### **University Foundation Elects Officers, New Directors**

ALBANY - The University at Albany Foundation elected officers and welcomed new directors for 1993-94 at its recent annual meeting.

Roberta Bastow, a 1981 Albany graduate and president of the University's Alumni Association, was named ex-officio member of the board. Bastow is vice president of the Government & Corporate Services Department at Fleet Bank of New York.

The University at Albany Foundation, a not-for-profit corporation, devises and executes community programming activities that enhance the University's relationship with its Capital Region neighbors. The foundation is also responsible for Albany's fundraising and fiscal accountability needs. During the coming year, the foundation will continue to develop close ties between the University and the community, and assist with the Campaign for Albany, an initiative that seeks to raise \$55 million in private support by December 1999; \$25 million of that amount will be realized by the end of 1994, the University's Sesquicentennial year. The Campaign for Albany total already stands at more than \$20.1 million; that figure represents 36 percent of the overall goal and 80 percent of the Phase I objective. Foundation members will also help to plan and carry out special events that will be held to observe the University at Albany's 150th anniversary in 1994.



### University Student Selected for International Conference in Africa

ALBANY - Venita Whidbee, a junior at the University at Albany and the daughter of Jerome and Ramona Whidbee of Spring Valley, N.Y., has been selected to present a paper during an international conference of the National Council for Black Studies, which will be held in Accra, Ghana, West Africa, July 30 through Aug. 8. Whidbee was selected from among students submitting papers in the course "The Black Community."

Her paper is titled "Defeating the Myths About the Unwed Black Father." Her trip will be sponsored, in part, by a special grant from the office of University President H. Patrick Swygert, and by private donations from Charles Touhey of Albany, and Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Minniefield of Central Nyack. A donation was also made by SABOSA, an African-American singles organization.

In addition to Whidbee, faculty members Vivian Gordon and Joseph Sarfoh of the Department of Africana Studies are scheduled to give conference presentations. A third faculty member, Marcia Sutherland, is expected to attend as well. The subject of Gordon's presentation is "Approaches to the Teaching of Africana Studies in Traditionally Urban Universities." During a pre-conference forum, Gordon will also do a presentation on "The Impact of the Criminal Justice System on the African-American Family."

Sarfoh's paper is titled "Immigrants from Africa and the Future of the African-American Population."

The theme of the conference, which is co-sponsored by the W.E.B. DuBois Centre, the Universities of Ghana and the Association of African Universities, is "Uniting African World Scholars and Communities: Global Realities and Social Transformation."

#### Local High School Students to Do DNA Research on University Campus

ALBANY - Twenty-one local high school students will have the opportunity to work on a DNA project at the University at Albany July 22 to July 30, through a course called DNA Science and Technology.

Sponsored by the University at Albany's summer session, this innovative course will introduce students to the latest technology in DNA science. The theory behind DNA fingerprinting and its uses will be covered. The students, each of whom has been recommended by his or her school, pay tuition for one credit hour for the laboratory course. Course hours are 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Through this course, high school students will have the opportunity to work with state-of-the-art genetic engineering equipment. The equipment was purchased through a grant written by teachers for the Greater Capital Region Teacher Center.

From July 5 to 16, this same equipment is being used by area high school biology teachers for a three-credit graduate level course on Molecular Biology for Teachers. Tuition and fees for the teachers were funded through a grant from the Howard Hughes Foundation. In this course, teachers are exposed to many of the latest research techniques used in DNA and molecular biology research labs.

Joan Wagner of Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake Central Schools and George Seymour of Watervliet Central Schools are the instructors for the high school students. Both are members of the Capital District DNA Group.

### Biodiversity Endowment Established at the University at Albany

The University at Albany has received an endowment from alumna and former library faculty member Harriet Dyer Adams to support the new Program in Biodiversity, Conservation and Policy. The endowment recognizes the pioneering work done by her late father, noted ecologist Dr. Charles C. Adams, in the first half of this century.

The fund will underwrite graduate fellowships, visiting lecturers, student research and other educational activities associated with the University's new master's degree program in Biodiversity, Conservation and Policy. Based in the Department of Biology, the program will be on the forefront of addressing worldwide concerns about the destruction of animal and plant habitats, the extinction of rare species and the erosion of our environment.

University President H. Patrick Swygert said, "We deeply appreciate Ms. Adams' generosity and her vision for the future. This endowment will truly be on the cutting edge of education and research. It will permit us to educate the next generation of leaders in this important area."

Adams added, "Scientists and policy-makers alike have to understand ecology.

We must all be interested and become involved."

Charles C. Adams was a pioneer in the field of ecology and an environmental activist who is recognized as one of the fathers of the modern environmental movement. He served as director of the New York State Museum from 1926 to 1943. Harriet Dyer

Adams received her master's in library science from the University in 1960. She returned to work as a reference librarian in the Graduate School of Public Affairs and then as a rare book librarian until her retirement in 1977.

### Vincent J. Schaefer, Founder of ASRC, Dies at 87

Vincent J. Schaefer, 87, the founder of the University's Atmospheric Sciences Research Center and the father of modern-day cloud physics, died July 25 at Ellis Hospital in Schenectady.

Known worldwide for his discovery in 1946 that the dry ice seeding of supercooled clouds could lead to the production of snow and rain, Schaefer founded the ASRC after an illustrious collaboration at the General Electric Co. Research Lab with Nobel Laureate Irving Langmuir. At the GE lab, Schaefer and Langmuir were co-inventors of the high-efficiency artificial fog smoke screen generator widely used during World War II.

This partnership - which produced a brilliant string of scientific discoveries - began when Schaefer, an instrument maker, was assigned to be Langmuir's research assistant. Schaefer had dropped out of Schenectady High School at the age of 15 to help support his family, but found his way into a career in science through the apprenticeship program at General Electric.

Founding the ASRC in 1960 with \$50,000 from an Albany dean, Schaefer went on to build the organization into one of the most prestigious centers of its kind in the nation.
