A number of students who have been presenting impromptu performances will be presented in a live listening hour Sunday afternoon in the Student Lounge from 2:15 until 3:30 p.m.

The first performer will be Tomasz Kreszowski, a Polish ex-graduate student. Tomasz, who has been playing the piano for four years, has shown his talent to the faculty of Waterbury Hall on many occasions. ### State Holds New Name

The State University Board of Trustees has announced that the University's eleven Colleges of Education have a new name as of Friday, October 13. Albany State's official title is now the State University College at Albany.

The Trustees' action follows approval last month by the Board of Regents of the University's plan to establish undergraduate curricula in the liberal arts and sciences at the teacher education colleges. A program of gradual and orderly transition of these colleges to multi-purpose institutions will be initiated.

Since non-teacher education students eventually will be admitted to study general programs at the colleges over a varying schedule of dates, from 1962 to 1965, the Trustees determined their names should be changed to reflect this departure from their previously highly specialized nature.

### Please Clean Our Commons

Pat Benedetto, Grand Marshal of Campus Commission, has commented on the closing of the Commons. Because of the condition in which the Commons has often been found, Campus Commission suggested closing it the day after it is found untidy.

Although Senate has approved the rules and regulations of Campus Commission, including locking the Commons, the student body has protested it. If the Commons is closed in the morning, it will be open in the afternoon so that students will have access to Student Mail.

If anyone desires an open meeting with Campus Commission, that meeting will be held.

### Dr. Hatfield To Lecture

Dr. Henry C. Hatfield, Professor of Germanic Literature at Harvard University, will present a series of lectures for the Comparative Literature department here at State.

Dr. Hatfield is one of the most distinguished authorities on Thomas Mann in the country today. He has written many notable and scholarly exegeses on the works of Mann, including *Death in the Late Works of Thomas Mann*.

Winklemann, the great German author, has also been a subject of a scholarly study by Dr. Hatfield. *Winklemann and His German Critics*, another highly lauded treatise, has permitted Dr. Hatfield to enjoy a reputation of being a diversified literary critic.

Last year Dr. Hatfield was a visiting lecturer in the American Free University in Berlin, where his lectures proved both stimulating and challenging for the students.

Dr. Wallace, head of the Comparative Literature department, said, on behalf of the entire department and student body, that we are all certainly proud and honored to have such a savant and distinguished person as Dr. Hatfield lecturing at State.

### ISC Outlines Rushing Rules

Judith Kaminsky '62, President of ISC, has announced the rules governing sorority rushing.

1. No freshman girls are allowed at sorority apartments at any time during the rushing period.

2. No more than three sorority girls are allowed in freshman rooms at the same time.

3. Non-residents of a dormitory cannot frequent rooms only between the hours of 7 and 8 p.m. This applies seven days a week.

4. It is permissible to phone a computer for a sorority pizza party in the houses where there are primarily freshmen, such as early sorority girls may enter freshmen between 2 and 4 p.m. A freshman may be asked on the day of the party from 7 to 11 p.m. on Friday, and from 4 to 8 p.m. on Sunday.

5. Freshman girls cannot be invited anywhere but to a sorority party between the hours of 7 and 8 p.m., except on Wednesday.

6. If a sorority girl is the driver of a car pool, the ISC president must be contacted if she has a freshman girl as a passenger. However, if an independent is the driver, a sorority girl and a freshman may be passengers in the same automobile without the permission of ISC.

7. The silent period on December 9 has been changed from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m.

8. If a sorority girl wants to visit an upperclassman in one of the dormitories and the upperclassman is entertaining freshmen girls before the sorority girls enter, the sorority girl may not enter.

Pledges, inactive, and alumni are subject to rushing rules.

Wednesday, in a high spirited, well fought grid battle on Vet's field, an inspired APA football team was frustrated in their attempt to overthrow the Potter dynasty in AMIA football. The Potter victory virtually clinched the league title for them, since their only remaining is with TXO, who have yet to come out victorious in their first year in the league.

APA seemed to be on its way to victory as they controlled the ball for most of the first half, scoring on an intercepted pass by Bob Pollero. It wasn't until the fourth quarter that EEP began to move the ball and midway through the period they hit the scoring column with a beautiful pass-run play from C quarterback Camarrata to Bob Dzikowitz. A jump pass to Dick Mann for the conversion point put the Pottermen one point up on APA who had failed to make their extra-point attempt in the first half.

The valiant APA squad put on a determined fight the rest of the way, but their tiring defensive backfield slacked just enough to allow a Camarrata to Spicci pass get by them for second touchdown. The conversion failed.

The first period saw little action as both teams seemed to be feeling each other out. The second quarter, however, was completely different as APA caught on fire. Pollero took a punt all the way, but was called back on a questionable decision by the referee. A tremendous punt by Chuck Hunter put Potters back against the wall and a few plays later Pollero grabbed a Potter pass and scooted 10 yards for the score. As the half closed, but a Mike Goldstein interception gave the ball to APA who ran out the clock.

Potter came to life the second half as Camarrata hit on 5 consecutive passes to move the ball to the 20 yard line. APA stopped the drive and was able to contain the Club for the remainder of the quarter and part of the fourth quarter. Then Dzikowitz grabbed the ball on a pass play and dodged past three defenders for the crucial score.

Dick Mann made a beautiful pick-off of an APA pass to give EEP the ball. Several plays later Camarrata lofted a long spiraling pass into the waiting hands of Pat Speier for the final TD of the game. APA was unable to get off a pass in waning minute as the Potter Defense put on a great rush.

### Frosh Booters Top Hudson 2-1 For 2nd Win

State's Frosh soccer team registered its second win of the season last Wednesday, as the hard-pressing Peds sent Hudson Valley down to a 2-1 defeat. The victory brought State's record up to two wins and three defeats, with three games remaining to be played.

Joe Procopio, State's center forward, blasted the winning goal for the Purple & Gold via a beautiful pass from Pete Schroeck with six minutes remaining in the game. This tally broke the ice for Procopio, the leading State scorer with five goals, who had some "hunger" his last two times out.

State was the first to draw blood in this see-saw battle when within one minute left in the third period, Al Hennokson relayed an Ekhard Pronsing corner kick into the net. Hudson Valley bounced right back, however, scoring their goal early in the fourth period when the ball took a bad hop and bounced over State goalie Will Scott. From then on it was a State ball game, as the Peds went all out staving a lead, until Procopio scored his goal to last the game wide open.

In sharp contrast to the second half, when the sharp Frosh play, they have the fruit of two goals, the first half was a war. The Peds, continually outmaneuvered Hudson Valley in the first half driving to the goal time after time, but losing the ball at the critical moment. Procopio in particular was made victim of this peculiar play, and might well have been the goat of the game if State had lost.

Prior to this game the Frosh braved the rain and wind of Vet's Field last Saturday, only to lose 5-0 at the hands of a superior Colgate squad. The always strong Colgate Frosh, who defeated State in overtime last year, were never seriously threatened in the first half, as the victors moved away to a 2-0 lead. The third quarter took over when a strong Colgate goal, scored State offense which kept Colgate unable to score.

The Frosh take to the road to-morrow against the tough Oswego booters.

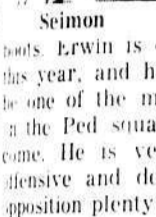
Edwin Seimon is at present the highest scoring man on the Ped squad. He has averaged two goals a game for six games totaling twelve goals.



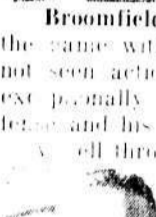

While winning games like these are not out of style, the team also has a little side contest underway, not unlike the M&M dual of yesterday. Only in State's case it's S & G who are going at it.



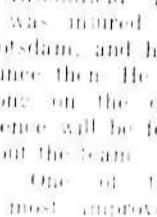

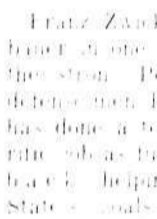
Erwin Seimon scored three goals in his first six games, the conference sophomore has performed admirably this year, and is just closing in on the State record of 11 goals in a single season.



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This past Saturday, neither driving rain nor chilling cold could daunt the varsity soccer standard bearers. This weather and the freshman game earlier in the day made the field slippery and sloppy. However, we were seemingly unbothered by it as we rolled to a 7-0 victory over Plattsburgh. State had complete control from beginning to end.

Our scoring punch was performing like a well oiled machine. Erwin Seimon scored two quick goals giving us a 2-0 lead and uping his season total to 11. Karl Heinz Gerstenberger and Phil Shaw, a newcomer to the scoring column, each scored a goal handing our colorbearers a 4-0 lead at the end of the quarter. Gerstenberger scored the only goal of the second quarter giving us the half time lead of 5-0.

Our defense, led by Gary Penfield as goalie, contained Plattsburgh's scoring punch and held them scoreless throughout the game. This is the second unscored game in a row.

In the second half, the Peds continued to roll in high gear. Gerstenberger connected for two more goals in the third quarter, making the score 7-0 at the end of the third quarter. His fourth goal tied Erwin Seimon for the season record. The State all-time record is also four goals for one game. Shaw added another goal in the fourth quarter giving us the game victory, 8-0. This was our fifth victory of the season and our fourth in the conference.

Despite the lousy weather, there were several staunch supporters. These cheerers illustrated the true spirit of State College. In the future, as long as the weather permits, supporters should be more numerous. However, Coach Garcia was glad that there were at least some supporters for this Homecoming game.

Coach Garcia had several comments about tomorrow's away game with Oswego. "Oswego will be one of the toughest games this season. This game is their Homecoming game and as always the team will be 'up' for it. The rivalry between this school and theirs has always been very keen. The loser of this game has to provide a soccer ball with the date and the score of the game. Plans are being laid to have an annual trophy for the winner. They are skilled and very efficient. However, our team has been playing like a team. They don't have any individualists. I have waited for a team like this for 11 years and I think that they will be able to go far."
