### 'Ike' Emerges Victorious In State's Straw Vote

#### Survey Continues **GOP Tradition**

As the nation goes to the polls this Tuesday, State College will al-ready have selected its presidential choice, having, for the fourth consecutive time, given the Republican nominee preference in the race for the top office of the land. In the political poll conducted last Friday, with 761 or 58.5% of the student body participating, Dwight D. Eis-enhower, Republican candidate for the presidency, received 63% of the votes cast for that office. His closest contestant, Governor Adlai E. Stevenson, garnered 36% of the ballots cast for president, while the remaining 1% of the votes were divided among Thomas, Hallinan, Russell, and Taft.
