THE UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY BEGINS 1976-77 ACADEMIC YEAR ON MONDAY

Estimated 14,800 Students Expected to Attend During Fall Semester; Student Body to Include 10,300 Undergraduates and 4,500 Graduates; Freshmen Total Exceeds 1,600; Transfers Fill 850 Undergraduate Vacancies

An estimated 14,800 students are expected at The University at Albany as the 1976-77 academic year begins. Classes get underway on Monday, Aug. 30.

Among some 10,300 undergraduates there will be approximately 9,200 full-time students and 1,100 part-time students. The graduate students are expected to total 4,500, of whom approximately 2,000 will be full-time students. Overall enrollments are seen as being close to those of a year ago.

Based on a report on undergraduate admissions activity prepared a week prior to registration day, indications are that 1,657 freshmen will begin classes Monday. Freshman applicants for Fall 1976 admission totaled 13,917 as compared with 13,862 last year.

Transfer applications decreased from 6,122 last year to 5,366 for Fall 1976 admission. Limited space in the School of Business

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THE UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY BEGINS 1976-77 ACADEMIC YEAR ON MONDAY necessitated an early closing to new transfer applications for the business programs, and the decrease in activity can be explained, in large part, by the early closing deadline, according to the report. Some 1,800 were offered admission for the 850 transfer vacancies, and currently 850 are expected to begin their studies at UA this semester.

Applications for both freshman and transfer admission via the Educational Opportunities Program number 2,119, down from 2,347 the previous year. Mid-August figures showed 263 accepted students who had expressed their intent to register this year. Bidding for the remaining 40 spaces was still continuing at the time of the report.

The residence halls opened to 5,740 students on Thursday morning, Aug. 26. Approximately 150 of the students will be housed temporarily for the first few weeks of the semester, according to John Welty, director of residences.

Students at the university, as elsewhere, have experienced delays in receiving notification of Tuition Assistance-Regents

Awards. In an effort to reduce stress and problems for the students,

The University at Albany has taken steps to defer amounts of the previous year's Tuition Assistance-Regents for returning students and the minimum potential award for new students, providing such students have filed for 1976-77. Award letters from the Financial ids Office will be honored for deferral purposes.

Some 95 new international students are expected this semester, joining 130 continuing international students. Most are in graduate programs.

ALBANY UNIVERSITY'S CASTAGNINO NAMED SUNY FACULTY EXCHANGE SCHOLAR

Raul H. Castagnino, professor of Hispanic and Italian studies at The University at Albany and an internationally renowned author, is among 21 Faculty Exchange Scholars named this/by State University of New York. The SUNY expanded program of faculty exchanges among the system's many campuses makes it possible to take the teachings of talented professors from one campus to others in the state-wide university.

Earlier this year Professor Castagnino was awarded the Fiftieth Anniversary Prize of the Argentine Hebrew Society for the best literary essay during 1974-75. The prize was awarded for his bok, "Semiotica, ideologia y teatro hispanoamericano contemporaneo". The prize, which included a cash award, was presented at a public ceremony.

In 1969, the author received the highest literary honor bestowed by the City of Buenos Aires, Argentina. He was awarded first prize in the category Essays 1968 for his work, "Literatura Dramatica Argentina". In that same year he was awarded first prize in the Argentine National Essay Competition for works published in the decade 1955-65. His prize-winning work was "Milicia Literacia de Mayo".

Dr. Castagnino is a native of Buenos Aires and graduated from the University of Buenos Aires with the degree of Professor en Letras. He received his doctorate, with a gold medal, from there in 1942. He went on to teach at his alma mater; at the National University of

La Plata, where he was chairman of the Department of Lettres; at the National School of Dramatic Art; and at other institutions for special seminars.

During the summers of 1965 and 1966, Dr. Castagnino was visiting professor of Spanish at Middlebury College. He joined the faculty of The University at Albany in 1968.

SUNY exchange professors of whom 84 were named in 1974, are those recognized as eminent in their disciplines by academic peers. After nomination by their colleagues, the professors are recommended by the University Faculty Senate and appointed by Chancellor Ernest L. Boyer. The title is awarded for life-time.

Visits at other campuses may last from one to three days but be specific details of the length, time, and nature of activities are negotiated by the scholar and the inviting department.

UNIVERSITY THEATRE SCHEDULES SEASON'S PLAYS

Productions by an experimental repertory theatre group are included in the schedule for the 1976-77 major theatre productions at The University at Albany, according to an announcement by James M. Symons, theatre department chairperson.

Professor Symons will direct the "Lab Theatre Group" in three plays to be performed in repertory.
