For the combative, G. A. A. instigates modern Olympic games, where the strong, or swift, or agile, are given the opportunity to win their laurels for their personal honor or for the honor of their class. The field sports are staged on the three big G. A. A. days, Campus Day in the fall, and the May Fête and Moving Up Day in the spring. Proof of their individual or class superiority is fought for by the underclassmen in the fall gym meet. For the aquatically inclined, a swimming meet was originated this year.

Hiking is one of the favorite sports—always including the traditional fall and spring hikes into the Helderbergs to the Indian Ladder. For those who are too energetic for a staid, plodding hike, there is the thrilling, caliber-testing Hare and Hound Chase. 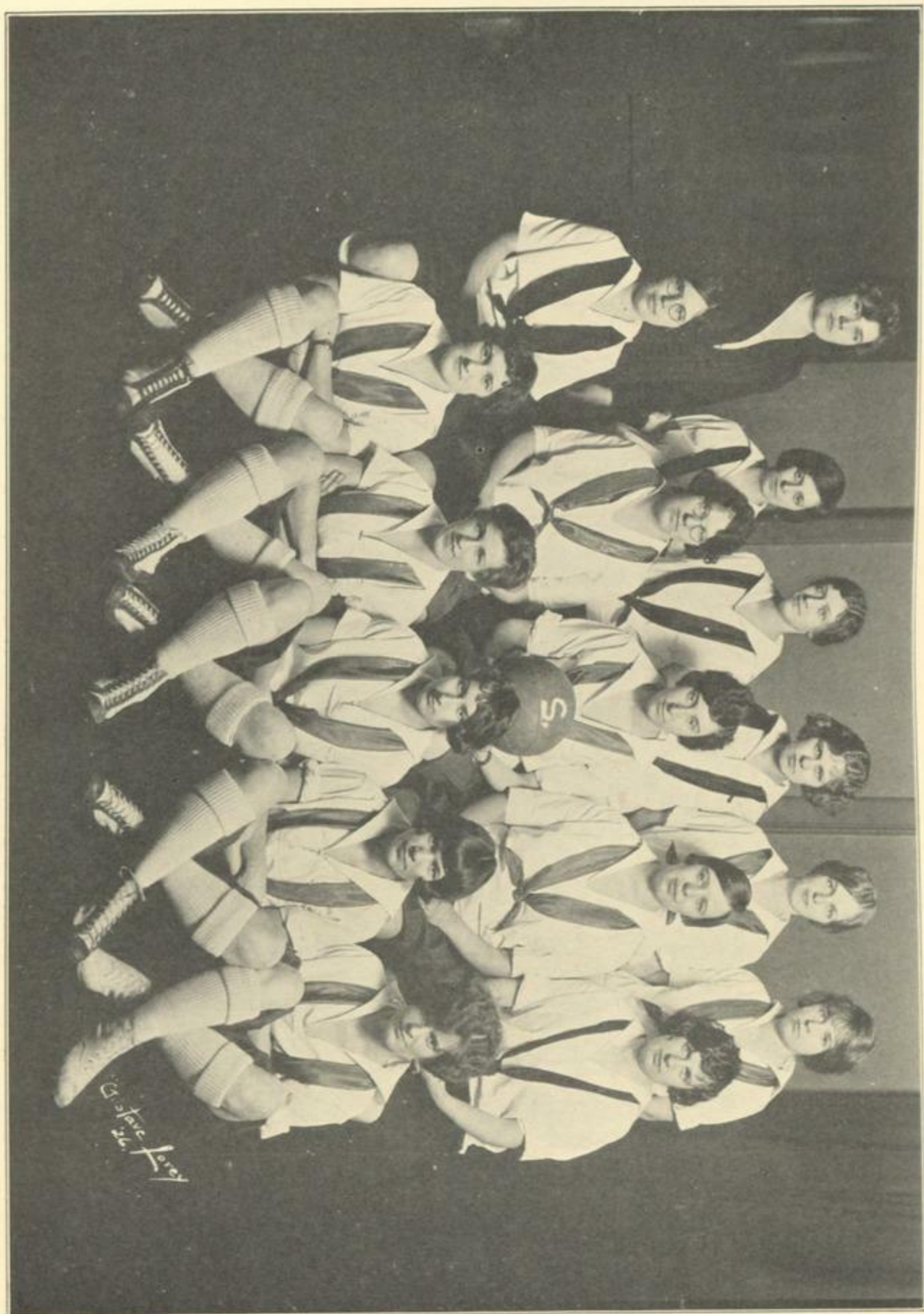

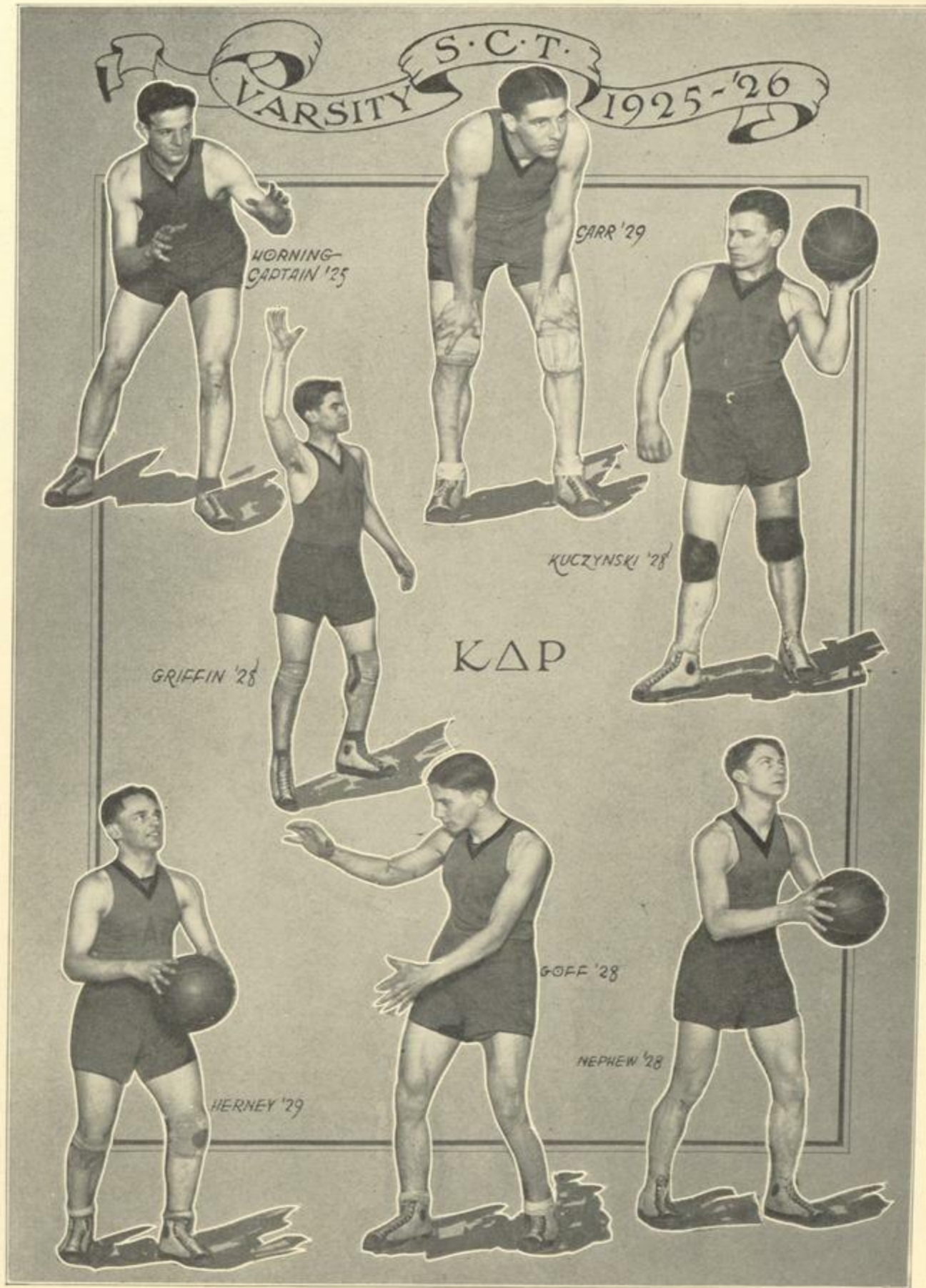

The first game was a disappointment, but the last game closed a season which could not disappoint even the most optimistic. State played 15 games, won all but 5, and at the end of the season had made a total score of 30 points more than our opponents, or 2 for every game. This is really a remarkable record, as we played such highly-ranked teams as St. Stephens, University of Vermont, and Cortland Normal.

Last year's team was ranked as the best since 1919, but by actual count this year's record is the best since 1917. And what is better yet, next year is even more promising, and will see the addition of two or three larger colleges to our schedule.

During this past season, the team showed the results of high class individual ability, teamwork, and excellent coaching. Two years ago the team had no interest in playing the game, or in keeping fit; this year every man has had a keen interest and has sacrificed personal interest to training rules and the needs of the team. In addition to this, the influx of some very promising new material has brought the team up to a high standard of efficiency. Kuczynski and Nephew have kept up their reputations for high scoring and excellent playing in their respective positions. Captain Hornung has done his bit every time, and Griffin has been one of the steadiest and most dependable players on any Eastern college court. Carr, a Freshman, has held down a regular place as forward, and by his brilliant and graceful playing has won great popularity with the fans. Herney, Goff, and Kershaw have done admirable work as substitutes.
