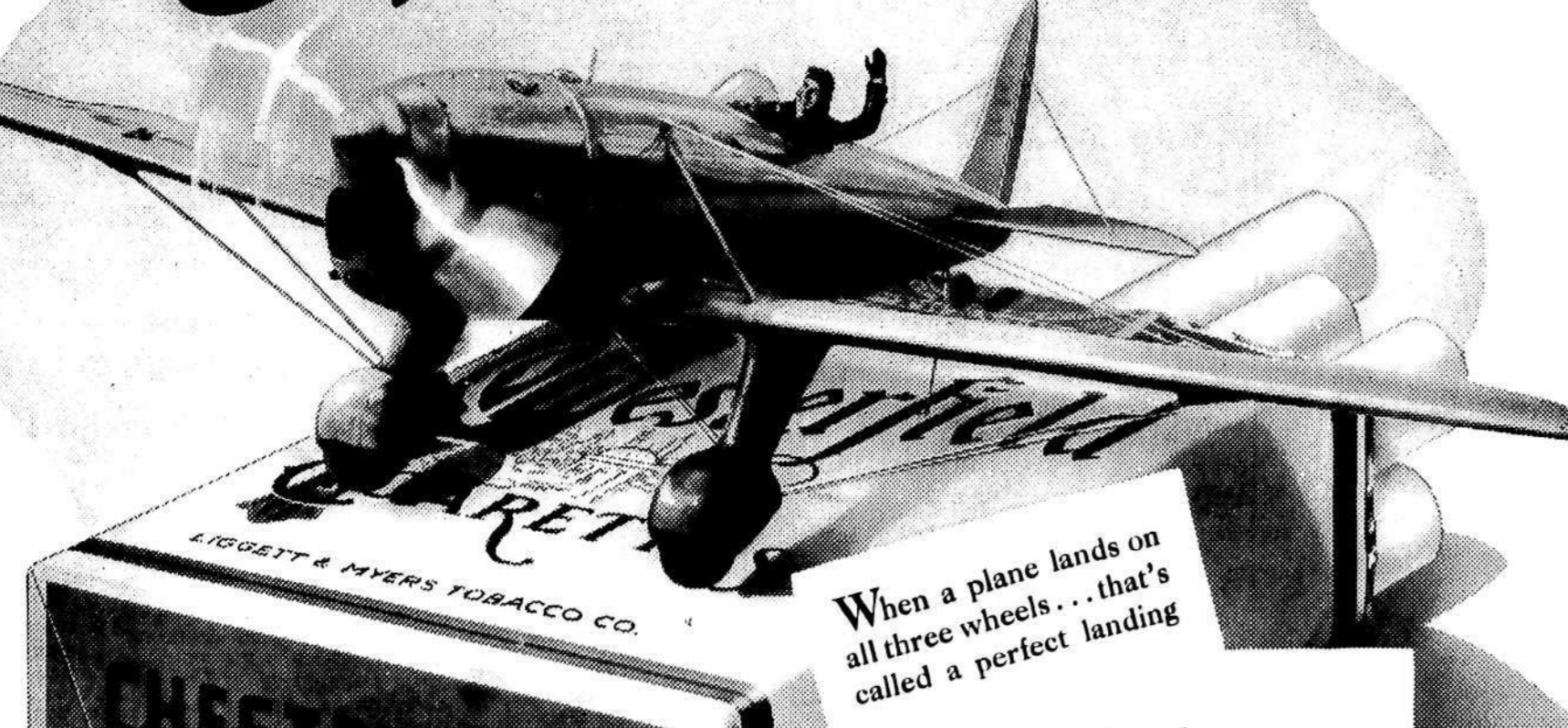

The first order of business will be the nomination of three delegates to the N. S. F. A. Mid-Atlantic District meeting at Vassar college which will be conducted in the spring.

The next order of business will be voting on the following resolutions which were proposed two weeks ago by the point system revision committee.

RESOLVED: that section 6d of the By-laws be amended by striking out the words "points than the maximum set by the point system" and inserting "more than ten points."

RESOLVED: that the following be inserted as section 6h of the By-laws: "A standing point system committee shall be appointed under the following provisions."

1) Members of the committee shall be appointed by the president of the student association on the Friday before Moving-up day to hold office for one year.

RESOLVED: that the following be inserted as section 6i of the By-laws: "All outgoing members of organizations under the point system shall submit a report of hours spent on their activities and the duties required by the point system by Moving-up day."
