GEOFFREY YORK AND MELINDA COOK-CARPENTER SELECTED AS THE UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY'S ATHLETES OF THE YEAR

ALBANY, N.Y. -- Geoffrey York, a five-time national champion in track & field, and Melinda Cook-Carpenter, the ECAC Co-Player of the Year in softball, have been chosen as the University at Albany's 1994-95 Male and Female Athlete of the Year. The athletes were selected in voting by the head coaches of Albany's 23-sport intercollegiate program.

York, a senior from Troy, N.Y., was the 1995 NCAA Division III champion in both the indoor 55-meter hurdles and outdoor 110-hurdles events. He became just the second athlete in NCAA history to win three 110-hurdles titles, and matched a record held by Roger Retherford (Otterbein, 1974-76). York has won five NCAA championships in his career, including two 55-hurdles (1992, 1995) and three 110-hurdles crowns (1991, 1992, 1995).

In addition, York became Albany's first-ever IC4A champion in March, when he ran the fastest time ever by a Division III athlete (7.23 seconds) to defeat an all-Division I field in the 55-hurdles. One week later, York, the Dartmouth Relays and Collegiate Track Conference champion, set an NCAA meet and track record at nationals.

On the outdoor track circuit, York was fifth at the Penn Relays in the 110-hurdles, and won the Williams Relays. With a time of 13.85 seconds in the NCAA's 110-final, he became just the second hurdler to twice win both the indoor and outdoor championships in the same year. Frostburg State's Maynard Hurd won both in 1985 and 1986, while York scored his first double-victory in 1992. York's accomplishments helped Albany, as a team, to its best finishes at both the men's NCAA indoor (second) and outdoor (fourth) championships.

Cook-Carpenter, originally from Crestline, Calif., but who now resides in Ballston Spa, N.Y., shared the ECAC's top softball player award and was a first team all-star. The senior pitcher/outfielder posted an 11-3 record with one save, and had a 0.51 earned run average. She set an NCAA Division III national record for strikeout ratio by averaging 12.41 per seven innings, and had 15 or more strikeouts in four contests. A 5'6" right-hander, Cook-Carpenter registered seven shutouts, including three no-hit performances, and had the fourth longest scoreless innings streak in Division III history with 40 consecutive. On the season, she totaled 169 strikeouts and just five walks in 95.1 innings pitched.

As a hitter, Cook-Carpenter led the Great Danes in seven offensive categories, including batting average (.508), RBI (25), on-base percentage (.628) and slugging percentage (.762). Her efforts led Albany to the NYSWCAA championship final, and a school-record 23-7 mark.

Notes on Albany's performances at NCAA Division III Track & Field Championships

Geoffrey York: he won his third 110-meter hurdles title with an NCAA meet and stadium record, 13.85 seconds, in pouring rain and 45-degree temperatures...

York tied three NCAA records:

- 1) matched Roger Retherford (Otterbein, 1974-1975-1976) as the only 3-time 110-hurdles champion...York won his titles in 1991, 1992 & 1995...
- 2) he and Frostburg State's Maynard Hurd are the only hurdlers to sweep both the NCAA indoor 55 and outdoor 110 in the same year twice...Hurd accomplished the feat in 1985 and 1986, while York did it in 1992 and 1995...
- 3) also tied Hurd as the only hurdlers to win five NCAA championships...Hurd won the indoor 55 three times (1985-87) and the outdoor 110 twice (1986-87)...York won the outdoor 110 (1991, 1992, 1995) and the indoor 55 (1992, 1995)...

York is the eighth NCAA individual outdoor champion in school history...Wilfredo Rodriguez (400-hurdles, 1990-1991), Howard Sellers (800 meters, 1993), Scott Carroll (3,000-steeplechase, 1994)...York (110-hurdles, 1991-1992)

Albany ended up in fourth place; the program's best finished at the NCAA outdoor meet...three Albany athletes were the first Great Danes to earn All-America status in their respective events ...Oscar Almendarez (2nd, triple jump), Anthony Davenport (2nd, long jump) and James Nixon (6th, decathlon & 8th, pole vault)...

Roberto Vives was named NCAA East Regional Coach of the Year...

Comments: NCAA Division III Track & Field Championships (Final Report for Saturday)

Northfield, Minn. -- University at Albany's Geoffrey York set a meet and stadium record in winning his third national 110-meter hurdles title at the 22nd annual NCAA Division III Track & Field Championships on Saturday at Cartleton College. The Great Danes finished fourth in the final men's team standings.

York's time of 13.85 seconds broke the championship record held by Shannon Flowers, of Lincoln University, who ran 13.86 in 1993. Defending national champion Glenn Clinton, from Alfred (N.Y.), was second in 13.92, while Mikhail Edel (Brandeis) was third in 14.11.

A native of Troy, N.Y, York placed himself in the track & field history books with his victory. He and Roger Retherford (Otterbein, 1974-76) are the only three-time champions in the 110-hurdles. York, who also won the 110-hurdles crown in 1991 and 1992, captured his fifth individual NCAA championship, which includes last March's indoor 55-hurdles title.

York also joins Frostburg State's Maynard Hurd as the only Division III hurdlers to twice win both the indoor and outdoor hurdles championships in the same year. Hurd accomplished that feat in 1985 and 1986, while York scored his first double-victory in 1992.

Also on the final day of competition, Oscar Almendarez closed out his career with a second-place finish in the triple jump. Emory's Troy Thompson won the event with a leap of 48' 5.25", while Almendarez's best effort was 47' 9".

NCAA Track 2-2-2

Travis Miller, a standout defensive back on the Albany football team, had a hand in scoring points in two other events. Miller ran the second leg on Albany's 4x400 relay team which placed third in 3:16.31, and earlier in the day took sixth in the 100-meter dash (10.88 seconds). Other member of the third-place relay team were Courtney Currie, Jomo Forrester and Zamafa Chikwendu.

In the men's team standings, Lincoln (Pa.) University won the third NCAA track championship in the school's history with 80 points. Williams College was second with 61, while North Central College, the 1994 champion, was third with 47. Albany, which had 39 points, was fourth, the best-ever finish at the outdoor national meet.

Northfield, Minn. -- University at Albany's Anthony Davenport finished second in the long jump with a school-record 23' 11.75" mark at the NCAA Division III Track & Field Championships on Friday at Carleton College. The Great Danes are tied for 10th in the men's team standings with 12 points, and have three individuals and one relay in the finals on Saturday.

Wade Alberts, from Nebraska Wesleyan, posted the longest jump in Division III this season (24' 1.5") to capture his first national title.

Davenport, the New York state scholastic runner-up in 1994, owned the previous Albany record, when he went 23' 11" to win the Collegiate Track Conference crown on May 6. The UA freshman was fourth in this same event at the NCAA indoor track championships last March.

James Nixon, who was eighth today in the pole vault after clearing 15' 4.5", also set a school record late Thursday evening, when he scored 6,605 points to place sixth in the men's decathlon. Erik Rosenkranz (St. Thomas, Minn.) was the national champion with 7,212.

Also on Friday, Albany's 4x100-meter relay team was unexpectedly disqualified in championship race. The relay unit of Travis Miller, Courtney Currie, Jomo Forrester and Geoffrey York had run 41.39 seconds in qualifying. Lincoln University was the winner in 40.80.

In the women's competition, Granville Central's Tonya Dodge finished 12th in the 3,000-meter run in 10.37.74.

Northfield, Minn. -- University at Albany's Anthony Davenport posted the top mark in long-jump qualifying to advance to Friday's final at the NCAA Division III Track & Field Championships. The four-day national meet concludes on Saturday.

Davenport went 23' 8.25" to turn in Wednesday afternoon's best performance, as 12 jumpers will square off for the title. Meanwhile, James Nixon cleared the 15-foot mark in the pole vault and the 4x100-meter relay team of Geoffrey York, Travis Miller, Courtney Currie and Jomo Forrester had the day's third-best time (41.39) to move on to the the finals. Granville Central's Tonya Dodge ran 10:34.30 in the women's 3,000-meter run, and will be in the final field.

Nixon, also competing in the decathlon, is 10th in the standings after five events with 3,324 points. John Stein, a freshman from Calvin College, is the first-day leader with 3,748.

In the women's 10,000-meter final, sophomore Lisa Nesta finished 16th in 39:19.52, as Kelly Copps, of St. Thomas, Minn., won the championship in 35.37.94.

Two Albany athletes were eliminated in the qualifying round. Kimberly Toone, who had gone 18' 9.25" in the long jump this season, missed the championship by 1/4 inch. Toone, who also did not qualify for the 400-meter hurdles final, managed a 17' 0" jump in the preliminaries. Vincent Hodnett, bothered by a pulled hamstring, was a non-qualifier in the men's 400-hurdles.

UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY SENDS 12 ATHLETES TO THIS WEEK'S NCAA DIVISION III TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

ALBANY, N.Y. -- **Geoffrey York**, a two-time national champion in the 110-meter hurdles, and **Kimberly Toone**, one of the leading contenders in the long jump, will lead a group of 12 men and women from the University at Albany to the 1995 NCAA Division III Track & Field Championships, which will be held at Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota on May 24-27.

A senior from Troy, N.Y., York owns the fastest time by a Division III hurdler this season, when he ran 13.94 seconds at the Penn Relays. York, who won this year's NCAA indoor 55-meter hurdle title, will be challenged by defending national champion Glenn Clinton, from Alfred (N.Y.) University. York has an opportunity to match Roger Retherford (Otterbein, 1974-76) as the only three-time NCAA winner in the 110-hurdles. He will also compete in the 4x100-meter relay with teammates **Travis Miller**, **Jomo Forrester** and **Courtney Currie**.

Toone, the Collegiate Track Conference champion in the long jump, 100-meter hurdles and 400-meter hurdles, qualified for the NCAAs in three events. She enters Wednesday's long jump trials with the top leap in Division III this spring, when she went 18' 9.25" in setting a meet record at the Albany Invitational. **Tonya Dodge**, of Granville Central High School, and **Lisa Nesta** will run in the 3,000- and 10,000-meter events. Nesta, a sophomore, was 14th at the NCAA cross country championship in November, and qualified for the NCAA indoor 5,000-meter race.

Besides York, four other Great Danes will challenge for national titles in the men's competition. Oscar Almendarez posted the top national mark in the triple jump this season, when he set a school record of 49' 2" in winning the Collegiate Track Conference title. Vincent Hodnett and James Nixon have the second-best marks in the 400-hurdles (52.05) and decathlon (6,566 points), respectively. Freshman Anthony Davenport, the CTC champion in the long jump with a leap of 23' 11", is among the top five NCAA competitors.

Other Albany qualifiers include football star **Travis Miler**, who will compete in the 100-meter dash and as a member of both the 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams. Joining Miller on the 4x400 relay are **Zamafa Chikwendu**, Hodnett and Currie.

Albany has had four men and one woman win individual NCAA outdoor championships. In addition to York's two titles in the 110-hurdles, Wilfredo Rodriquez won a pair of 400-hurdles crowns in 1990 and 1991. Howard Sellers was the 800-meter champion two years ago, and Scott Carroll captured the 3,000-meter steeplechase at the '94 NCAA meet. Winsome Foderingham-Herard was first in the women's 200-meter dash on two occasions, and was 1988 champion in the 100-hurdles.

York, of Troy, N.Y., won the IC4A indoor 55-meter hurdles title back in March. He recorded a season-best 13.94 time in the 110-hurdles at the Penn Relays three weeks ago. His teammate, Oscar Almendarez, will compete for the IC4A triple jump crown on Sunday, and has a Division III-best 49' 2" jump this spring.


ALBANY'S DEBBIE AUGUST SELECTED TO BRINE REGIONAL ALL-AMERICA TEAM

ALBANY, N.Y. -- The University at Albany's **Andy Shein** and **Kimberly Toone** received Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Merit Medals today, as the school's top senior male and female scholar-athlete during the 1994-95 academic year.

Shein, a second team all-East receiver on the Albany football team, has a 3.69 cumulative grade point average in political science with a minor in geography. Toone, an NCAA qualifier in the long jump as a member of the track & field team, has a 3.76 GPA in criminal justice with a minor in business.

A native of Yorktown Heights, N.Y., Shein became just the second Albany football player to be chosen to the GTE College Division Academic All-America first team. Comments: Collegiate Track Conference Championships

ALBANY, N.Y. -- Oscar Almendarez won both the triple jump and 110-meter high hurdles to lead the University at Albany to its sixth consecutive men's title at the Collegiate Track Conference Championships on Saturday at University Field. The Albany women captured their first-ever CTC crown, as Kimberly Toone was a three-event winner.

Almendarez posted the best mark by a Division III competitor in the triple jump this season and set a school record with a leap of 49' 2.50". He also finished first in the 110-hurdles with a 14.86-second clocking. The Great Danes scored 159 points to out-distance St. Rose, which was second with 74. C.W. Post had 71 points to take third.

James Nixon established an Albany record in the decathlon with 6,566 points, and qualified for the NCAA Division III championships, while freshman Anthony Davenport set another UA standard in the long jump at 23' 11". Albany also was first across the line in the 4x400 and 4x800 relays, while Zamafa Chikwendu was a CTC champion in the 400-meter dash. St. Rose's Hailton Silva (1,500-meter run) and Russ Wiltsie (discus) were individual winners.

Dennis King (Bishop Gibbons H.S.), of Albany, was second to Silva in the 1,500, and anchored the winning 4x800 relay. Shawn McGrath (Shenendehowa H.S.) scored 5,994 points to end up second in the decathlon.

In the women's competition, Toone went 18' 4.50" in the long jump, and then added gold medals in the 400-hurdles (1:12.13) and 100-hurdles (15.14). South Colonie High School's Dawn Kassabasian (heptathlon, high jump) and Mary Walminski (discus, hammer) were also double-winners for the Great Danes, which finished with 174 points. Tonya Dodge (Granville Central H.S.) was third in the 1,500.

Southern Connecticut State, the defending CTC champion, placed second with 145 points. SCSU's Katherine Brennan set a meet record in the 2,000-meter steeplechase (8:22.89), while Joy Belgrave and Jessica Castro won the 100-meter dash and triple jump, respectively. St. Rose, third with 74 points, had three individual winners in Tina Busch (800), Nora O'Heaney (1,500) and Deborah Springer (3,000).
