ALBANY, August 10 - Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller has warned all branches of the State government they will be expected to stay within their current budgets next year.

In a terse communication to all State departments, agencies and all divisions and agencies within the Executive Department, Mr. Rockefeller said that with increased taxes being paid by the people he is "determined that the budget this year be the tightest possible . . ."

His letter reads:

Solomon E. Senior, board chairman, has told the board staff to split their vacations between summer and winter. Divided vacations, he said, has become "standard practice among carriers, physicians and a large segment of industry."

A recent survey convinced the board that aplit vacations would not only benefit the employees, but would also help avoid many unnecessary adjournments on the referees' calendars during the Christmas season when witnesses, physicians and attorneys do not seem to be readily available for appearances.

The new policy will affect principally those working directly on or with the calendars, but its adoption is being encouraged wherever a bureau or office head can extend it without disrupting or curtailing the work routine.

2. No State purposes appropriation request for any department or agency may exceed the total appropriation available to that agency for 1959-60. This means that funds for any new or expanded programs will have to be "absorbed". If there are increases that are absolutely essential to render proper service to the growing popuation of the State, which cannot be "absorbed," such items may be submitted separately for special consideration.

3. Your State purposes budget request must be accompanied by a specific report showing exactly what modifications you would undertake to make an over-all cut of 5 percent from the 1959-60 appropriation for your department or agency. These should be reported in terms of the priority you place on them. The amounts of such reductions which will finally be made will depend on the total Budget and economic picture as well as the specific nature and effect of the items.

Fino Asks C.O. Salary U.S. Hiring At Police Dept. Level

Pay, opportunities and benefits of correction officers should be the same as for police, U.S. Rep. Paul A. Fino (D., N. Y.) stated last week.

In a "Dear Abe" letter to Budget Director Abraham D. Beame, Congressman Fino said that unless correction officers are so treated, the Correction Department will not be able to hire enough correction officers through its regular examination procedures-and will have to add provisional employees to its forces.

The Congressman was Civil Service Commissioner from 1950 to 1952. This is his letter:

"My dear Abe:

"As a former member of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, I wish to express my personal feelings on the serious problems affecting the Department of Correction.

"I am disturbed in learning that the City is encountering difficulties in attracting good. qualified men willing to accept positions as Correction Officers in the Correction Department.

"I have been reliably informed that only 696 men qualified in the open competitive examination. Of this number, it is expected that approximately 150 men would be eligible or willing to accept a position. This, I understand, will fall short of the present needs of the department. This means that the complex duties in this department will continue to be entrusted to provisional help, who, you and I know, are not the best qualified nor the high-

"I realize that the problem of recruitment is always a serious one. And it becomes more difficult unless the position is made attractive by offering good pay, opportunities and benefits.

"In view of the fact that examinations and qualifications Correction Officers are identical to those required by the Police Department, I find it difficult to understand the reasons for this "step-child" treatment. If everything else is par why the difference in pay, benefits and promotion opportuni-

"It is simple to understand why qualified men seek a career in the police department instead of the correction department. It offers better attraction.

"If we are to recruit the best qualified men for the Correction Department and we demand that they possess the same qualifications, perform similar duties and assume the same kind of responsibilities as policemen, then, it stands to reason that the salaries, promotion opportunities and other benefits be identical.

"I am afraid that unless some firm and affirmative action is taken by the City to equalize the pay and benefits of the Correction Officer to that of the Police Officer, it will not be able to recruit nor retain the best and the most qualified men so necessary to do the difficult job in a very important department of our City."

Expected To Expand

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10 - You can expect to see a small boom in the hiring of Federal employees

What with small budgets, economy drives in the Administration and Congress, etc., Federal agencies have had to make do with the number of employees they already had-up to now. But the numbers quitting, retiring, transferring, being promoted, etc., have stretched present staffs too thin.

Overloading the present staffs can only go so far. Once past that point, you have to start taking on new workers.

There has always been a shortage of scientists and engineers. But now agencies are finding that they also have too few clerks. typists, stenographers and personnel in similar skills and trades. As a result, there has been a quiet growth of hiring.

Right now, the new recruiting being done on a piecemeal basis. Each agency, each area, each office is taking on new people on its own, on an individual basis. There are few big job announcements. Job-seekers get the word about vacancies by contacting the separate agencies, or by knowing somebody.

The guess is that, within a year or two, unless vacancies are filled quickly, there may be a move to recruit employees on a wider



Social Security Entrance a Great Opportunity"

The renewal of the opportunity for public employees to take advantage of Social Security coverage should be halled as a great opportunity. It came about through the passage of a bill during the last legislature which was the result of negotiations between the Faderal government and the State. The Civil Service Employees Association had urged that this new opportunity be given,

Unquestionably, a lack of the full appreciation of the good benefits of Social Security insurance motivated many employees to say "no" the first time this insurance was offered in 1957. Now both the Federal and New York State government have given a second chance. This chance will be available until September 30, 1959. Speaking at the 34th annual convention of the New York State Police Conference in Buffalo, Levitt said, "The continued rise in bond interest rates coupled with our newly acquired power to invest in higher yielding, high grade corporate bonds and the expansion of our mortgage investment program, should result in a more rapid increase in overall yields. In addition to the possibility of a higher interest return, turn. an improvement in investment earnings may also permit an expansion of current benefits."

Now Highest In 15 Years

In discussing a 4 per cent return Levitt cited the fact that the present rate of 3.50 is higher than that earned in the last 15 years. He said, "When I became trustee of the System in 1955 I expanded the mortgage program and developed legal sources of new investments in order to reverse the downward trend of earnings and to step up the current yields."

Levitt traced the history of the System's interest guarantee. He established in 1921 and a 4 per cent yield guaranteed, it was possible to earn 6 per cent on highgrade investments. However, by

Guns Asked By Welfare Patrolmen 4 6 1

Welfare Department patrolmen are suing for the right to carry guns on duty.

Suit was filed last week by George Johnston, as an individual and as president of the Welfare Patrolmen's Association. Named were Welfare Commissioner Dumpson, Police Commissioner Kennedy and Mayor Wagner.

Time of the hearing will be Wednesday, Aug. 26, before Supreme Court Justice John L.

The men were allowed to carry guns until 1955, the suit stated, but this permission ended in that

Mr. Johnston said, "To be unarmed in the performance of Welfare patrolmen's duties is a danger, peril and a hazard to the public at large and to the patrolman."

He said that "criminals, devi-The New York City Personnel ates, alcoholics and all forms of social outcasts" imperil municipal lodging houses and the public.

The suit gave these examples of violence encountered by Welfare patrolmen: Several thousand bottles of liquor are confiscated in the lodging houses each year. Bookbinder 20 Two patrolmen were injured last May trying to subdue one man in the East Eighth Street men's shelter. The same month, another patrolman had his arm slashed by a shelter inhabitant he was questioning.

"Between the emotionally disturbed clients who need or are criminals and perverts that habituate the muricipal lodging houses, I and others similarly situated are consistently exposed to altuations in which we must prevent violence and crime," Mr. Johnston stated.

Meter-Maid P'an Set for Council OK

The "meter maid" plan to use women to police City parking meters seems slated to go through. After several weeks of discussion, City Council committee has okayed the second version of the plan, that will probably be bassed by the Council late this week.

The "maids" will have authority only over parking space at meters and off-street metered areas. The bill was re-introduced in its new form by Councilman Eric J. Treulich (D., Queens).

X-Ray Control Is Needed

INTEREST IN THE licensing and registration of X-ray and radiation technicians is mounting. Physicians and public officials are confering in the interest of State legislation to guard against the dangers to both patients and technicians who are not properly qualified.

Examples of patients dying from over-exposure are not lacking. The effect on inept technicians may take years to show up, but at least the fact that their work is extremely hazardous to them is beyond dispute.

The State Legislature in its last session recognized the need for more rigorous control. It passed a registration and licensing bill. But Governor Rockefeller vetoed it, evidently because of concerted opposition from certain quarters, including medical groups. Since then, some of the medical groups have changed their mind. It now appears that a bill can be drafted that will be acceptable, even if not completely satisfactory, to all parties.

The minimum requirements for training and experience represent one area where agreement should not be difficult. Employee groups will insist in keeping the "grandfather clause," the provision that means that no employee who has been competently filling the technician sob will be dismissed for lack of educational requirements new appointees must meet.

The Federal government is now seeking medical and X-ray technicians at \$4,490 to start. Four years of technical, clinical laboratory experience are required, including Police. Firemen or supplemented by at least a year of X-ray lab experience, with at least six months of supervisory experience during the four years. The Federal position is comparable to that of X-ray and radiation technicians employed by New York State and New York City. With 30,000 radiation and X-ray machines in operation in the United States, reputedly radiating more than all the fallout from A-bomb testing, it is imperative that all groups unite to obtain life-saving legislation.

Tax-Deductible Loans Sought for

New York City Council Minority Leader Stanley M. Isaacs (Republican-Manhattan) has introduced two bills to amend the Adminission funds.

The bills would make it possible for firemen and policemen borrowing money from their pension funds to deduct the interest paid on such leans from their Federal and State income tax.

State Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz ruled, in an opinion issued March 9, 1959, that members of the State Retirement System could deduct interest paid on pension fund loans from their State income tax.

At the same time, he asked the U.S. Internal Revenue Service for a ruling to permit the deduction from Federal income taxes. The resulting ruling by the IRS was that when employees borrowed and for drawing better-qualified from the pension system rather than from their own money in the pension system, they could deduct the interest on the loan from their Federal income taxes.

Councilman Isaacs' two bills would change the wording which governs pension fund loans by City police and firemen. As it reads now, it provides that a person "may borrow from his funds in the pension fund." The amendment would make it read "may borrow from the pension fund."







New Salary Survey

Trainee Plan a Success; State Includes More Jobs

The State's trainee program for junior professional employees has come of age. That is the meaning of a memorandum last week from William J. Murray, administrative director of the Department of Civil Service, announcing that the program, which began as an experiment, will be continued and will be expanded to cover new positions.

The program was started Dec. 19, 1957. The memo stated, "An evaluation of the plan has indicated that it has been sufficiently successful in achieving its purpose to warrant its continuation and, at the request of appointing officers to be expended to certain additional titles."

Appointments will follow these practices as outlined in the words of the memo:

Original Appointments

Original appointments will be made from eligible lists established as the result of entrance level competitive examinations which will be held at least once annually. Appointments to Trainee positions shall be made from the most appropriate eligible lists. There are some cases where the work of the class is of such a nature that academic training in one of two or more disciplines is qualifying. In these instances, appointing officers may select Trainees from the list or lists which will best serve their current operational requirements.

Initial appointments to trainee titles will be made at a flat rate of \$4600 and the appointees will be paid from appropriations for the Grade 14 or 15 titles without the use of Form PR-50.

Appointment of Trainees to Grade 14 Titles

A probationary period of 26 bi-weekly payroll periods starting with the initial appointment from an eligible list will apply to all appointments made to trainee titles listed above with the provision that a probationary appointment may be terminated at any time after 13 bi-weekly payroll periods of Ex Chief Nurse at factorily completes the probationary period will gain permanent status at the Grade 14 or 15 level, as the case may be, in the class of work in which nurse he received his training. No employee may gain permanent status in any trainee title listed above. Those who do not satis- in 1952. factorily complete the probationary period will be released.

Continuance of Plan

The Civil Service Department will continue to require a training prospectus from each agency where the professional trainee plan is utilized. All such agencies are obligated to supervise carefully the training provided under this prospectus and to evaluate frequently the abilities and potential of the trainees during the probationary period so that those employees who are retained permanently will be fully qualified to discharge the responsibilities of the Grade 14 or 15 title.
