me the information. In this connection I have been telling them that I belong to the E.R.C., which made it easier. Perhaps I shall come up next week to New York and we shall then discuss the advisability of letting me have a letter from the E.R.C. to the Visa Dept. just in case they might get fed up with me some day. I have asked the officer to whom I spoke for advice on the point stressed in

paragraph 4 of your letter. He said that whenever a case was submitted to George Warren's Ctee, the office of his brother Warren (I forgot the first name) at the Visa Dep't. automatically received a copy. Therefore, whenever a case is re-submitted ~~always~~, mentioning the fact that it had been previously submitted to George Warren's Committee, as this prevents confusion. Furthermore, he said that to speed matters up, all questions in the forms should be answered as fully, as possible, as otherwise, they have to write for additional information, and this procedure usually causes the greatest delay. Also, and especially if a case has a political affiliation, this should be particularly mentioned, as in their investigation they find out about this anyhow, and then the impression is created that there had been an attempt to conceal this fact, which sometimes influences a speedy decision.

As to the time involved, this depends upon several factors. First, how many new cases they get within the current week or month, and second how simple or how complicated a case is. I had the good luck to obtain a visa for friends of mine within 5 weeks. But the case was very simple. My friends are absolutely unpolitical and both affidavits were given by prominent people. Kunststück! In general one must figure about 2 months for a case to get a decision. However that varies some, according - as I said - to the character of the case.

I hope I have succeeded in giving you a comprehensive picture of the procedure as it was explained to me. At the Visa Dept. they complain that they are overworked and I believe them. Yet none of them miss their lunch hour and they close at 4 p.m. while refugees - or rather those who hope to find refuge in the U.S.A. sit in Europe and share with panic. I still remember how I felt, fearing

every moment that U.S.A. would enter the war - and that was 8 months ago! However, unfortunately neither you nor I can do anything to change the situation.

In your letter you mentioned the Duchess of Windsor. Last night Mrs. Roosevelt spoke on the radio, and told the audience how the Duchess had visited her at her office, and what a chic hat she wore. This was a wonderful crack at Wally, as here all newspapers have been very critical of the number of trinkets she brought for a 3 weeks visit and the number of hats she bought. In one paper, right after describing the Duchess's newest

chapell they just mentioned: "And all  
this time the Germans are 50 miles from  
Moscow." I wonder, if I wrote her asking  
to pay the passage money for one refugee,  
what would her reaction be? I think  
I shall discuss this with Kelvin tonight

permission. She disgusts me!

Now I'll stop being nasty, and  
send this epistle off, so you can get

Dear Miss Loeb:

The following are our cases of the week:

TRITSCH Walter. In your 204 you ask for new references. We have already sent you 5 names but Mr. Tritsch now tells us that he is not at all astonished that no one can give affidavits, the names he gave being only those of people he wanted me to use as scientific references. As a matter of fact he has no relations who could provide him with an affidavit. The only relations he has are 1) a brother who was before the war in London and whose address he does not know and 2) a sister of his wife, Martha Spohn who is in a Franciscan Convent at St. John School, Rubicon, Wisconsin. Mr. Tritsch says that he has good prospects of obtaining the post of professor at the Cath HighSchool at St. Francisco. He counts on the support of the president of the above school, William Drew, Professor Hallgarten of Berkeley University (Department of History) and on Dom Otto Duke of Wurtenberg, Director of the International Help for Catholic Refugees.

ULIMAN Ludwig. You asked us in your 212 to help him. His case is similar to that of Helmuth Simons about whom we wrote you in our letter no. 197 (Fifth weekly letter). We assisted him for some time (June 25th to November 24th, 1941) and he received from us more than 6.000 Fr. We stopped his assistance because his visa prospects seemed remote, but we are taking him on again on receipt of your cable.

WOLFF Margot. Mr. Fry will certainly tell you all about this case which is an old one. We do not know what her chances are for obtaining an American visa, but she seems to be expecting to receive her Mexican visa shortly and she has asked us to see about the payment of her passage; according to Miss Wolff Mr. Fry gave her a definite promise about this when he was here. Of course we know that many people say this. But will you in any case consult her references and ask them if they will be really to pay the passage in case she obtains the visa.

LUDWIG & IRENE ULLMANN

Mr Ludwig Ullmann and his wife, both in the early 40's, have applied for an Emergency Visitor's Visa to the United States. Thus far we have sponsorship affidavits and a biographical sketch, but we have been unable to secure the affidavits of support.

Mr and Mrs Ullmann were both born in Austria. Mr Ullmann is a writer and lecturer, and one of the leading dramatic critics. He belonged to the staffs of newspapers that were known as defenders of democracy, and he was instrumental in popularizing one paper so that it led the campaign against Hitlerism and Fascism.

Hitler's occupation of Austria was a signal for Mr Ullmann to leave there. He escaped to Hungary, where he waited for his wife. Both then proceeded to Paris, France. Mr Ullmann refused to compromise in his principles although he knew that the Gestapo had been searching for him and had missed him in Hungary by just a few minutes.

In Paris, Mr Ullmann continued his fight against Hitlerism through his writings and lectures. When war broke out, he resumed his efforts to fight Fascism and Fifth Column activities. When the Germans marched into Paris, Mr and Mrs Ullmann again had to flee. They finally reached southern France where they traveled from place to place, until they settled in the part of unoccupied France where they are at present.

Mr and Mrs Ullmann live in continued dread that the Nazi authorities will demand the extradition of Mr Ullmann. This, of course, is not unlikely in view of Mr Ullmann's well known anti-Nazi activities. Mr Ullmann has written on the subject of American democracy, and on America in general. He was always anxious to bring to the people in his own country, a real knowledge of American institutions and ideals.

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

Miss Strunsky:

Emil Berger as a German and Hlavaty, an Austrian, have both received their Mexican visas. The difficulties which the others have experienced are essentially due to the difference between the declarations the applicants made here and those made in Mexico by their sponsors and not from the nationality of the applicant. We tried to explain this in our letter 228 of May 7th. We were glad to read in your cable 243 that you have better hopes as regards Mexican visas. Here too, there is a marked improvement in the situation since last we wrote you. The old special Mexican visas issued here according to the France-Mexican agreement of August 1939 remain valid and do not require to be reconfirmed by the Mexican government as was the case up till last week. Therefore we have every hope that most of our cases will be able to leave on the next Hicem boat for Mexico, including JOHANNES ROMPLER, for whom we will arrange a passage at the best possible terms.

**U.S. visas:** The prospects do not seem to be as black as feared regarding visas for enemy aliens. Ludwig Ullmann and Hans Kalischer have received convocations to get their American visas provided they have the necessary papers.



Dr. Marcel Friedman phoned and advised us that Mrs. Gessner informed him that she received a very desperate letter from the Ullmanns in Marseille, that money should be deposited with HIAS OR HICEM for their passage immediately.

Dr. Friedman suggested that Miss Lewinski phone Miss Lilly Darvas (Molnar) who has \$275.00 for the transportation of the Ullmanns and tell her to deposit it with the HIAS and advise her about making all the arrangements so that after this is done the HIAS in New York can cable to their HICEM office in Lisbon.
