

In that vague, simple sentence lies the most deadly power given to any association commission, for that commission has taken it upon itself to disqualify any candidate not conforming to its acts. Nowhere does the constitution give it this power. By so doing the commission over-steps its bounds, stifling and strangling instead of regulating.

There are issues in our student government that need a public airing, yet if any one candidate should challenge his opponent to a debate (as Mr. Molineux suggests), Election Commission would disqualify him. This does not set well with free democratic election principles.

Our elections are not interesting to students as turally, larger budgets will make ed by election commission so that the low voting percentages testify.
