UALBANY ATHLETICS

The University at Albany and its intercollegiate athletics program continues to move forward in the 21st century after going through several transitions over the previous decade. UAlbany's athletic teams began competition at the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Division I level, beginning in September 1999. The upgrade elevated all men's and women's programs, and placed football in the NCAA's I-AA classification.

In January 2001, the University accepted an invitation to become a full member of America East Conference. Eighteen of the school's nineteen varsity teams are eligible through America East play for conference championships and NCAA post-season competition. Football,

a Division I-AA program, has been an associate member of the Northeast Conference since 1999.

"Conference affiliation for our entire athletics program enhances the institution's Division I growth," says UAlbany's Director of Athletics and Recreation Lee McElroy. "With America East Conference membership, the University's goals and aspirations for intercollegiate athletics have become clearly defined. Our student-athletes and coaches have an opportunity to compete for both conference and NCAA championships. America East also provides increased visibility for athletics and strengthens our identity with the University's students, alumni, faculty and friends."


In 2003-04, the UAlbany men's lacrosse program captured its second consecutive America East Conference championship and secured an NCAA Tournament berth. Men's track and field won the conference's indoor team title for the second straight year, while women's golf also brought home an America East title. Softball won the league's regular-season crown and tied the school's single-season victory record. Football shared its second consecutive Northeast Conference championship.

UAlbany has an athletic history that dates back to the late 1890s when the first known intercollegiate teams arrived on campus. Albany competed at the college division level prior to the NCAA's restructuring in 1972. The athletic program moved from Division III to Division II in 1995-96.

UAlbany's intercollegiate program has a new direction, but continues to excel in the athletic realm, producing competitive teams, successful coaches, and outstanding student-athletes recognized for their accomplishments both on the field and in the classroom. The University sponsors 19 varsity sports for men and women. Club sports, an intramural program, and recreational opportunities are also offered.

The quality of UAlbany's athletic program is evidenced by some of the finest facilities in the nation. The indoor and outdoor physical education design is among the most comprehensive in the Northeast.

In the spring of 1992, the University opened the Recreation and Convocation Center (RACC), an \$11 million state-of-theart facility. The RACC is the home for Albany's men's and women's basketball teams, and has an 170-meter indoor track.

The 5,000-seat arena also serves as a major venue for community events such as rock and pop concerts, sporting events and University activities. The playing surface on the arena's three basketball courts and track went through a \$1.5 million renovation in the fall of 2004.

In addition, the RACC contains a fitness center with Nautilus and Universal machines, rowing ergometers and exercise bikes; four racquetball/handball courts and four squash courts; athletic training and rehabilitation facilities with three whirlpool baths, a musculoskeletal evaluation device and other therapeutic machines.

Adjacent to the RACC is the Physical Education Building which houses University Gym; three full-size playing surfaces which can be used for basketball, volleyball, and tennis; four racquetball/handball courts; four squash courts; a swimming pool; a fitness and weight training center with Olympic weights; an aerobic exercise room, and a dance studio.

The RACC and Physical Education Building were air-conditioned in March 1996, as the state appropriated funds for renovations and permanent improvements to the University's facilities. The \$2.3 million in funding was prompted by the New York Giants' decision to hold their football training camp on campus. The project brought together the region's community in what has proven to be a successful partnership.

In addition, Albany's air-supported structure, fitted with a brand-new covering with minor interior renovations in the spring of 2003, is located to the east of the Physical Education Building, and may be utilized for tennis, basketball, volleyball, and indoor football practice.

The indoor complex is complemented by fine outdoor facilities, including University Field, which seats capacity crowds of 10,000 for football games, and has an all-weather, 400-meter track surrounding a natural grass surface. There are 24 tennis courts (12 with lighting), four basketball and six volleyball courts; and numerous fields for football, soccer, softball, baseball, lacrosse, field hockey, and other events.

The practice fields on the Western Avenue side of campus were renovated in June 1996 with 263,000 square feet of two-inch thick athletic sod. The irrigation system was refurbished, and the area was surrounded with a 3,100-foot chain-link fence.

COACHING STAFF



SCOTT MARR HEAD COACH

Scott Marr is in his fifth season as the University at Albany's head men's lacrosse coach. In 2004, Marr led the Great Danes to their second consecutive America East Conference Tournament championship and NCAA berth. His team led the conference and was seventh nationally in scoring offense at

11.44 goals per game.

Coach Marr guided the UAlbany program to the school's first-ever NCAA Division I Tournament appearance in 2003. The Great Danes tied a school record for single-season victories with a 10-6 overall won-loss mark.

Marr produced significant results in his second year at the helm. UAlbany captured the 2002 America East regular-season title with a 9-7 record. Albany's six-win improvement from the previous season was the best one-year turnaround in the program's history. He was recognized for his efforts by being voted America East coach of the year.

Marr was recently named one of three assistants for the 2006 U.S. Men's Lacrosse Team. Syracuse's John Desko will serve as the U.S. team's head coach. The 2006 International Lacrosse Federation World Championship will be held in London, Ontario from July 13-22.

As an assistant on Dick Edell's Maryland staff for six years, Marr served as both assistant coach and offensive coordinator. Maryland made five NCAA Tournament appearances during that period, and was the Division I national runner-up in



JOHN SVEC ASSISTANT COACH

Svec, who works with UAlbany's defense, is in his fourth year as an assistant coach. The Great Danes ranked eighth among the NCAA Division I leaders in man-down percentage (.819) in 2004. He played at Loyola College in Maryland

from 1997-2001, where he was a four-year letterman. Svec, a 6-foot-4, 220-pound defenseman, worked on the team's mandown unit as a junior and senior. The Greyhounds posted a 10-4 record and reached the 2001 NCAA quarterfinal round. A native of Arnold, Md., Svec earned a B.A. in elementary education. He has previously worked as a technology representative for deBeer Lacrosse.



BRIAN VAN DERLOFSKE ASSISTANT COACH

Van Derlofske begins his fourth season as an assistant coach. Van Derlofske, a two-time captain, earned three varsity letters as a member of the UAlbany program from 1998-2000. A long-stick defenseman, Van Derlofske started all 36

games as a collegian, and totaled five goals and four assists with 116 ground balls during his career. He was named team MVP as a junior. He earned an undergraduate degree in history and psychology, and received his master's in American history last spring. In 2001, he served overseas as development officer for the English Lacrosse Association.

1995, 1997 and 1998. The Terrapins shattered the school's single-season scoring record with 236 goals, when the program captured the '98 Atlantic Coast Conference regular-season and tournament titles. Maryland's attack averaged 12.5 goals under Marr's direction from 1995-2000. All-Americans Matt Hahn and Andrew Whipple became two of the most storied scorers in school history.

Marr began his coaching career as the University of Delaware's offensive coordinator, where he worked with the school's all-time scorer Anthony DiMarzo. From 1992-94, the Blue Hens captured three consecutive North Atlantic Conference championships, and earned a top-20 national ranking in each season. Marr was also an assistant on the United States team that won the 1999 World Cup.

As a collegiate player at Johns Hopkins University, Marr was an attackman on the 1987 national championship squad and the '89 national runner-up team. The Blue Jays garnered four straight NCAA berths during his career. He received a B.S. in social and behavorial sciences in 1991.

A native of Yorktown, N.Y., Marr was a high school All-American who twice led his team to the state's semifinal round. He and his wife, Traci, a special education teacher, have three children, Kyle, Jordyn and Keeley.

SUPPORT STAFF



JULIE STEINKE DIRECTOR, ACADEMIC SERVICES

Julie Steinke was named director of athletic academic support services in October 2003. Her department's mission is to maximize the academic potential of student-athletes by providing an atmosphere that enhances learning skills, ca-

reer development and personal counseling.

Steinke manages services that offer academic counseling, academic monitoring, learning and study strategies, tutoring and study sessions. In addition, individual study plans and a STAAR program designed for students who need extra assistance are offered.

Steinke, 30, previously was an assistant athletic director for student services and compliance at St. Bonaventure University. From 1999-2003, Steinke monitored all student-athlete academic progress for degree completion and NCAA eligibility purposes.

A native of Troy, Ohio, Steinke received her B.A. in psychology from Saint Mary's College in Indiana, and has a master's in kinesiology with a concentration in applied sport science and sports psychology from Indiana University.



JACK KOELMEL HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

Jack Koelmel is in his 31st year as the head athletic trainer at the University at Albany. He is responsible for all aspects of the sports medicine program, including preventive training, injury rehabilitation and nutrition counseling. Koelmel super-

vises an athletic training staff of three assistants, one graduate assistant and several volunteers.

Koelmel, 56, received a bachelor's degree in physical education from Norwich University in Vermont, where he played basketball and football and worked as a student assistant trainer. An instructor in the care and prevention of athletic injuries, Koelmel earned a M.A. in educational administration from UAlbany in 1973.

From 1992-99, Koelmel served as the NYSATA region representative. He recently received his 25-year service award from the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA). Koelmel and his wife, Margo Ferrara, reside in Ballston Spa with his stepchildren, Frances, Carl and Ross.



RICH BENNETT ASSISTANT ATHLETIC TRAINER

Rich Bennett is in his second year as an assistant athletic trainer. He works primarily with men's lacrosse in the spring.

Bennett previously was a graduate assistant trainer at Eastern Michigan University from 2001-03. He handled foot-

ball, track & field, women's soccer and women's gymnastics. Bennett is an accredited clinical instructor and lecturer for CAAHEP athletic training program.

A native of Syracuse, N.Y., Bennett has a B.S. in athletic training from Boston University. He earned his M.S. in sports management from Eastern Michigan.



KEVIN GALUSKI EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Kevin Galuski was named as head equipment manager in August 2000. He took on additional duties the following year as New York Giants Training Camp liaison. He manages all operational aspects of the summer training camp.

Galuski, 31, was previously the head equipment manager with the Arena Football League's Carolina Cobras for one year. He also worked with the AFL's Albany Firebirds from 1995-99. In his duties with both organizations, Galuski handled the supervision and maintenance of equipment and athletic gear along with game day responsibilities.

Galuski received a B.S. in sports management from Colby-Sawyer College. He is a member of the Athletic Equipment Managers Association. Galuski and his wife, Shannon, reside in the Capital Region.



TONYTULLOCK STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Tony Tullock was named as strength and conditioning coach in July 2000. He supervises Albany's 19-sport intercollegiate athletics program.

Tullock, 30, was previously assistant strength coach at Colgate University for

two years. He designed and administered strength programs for men's and women's ice hockey, soccer, field hockey, lacrosse and softball, and was active with the football and basketball programs. Tullock also handled daily operations of the University Fitness Center, created off-season workouts for athletes, and used video to correct weightlifting techniques.

Tullock, a certified strength and conditioning specialist, was a graduate assistant at the University of Massachusetts for two years. He received a master's degree in exercise science and physiology from UMass, and earned a B.A. in psychology from Boston College, where he was a student assistant. Tullock and his wife, Sue, live in Guilderland.



EDDIE SCOTT ACADEMIC SERVICES

Eddie Scott is in his second year as assistant director of athletic academic support services. His department's mission is to maximize the academic potential of student-athletes by providing an atmosphere that enhances learning skills,

career development and personal counseling.

Scott, 25, was a captain on the 2002 UAlbany baseball team, and earned first-team All-America East Conference honors. He batted .339 as a senior center fielder, and added 27 RBI, nine doubles and two home runs. Scott finished his career ranked among the program's all-time leaders in stolen bases (52), total hits (154), runs (111) and doubles (24).

Scott was chosen to the Verizon Academic All-America national third-team in the spring of 2002. He received the school's Presidential Scholar-Athlete Award and an ECAC Merit Medal as the top senior male student-athlete. Scott, who served on UAlbany's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, was a four-time Spellman Award recipient with the highest GPA for an African-American in his class. He graduated magna cum laude with a B.A. in psychology and has a minor in sociology.

SEASON PREVIEW

The Great Danes made their second consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament last season after capturing the America East Conference championship. UAlbany did it the hard way in 2004 by winning on the road in the tournament semifinals at UMBC and championship at Binghamton.

UAlbany head coach **Scott Marr** has seven starters returning from last year's squad. The Great Danes tied the school's single-season victory record for the second consecutive year with a 10-6 campaign. The non-league schedule continues to be formidable with Johns Hopkins and Syracuse, the top two teams in the national preseason polls, among the opponents.

"Our expectation is always to win our conference and take another step in the NCAA Tournament," said Marr, whose teams have combined for 29 victories over the last three years. "This is a veteran team that burns to get back to the NCAAs."

The Great Danes have six all-conference performers in the lineup, including first-team attacker **Luke Daquino**. The senior co-captain has been a model of consistency throughout his career with 50-plus points in three straight seasons. Daquino, who is fourth on the school's all-time scoring list, had 22 goals and 35 assists as a junior, and was eighth nationally among the Division I assists leaders.

"Luke Daquino is our offensive leader and coach on the field," Marr explains. "He is the driving force behind the team, as a motivator and a

communicator. The offense has to go through him. We need to get him as many touches as we can."

UAlbany featured the conference's top scoring unit last year. The Great Danes were seventh in the nation at 11.44 goals per game. **Merrick**Thomson, the 2004 America East Rookie of the Year, is among four players who netted 40 or more points. Thomson, a second-team all-league attacker, led all A-East scorers at 3.69 points per game.

Frank Resetarits, a sophomore, totaled 27 goals and 20 assists. He was chosen second-team all-league and earned a spot on the all-rookie squad. Chris Martocchia, a 6-foot-2, 235-pound athlete, added 26 goals and 16 assists. He was among the conference's top 10 scorers.

UAlbany's defense is led by senior goalkeeper **Kevin Rae**, a two-time America East championship MVP. Rae, a three-year starter who earned second-team all-conference recognition in 2004, posted a .578 save percentage with a 10.16 goals against average. He made double-figure saves 12 times, and held five league opponents to less than 10 goals.

All-America East defenders Ryan Olmstead (6-3, 215) and Patrick McSweeney (6-1, 240) will support Rae in the cage. Olmstead led the group with 44 ground balls, while McSweeney, who is vital to clearing the ball, picked up 36 off the ground. Chris Kivlen, a senior co-captain, started 15 of 16 games with the defense, while transfer Casey Kear saw increased playing time as the season progressed.

"Kevin (Rae) is as good as anyone in the country," offers Marr, about a goalkeeper who is second on the school's all-time saves list with 619. "We should be good at stopping the ball with five seniors on defense. There is experience and maturity at that end of the field."

In the midfield, **Brendan Russell** is a proven scorer. Russell tallied 20-plus points for the third straight year with 13 goals and eight assists. **John Eleby** (22 ground balls) was adept with the long stick, while **Bakary Janneh** and **Lee Busino** have handled faceoffs in the past while playing transition defense.

"I think the program is on track," says Marr, who does not want to sound overconfident. "We basically went from Division III to the Division I tournament in a short period of time. Now it is a matter of maintaining that level."

NEWCOMERS: The Great Danes received 10 commitments for the 2004-05 academic year. "This is an outstanding group with four high school All-Americans in the class," Marr commented. "It's an athletic group with good speed and running ability. We've added depth in the midfield and size and athleticism on defense."

Craig McDonald and Garrett
Pedley should make the Great Danes'
defensive unit even stronger.
McDonald (6-1, 215) and Pedley (6-2,
210) each earned high school AllAmerica honors by U.S. Lacrosse.
McDonald played in the National High
School Senior Showcase, while
Pedley, a three-time all-state selection,
led his team to New Hampshire's
Division II state championship.

Derek Dale, an honorable mention scholastic All-America attack, was twice named to the All-Suffolk County team on Long Island. Dale accounted for 33 goals and 48 assists as a senior.







AMERICA EAST CONFERENCE

America East Conference enters its 17th year of all-sports championship competition with a reputation as one of the most comprehensive NCAA Division I conferences. With a geographic footprint extending from the Mid-Atlantic to the Northeast regions, America East remains committed to broad-based, competitive Division I athletics programs, complementing the academic integrity of the 10 member institutions.

University at Albany, Binghamton University, Boston University, University of Hartford, University of Maine, University of Maryland, Baltimore County (UMBC), University of New Hampshire, Northeastern University, Stony Brook University, and University of Vermont each offers a unique blend of academic and athletic tradition. America East also has an associate membership with Quinnipiac University in the sport of men's lacrosse.



America East's proven record of success in its sports will enable the conference to earn admission to 12 NCAA Championships in 2004-05. Student-athletes in the sports of baseball, men's basketball, women's basketball, field hockey, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, men's soccer, women's soccer, softball, men's tennis, women's tennis, and volleyball receive access to NCAA Championships via the conference's automatic qualifiers. Individual champions at the America East Outdoor Track and Field Championship will receive bids to that NCAA Championship. In addition, several America East athletes in sports such as men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's golf, and men's and women's swimming and diving will compete in those NCAA Championships. Overall, America East sponsors championships in 22 sports.

Academic Accolades ...

America East institutions saw nine of their student-athletes earn Academic All-America honors in 2003-04 alone. This total ranked fifth-highest among all Division I-AA and I-AAA conferences. Included in the group were first-team selections Lana Khvalina of the UMBC women's tennis team, who was named for the second-straight year, and Alon Lubezky of the Hartford men's soccer team, the school's career goal scoring leader.

America East annually recognizes its student-athletes' success in the classroom. All varsity team members who compile a grade-point average between 3.0 and 3.49 during their playing season receive conference recognition by being named to the Academic Honor Roll. Those outstanding student-athletes who compile a grade-point average of 3.5 or higher are named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll. Nearly 1,700 student-athletes received honor roll recognition in 2003-04 with America East's 3,500 student-athletes averaging a 2.97 grade-point average.

Additionally, the conference annually determines the top scholar-athlete in each of its championship sports. The scholar-athlete must maintain a minimum 3.2 cumulative grade-point average and be a starter or prominent reserve on the team for the duration of the playing season. From the pool of 22 outstanding scholar-athletes, one male and one female America East student-athlete are further honored as the conference's Scholar-Athletes of the Year.

Lana Khvalina of UMBC and Jacob Jentzer of Maine were the 2003-04 Scholar-Athletes of the Year. Khvalina completed her bachelor's degree in political science in three years with a perfect 4.00 grade-point average. She was selected one of 174 student-athletes from the more than 360,000 student-athletes at NCAA Division I, II and III institutions to receive an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship and will apply that scholarship toward her first year at the College of William and Mary Law School. Lee McElroy, Director of Athletics



Dr. Lee A. McElroy, Jr., who has more than 30 years of experience in athletic and educational administration, is in his fifth year as the University at Albany's Director of Athletics and Recreation. McElroy, who provides leadership for Albany's NCAA Division I 19-sport intercollegiate athletics program for men and women, spearheaded a successful search for a broad-based athletic conference when the University accepted an invitation to join the America East Conference in January 2001. He also worked to renew the men's and women's basketball rivalry with Capital Region rival Siena College, led the

development of a master plan to upgrade the University's athletic and recreational complex, and has energized the school's athletic development efforts.

McElroy was also a key figure as the University successfully completed the NCAA's second cycle of Division I athletics certification in August 2003. In addition, he recently helped the University hire an architectural firm in an effort to develop a plan to improve the school's athletic facilities, including the feasibility of the construction of a multi-purpose outdoor stadium and an artificial turf facility. He was recently honored with the 2004 General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletic Director Award by the All-American Football Foundation.

McElroy, who played football at UCLA in the late 1960s, spent the previous four years as American University's director of athletics. American, a Division I school in Washington, D.C., competed in the Colonial Athletic Association. During McElroy's tenure, the AU athletic department upgraded to 19 sports, expanded corporate partners by 400 percent, and planned capital projects for a fitness facility, intramural field and soccer stadium. McElroy founded Eagle Club, the department's fundraising arm, and developed a program rated as one of the top ten in the nation in its compliance with NCAA gender equity requirements.

Dr. McElroy served as president of the America East Conference Executive Committee in 2003-04, and has gained national prominence for his roles with numerous professional organizations and NCAA committees. He is currently serving a three-year term on the Division I Management Council as one of four atlarge representatives from I-AA or I-AAA conferences, and is second vice president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). McElroy previously served on four prestigious NCAA Committees: Athletics Certification, Financial Aid, Degree Completion Program, and the NCAA Special Committee on Agents and Amateurism.

In 1998, McElroy was named to the NACDA Executive Committee for the University Division, and chair of the Sears Directors Cup Committee. The Sears Directors Cup is the only national award and academic scholarship program to recognize all NCAA and NAIA championship sports for women and men.

From 1989-96, McElroy was the director of athletics at California State University-Sacramento. He led the program's transition from Division II to Division I and engineered a move to the Big Sky and Big West conferences. He also implemented a strategic plan that developed a corporate partners plan, created an effective fundraising and marketing program, redesigned academic support services, improved the athletic facilities complex, and provided for campus and community outreach programs.

McElroy also worked at the University of Houston from 1981 to 1988 as an assistant director of men's and women's sports and as an associate director of athletics, and for one year as the director of athletics at The University of the District of Columbia. Before joining the Houston staff, he taught in the public school systems of Santa Monica, California and Beaumont, Texas, and was a high school principal in Beaumont.

Along with his duties for the NCAA and NACDA, McElroy has testified before congressional committees on issues in college athletics, such as gender equity, the welfare of the minority student-athlete, and the academic/athletic balance. McElroy serves on the boards of the National Consortium of Academics and Sports, *Athletic Business* magazine, and the National Minority Golf Association. He is also a fellow at the Institute of Ethics and Sportsmanship at the University of Rhode Island.

McElroy, who resides with his wife, Karen, in Slingerlands, earned his B.S. in political science and history from UCLA in 1970. He later received a M.Ed. from the University of Southern California, and an Ed.D. from the University of Houston.

Innovative degree programs with an international focus and more than 300 study-abroad programs prepare students for the global economy.
