SEMINAR ON PENSIONS AT SUNYA

STATE DEPARTMENT PLANS METRIC CONVERSION MEETING AT SUNYA

The New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets will host a metric conversion planning conference on Tuesday, Nov. 25, at State University of New York at Albany. The primary goals are to alert and inform the various state agencies relative to the impending use of the metric system and to study the financial, managerial, and political impact on state government as well as on industry and the citizens of New York.

According to Commissioner John S. Dyson, of the State Department of Agriculture and Markets, "The experience of conversion to metric weights and measures in other nations has shown us the importance of preparing the public. A concerted education effort is vital to a timely transition to metric living."

Tentative plans call for a morning session which will host various prominent speakers discussing metrication. Among those addressing conference delegates will be Jeff Olom, National Bureau of Standards; Adrian Weaver, chairman, American National Metric Council; and Paul Boire, executive director, Canadian Metric Commission. An afternoon session will consist of work shops which will study the effects of metrication on specific sectors of government, business, and industry.

The State Departments of Transportation and Education, the Cooperative Extension Service, Hudson Valley Community College, and SUNYA are working with the Department of Agriculture and Markets on the conference.

NEW ENGLAND PURITANS EXHIBIT AT UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

In the spirit of Bicentennial awareness, an exhibit of texts, portraits, and literature dealing with the New England Puritans from 1620 to 1750 is on display in the main cases of the State University of New York at Albany Library through Nov. 18.

Entitled "Major Figures of Puritan New England, 1620-1750," the exhibit features works of history, literature, theology, and philosophy. Among those represented are: William Bradford, Anne Bradstreet, Jonathan Edwards, Cotton Mather, Samuel Sewall, Edward Taylor, and Michael Wigglesworth. All items on exhibit are from the holdings of the SUNYA Library, and a brief, descriptive commentary accompanies each work.

An item of particular interest in the exhibit is a 1799 printing of Johathan Edward's "The Justice of God in the Damnation of Sinners," a sermon preached at Northampton, Mass., by the leader of the evangelical revival of Puritanism, also known as the "Great Awakening." The text, which is part of the Rare Book Collection of Special Collections in the SUNYA Library, is significant as a respresnetative piece illistrating book-binding techniques during the late 18th and early 19th centuries in America.

Ronald Bosco, of the department of English, has organized and provided the commentaries for the exhibit.


