#### PEE GEE THINKS PARENT SELECTION MAY IMPROVE MARRIAGE INSTITUTION

To THE EDITOR:

Marriage is one of the most fundamental and essential institutions in the world. Our foundation of modern society rests upon it. And when marriage becomes merely a sham to conceal the lust of love, the pillars will give way, and

the structure will crumble us to destruction.

Marriage has been likened to a house with broken win dows, a leaking roof, and decaying beams. Can we repair our house, and make it a fit place in which to live? Or must we have some entirely new dwelling place which will

appease our modern propensities? And then again marriage is the root, trunk and branches of our family tree. The heart is sound, but some of the branches are decayed. Must we how down the massive giant, or must we merely cut from it some of the limbs? In other words, if our marriage institution is at fault, and I believe it is, must we abandon it entirely, or may we remodel our present and worn institution in order to make it a success?

Parent Selection Best

There is something wrong with the marriage institution that seems evident. In spite of the fact that man has made use of it for centuries, our modern, so-called "jazz" age, demands some alteration. There is a "je ne sais quot which is lacking; otherwise there would not be so many divorces, so many misfit marriages.

I often wonder if the old time method of parents choosing mates for their children is not the best way after all. We have dwelt for years under the illusion that marriages are made in heaven. That may be true, but the person with whom we must live from day to day is a perfectly normal human being whose wants are far from ethereal-However when parents do the selecting, at least they choose with a calm and cool discretion.

When a young couple marry they are in a mild state of insanity. The matter of choice and predilection is in abeyance before all consuming passion of love. Are two such people in any condition to enter into a life-long contract? Will the insanity grow or diminish? All goes well for two or three months until the ardor has dissipated itself and then the two realize that they have a serious proposition to face; a real battle to fight.

The girl sees in the boy, characteristics which she never And the boy comes to the sad conclusion that his "little flower" may have thorns. Well, what are they going to do about it? They simply have to put up with it. Either the marriage bark flounders on a rock, or else they find solace in companionship. The institution depends upon which course the individual will take.

Polyandry in Ladac

Our civilization depends upon the family, and the family is in turn dependent for its sustenance upon marriage. Some will argue that we have used our present marriage ritual for hundreds of years, therefore let it remain undisturbed. This would be the line of least resistance, the easiest way out, but is it the best? Will the ideas of last century help us in solving the marital problems of our hurly-burly age?

Wise Child Who Knows Father

When we accepted our Christian program of present day marriage, we cast off, as slag from the boiling metal, the dust covered, misused marriage customs of heathen lands. For example, How would we make use of the traditional marriage rites of the nomadic people of Ladac in Central Asia? In Ladac the woman marries a man and at the same time automatically joins in wedlock with all the brothers of her husband. And, of course, the oldest brother has the privilege of nuptial delights. When the younger brothers notice the shoes of the potential head of the family on the door steps of the wife, they "turn tail." All in all it is a wise child in Ladac that knows his own father. This is interesting, however, only in that we see how impossible this custom of marriage laws as unsuited, as inadequate to our ultra-modern age?

Marriage Is Fundamental

It is a splendid thought to imagine that we live for race improvement. We live to give our best to our children, and for this end, marriage is fundamental and permanent. But statistics tell us that today the best people that by all natural laws, should have large families, are scarcely giving life to a single offspring per couple. Many say that people get along "well enough" with the antiquated traditions of marriage. But is it sufficient to just get along? Shouldn't marriage which has come to legalize love mean far more than "well enough"? Marriage of this meaningless type tends to make people stop loving each other. Is this the mission of marriage? The answer is decidedly negative. What then is the remedy? How can we make two young people live in happy unison after the love-heat has cooled?

Happiness Requires Freedom

Happiness Requires Freedom

This can be done only by allowing each a certain amount of freedom. Each must recognize the other as an independent human being, for true happiness lives only through freedom. All marriages with freedom may not be happy, but there is a mighty good chance that happiness will result. However, there is one thing certain that marriage without freedom can not be happy except as master and serf. Marriage minus freedom is bondage. And where there is bondage, devotion can never replace young love, and the marriage bark will flounder.

Companionate Marriage

But how will we guarantee this freedom to the contracting couple? The answer is "companionate marriage." We like to avoid this unconventional term, but we are finding a scientific wrap to garb it in. To society companionate marriage means free love, trial marriage, where the couple Eve together without a legal ecremony. Then there is the scientific interpretation of companionate marriage. There is a legalized temporary marriage and each must contribute. Further the idea is not to have children until the marriage has been proved workable. If children come, then convert the temporary marriage into a lasting "family" marriage.

There are many good points to this suggestion and the dea is based upon deep thought and clear conception. How do you know that you will love your mate at forty as you do at twenty? Only through marriage do people become truly acquainted with each other. And if they find their natures incompatible, what is the result today divorce-possible disgrace. This is but one of the advantages of companionate marriage, in that it will test the value of a love before life-long marriage. And among the many other advantages may be sighted the lessening of constraint. The element of freedom which is so essential, will be infilled, and as a result there will be less prostitution. And lastly, companionate marriage will stop this so-called "petting." This all will mean less heartache, less suffering, less need-less pain.

Make Marriage More Difficult

Is marriage then a success? My response is XO. For we cannot adjust our marital problems to century obstandards. The only way to make the institution of marriage play its ever admirable role, is to grant to the individual more freedom, and freedom may come through companionate marriage.

Further we must make marriage more difficult, and divorce easier. Divorce is really an ally to marriage, for it removes the unadjustable couple from our midst, and lets the true marriage institution of happiness mould the lives of its children to a vivid and joyous completion of life's ideal—family—love children.


