Navy 69, Albany 55

Albany, N.Y. – **Courtney Davidson** had 13 of her 19 points in the first half in leading Navy to a 69-55 non-conference victory over Albany on Friday evening at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

Albany (0-4) built an early 19-11 lead, as junior guard **Chris Gray** tallied six of her 10 points in that opening stretch. Navy (3-3) came back with 12 consecutive points to take the lead for good. **Bryanna Herring**, a 6-foot sophomore, keyed that run with six points, while **Catherine Dunn** put her club ahead with a jumper.

The Midshipmen, who shot 60 percent from the field in the first half, held a 41-28 halftime advantage. Davidson, a sophomore guard, scored eight straight points at one point in the final five minutes of the period.

Albany was still within striking distance at 48-37 early in the final stanza, but Navy put the game away with an 11-2 run. **Juliann Flacke** converted a three-point when she was fouled on a hook shot in the lane, and the Mids had a commanding 20-point cushion with 9:53 remaining.

"Navy played a great defensive game," said Albany coach Mari Warner, whose team committed 23 turnovers. They slowed us down with a zone in the second half, and we did not attack it well. Overall, our guard play was not good defensively, and we had trouble running an offense."

Navy's **Maile Shimoda** and **Alison Luschsinger** each had 11 points. Danielle Hutcheson, a 6-foot-4 freshman, totaled 11 points and 10 rebounds for the Great Danes. Sophomore guard **Kathryn Hemlock** added 10 points and five assists.

UALBANY PLACES SIX FOOTBALL PLAYERS ON ALL-NEC FIRST TEAM

Somerset, N.J. – Split end Chris Phillis (Saratoga Springs) and free safety Samson Brown lead a group of ten University at Albany players who were named today to the 2001 All-Northeast Conference football squad. Phillis and Brown are on the all-star unit for the third consecutive year, and are joined on the first team by linebacker Josh Bazan, offensive guard Alex Argulewicz, place-kicker Bryan Bagstad (Shenendehowa) and punter Billy Pike.

UAlbany players on the second team are leading rusher Brian Manigault, a senior tailback, offensive tackle Geir Gudmundsen, center Regan Jones and defensive end John Bolt (Watervliet).

Phillis, one of the top receivers in school history, caught 42 passes for 609 yards and six touchdowns. He finished his career with 126 receptions for 2,100 yards and a school-record 20 touchdowns. Brown, a junior, led the Great Danes in interceptions (5) and pass break-ups (10) to go with 44 tackles.

Bazan, a junior inside linebacker, made the NEC's first team for the second straight year. He led the UAlbany defense in tackles (103), hits for a loss (17), fumbles recovered (4) and fumbles forced (3). Argulewicz, a junior left guard, blocked for an offense that led the conference and ranked 38th nationally in rushing at 182.6 yards per game.

Bagstad, the school's all-time scoring leader for kickers with 167 career points, booted 9 of 14 field goals and 27 of 29 PATs. Pike, a junior, averaged 34.5 yards per punt, and placed 29 kicks inside the opponents' 20-yard line.

Manigault, a two-time second-team All-NEC selection, rushed for 946 yards and seven touchdowns from his tailback position. He finished his career fourth among UAlbany's all-time rushers with 2,251 yards. Bolt, a sophomore who moved to defensive end this season, had 29 tackles and led the team with 5.0 sacks for minus-21 yards.

Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year For Second Straight Season
Stony Brook's Londre Blocker Tabbed Offensive Rookie of the Year
St. John's Orion Sykes Selected Defensive Rookie of the Year

Sacred Heart's Jim Fleming Earns Second Consecutive Coach of the Year Honor

Somerset, NJ — There is an air of familiarity among the Northeast Conference postseason football award winners with three individual honorees being repeat winners. Robert Morris senior quarterback Tim Levcik (Ford Cliff, PA/Ford City) corrals NEC Offensive Player of the Year honors for a second straight season, as does the NEC Defensive Player of the Year, Sacred Heart junior linebacker Kayode Mayowa (Providence, RI/LaSalle Academy). Stony Brook sophomore wide receiver Londre Blocker (Manhasset, NY/Manhasset) picks up Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, while St. John's freshman defensive back Orion Sykes (Brooklyn, NY/Christ The King) nabs the Defensive Rookie of the Year award. For the second straight season, Sacred Heart's Jim Fleming takes home NEC Coach of the Year accolades. Award winners were selected by a vote of league head coaches.

Sacred Heart (seven first team, three second team), Robert Morris (7/3) and Albany (6/4) are each represented with ten all-conference selections. Monmouth (3/5) and Wagner (0/8) land eight all stars, followed by St. John's (1/1), Central Connecticut State (1/1) and Stony Brook (0/1).

Leveik joins Wagner's Rick Sarille (1996, 1999) as the only two players in NEC history to twice earn recognition as Offensive Player of the Year. A four-time NEC Player of the Week award winner this season, he completed 152-267 passes (56.9 percent) and ranked second in the conference with 2,110 yards passing and 22 touchdowns. In league play, Leveik completed 61.9 percent of his passes and fired 21 touchdowns passes, while throwing just five interceptions. Leveik finished his career as the NEC's all-time leader in passing yardage (7,222 yards), total offense (7,082 yards), touchdown passes (76) and completions (537). The Ford Cliff, PA native established new single-season school records for completions, touchdown passes and passing yardage this season, breaking his own record in each category. Leveik, a three-time NEC first team all-star, led Robert Morris to a 28-11 record, three NEC titles and the #1 ranking in the Don Hansen Gazette Mid-Major Poll in 1999 and 2000.

The first two-time Defensive Player of the Year in league history, Mayowa is the ringleader of an impressive Sacred Heart defense that ranks fourth nationally in total defense and seventh in scoring defense. He leads the Pioneers and ranks seventh in the conference with 95 tackles, 47 of which were of the solo variety. Mayowa has also recorded eight tackles for losses, 2.0 sacks, five fumble recoveries and three interceptions. Armed with a big play mentality, the Providence, RI native scored three defensive touchdowns this season, including a 24-yard interception return to help the Pioneers knock off Robert Morris for just the third time in NEC play since the formation of the circuit in 1996. Mayowa is the third most prolific tackler in NEC history with 336 stops and is the league's career leader with 51 tackles for losses.

Blocker's emergence at wide receiver, along with the quick maturation of quarterback Scott Bard, resulted in an improved Stony Brook passing attack this season. The Seawolves ranked sixth in the NEC in passing offense last year, but jumped to third in 2001 as Blocker made 31 receptions for 482 yards and five touchdowns. Among first year players, he stands only behind CCSU's Nick Dresko in receptions and receiving yardage. Blocker's breakthrough game came against Wagner on October 6, when he reeled in seven passes for a school record 216 yards and three touchdowns in Stony Brook's 52-30 victory.

Sykes joined a strong St. John's secondary this season and made his presence felt with 56 tackles (32 solo), four tackles for losses, one interception, one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. With 11 passes defended (tied for third in the league) he helped spark the Red Storm to a #15 national ranking in I-AA in passing defense.

Fleming's success at Sacred Heart upon his arrival last season is nothing short of remarkable. After taking over a program that had lost 25 of its last 29 games, Fleming engineered a turnaround that recently brought the Pioneers their first NEC championship and a berth in the ECAC Bowl against Duquesne on December 1. An Eddie Robinson award finalist for the second straight season, Fleming has guided Sacred Heart to a perfect 10-0 record and a #1 ranking in both the Sports Network and Don Hansen Gazette Mid-Major polls this season. The Pioneers lead the nation in scoring, averaging 41.9 ppg, and set a new NEC record with 419 points on the season. In two years, Fleming's teams have posted a 20-1 record.

Robert Morris junior Sam Dorsett (Hollywood, FL/Flanagan) and Sacred Heart senior Marvin Royal (Pleasantville, NJ/Fairfield University) reprise their roles as the first team all-NEC backfield. Dorsett gained 1,166 yards and averaged 6.0 yards per rush, both tops in the NEC, and added ten touchdowns. The lightning quick tailback rushed for over 100 yards in seven of the Colonials' nine games this season and ten of 12 going back to the 2000 campaign. Dorsett is second on the NEC career rushing list with 2,709 yards heading into his senior season. Royal has scored a school-record and NEC-high 16 rushing touchdowns in 2001, and with 972 yards on the ground, has one game remaining to crack the 1,000-yard mark for the second straight season. A punishing runner, he averages 4.2 yards on his league-leading 229 carries.

Sacred Heart senior Deveren Johnson (San Diego, CA/Champlain JC) and Albany senior Chris Phillis (Saratoga Springs, NY/Saratoga Springs) are the league's first team all-NEC wide receivers. With great size (6-6), speed and leaping ability, Johnson is a pro prospect and one of the most dangerous receivers in NEC history. A three-time NEC Player of the Week, he established new single-season league records with 1,114 receiving yards and 13 touchdowns. He has also averaged a spectacular 23.7 yards per catch on 47 receptions. Johnson, who caught 23 passes for 574 yards and eight touchdowns in games against the Pioneers three chief competitors - Robert Morris, Albany and Monmouth - was a second team all-NEC pick last season. Phillis is one of the league's great route runners, and despite being hampered by back and toe injuries over the final few weeks of the season, still managed to make a teamhigh 42 receptions for 609 yards and six touchdowns. He finished his career as the third most prolific receiver in NEC history with 124 receptions. Phillis earned second team all-NEC status in 2000, and was a first-team honoree in 1999.

Robert Morris sophomore Brent Hockenberry (Kittanning, PA/Kittanning) is the coaches' choice at tight end. Hockenberry caught 39 passes for 661 yards and six touchdowns. He leads all NEC tight ends in receiving yardage and ranks second in catches and touchdowns. A second team all-NEC selection in 2000, he amassed 100+ receiving yards in three games this season.

There is a notable Robert Morris influence on the first team all-NEC offensive line, with Colonials players accounting for three of the five spots. Senior center Mark Leyenaar (Palm Harbor, FL/East Lake) is now a three-time first team all-star, while senior tackle Pat Linberg (Renovo, Pa/Bucktail Area) earns his second first team nod. Colonial sophomore Kevin Wachhaus (Lancaster, Pa/Manheim) was a second team selection in 2000 and is one of just two underclassmen to be awarded first team honors at any position. Another repeat winner is Albany junior guard Alex Argulewicz (Wallkill, NY/Wallkill Central), a second team performer last year. The remaining spot goes to Sacred Heart senior center Chris Hevey (Merritt Island, FL/Bedford), who helped anchor an offensive line that yielded just ten sacks all season.

There is a changing of the guard on the first team all-NEC defensive line this season with four new players in the spotlight. Sacred Heart senior Shaun Hubbard (Neptune, NJ/Fort Scott CC) is the only member of the line with previous all-star recognition, carning a second team accolade last season. One of the most feared pass rushers in the conference and a two-time Defensive Player of the Week, Hubbard leads the conference with 9.5 sacks and has totaled 16.5 in two seasons. He has also tallied 16 tackles for losses, intercepted a pass and forced a fumble. Hubbard's teammate, senior DJ Dymond (Woodbourne, NY/Tri-Valley), has made 46 stops, including 12 behind the line of scrimmage, along with 3.5 sacks. Monmouth junior defensive end Chris Ammacher (Hawthorne, NJ/Hawthorne) had an outstanding season for a Monmouth team that prides itself on its defense. Ammacher ranks second in the NEC with 8.5 sacks, and is tied with Hubbard for fourth with 16 takedowns for losses. He also broke up three passes and forced two fumbles. Junior tackle Mike Kirk (Stormville, NY/Carmel) is Central Connecticut State's lone all-star this season following a campaign in which he registered 49 tackles, including nine for losses, and 2.0 sacks.

Along with Mayowa, Albany's Josh Bazan (Bronx, NY/Cardinal Spellman) makes a return appearance as a first team all-NEC linebacker. In a position rich in talent, Bazan is one of the most NEC's dominant linebackers. He led the Great Danes in tackles (100) and tackles for losses (17), and ranks fifth and second, respectively, in the league in those categories. Bazan also totaled 4.0 sacks, six passes defended and an NEC-high four forced fumbles. Robert Morris' Reggie Chambers (Randallstown, MD/Mount St. Joseph) had a breakout year for the Colonials, compiling a team-high 108 tackles and ten stops in the backfield. Chambers, who ranks second in the NEC in tackles, also recorded one sack and one interception.

Albany junior Samson Brown (Bronx, NY/Cardinal Spellman) makes his third consecutive appearance as a member of the first team all-NEC secondary. A free safety, Brown is second in the NEC with five interceptions. He also made 43 tackles and broke up five passes. Monmouth senior free safety Aaron Edwards (Jackson, NJ/Jackson) also makes his third all-star team, following second team recognition in 1999 and first team status in 1998. He had a statistically dominant season for a Hawk team ranked eighth in the nation in passing defense. Edwards, who is the top-ranked tackler in the conference with 114 stops, ends his career as the NEC's all-time leader with 353 takedowns. A three-time NEC Defensive Player of the Week this season, he also intercepted three passes, broke up five more, forced a fumble and blocked an NEC-high five kicks. Sacred Heart senior cornerback Kitherne Cowan (Woodbridge, NJ/Woodbridge) is yet another three-time all-star, though his initial selection came as a running back in 1999 prior to his conversion to defensive back last season. In a Pioneer secondary stockpiled with talent and ranked seventh in I-AA in passing defense, Cowan led the way and is tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. He has also broken up six passes, blocked four kicks and made 30 tackles. The lone newcomer to the all-NEC secondary is St. John's senior Allistair Sebastien (Roosevelt, NY/Roosevelt), a terrific aithlete with pro potential. Sebastien accumulated 40 tackles, picked off two passes and broke up seven others during the 2001 season.

Albany senior Bryan Bagstad (Clifton Park, NY/Shenendehowa) takes home all-NEC placekicking honors. Bagstad converted 9-14 field goal attempts and 27-29 PAT's to rank second in the conference in scoring with 54 points. He made five of his last seven field goal attempts to close out the season.

Albany junior Billy Pike (Lawrence, NY/Lawrence) is the first team pick at punter. Pike is tied for second in the NEC with 34.5 yards per kick, but rates first with 19 boots inside the 20 yard line and ten fair catches. He also set a league record with a 73-yard punt in the Great Danes' 24-14 win over St. Francis (PA) on October 27.

Monmouth junior Jason Roach (Toms River, NJ/Manchester) earns first team plaudits as a return specialist. Roach averaged 25.9 yards on his 16 kickoff returns to rank second in the NEC and 25th in I-AA in the category. During the first game of the season, Roach returned the opening kickoff 93 yards for a score in Monmouth's 23-15 win over Wagner.

The second team all-NEC offense is headed by Sacred Heart senior quarterback Justin Holtfreter (Lancaster, CA/Antelope Valley JC). Holtfreter threw for 2,393 passing yards during the regular season to set a new NEC single-season record. He also rifled 24 touchdown passes against just seven interceptions. The backfield is comprised of Monmouth senior Matt Merklinger (West Orange, NJ/Seton Hall Prep) and Albany senior Brian Manigault (Hempstead, NY/Uniondale), both two-time second team honorees. Merklinger rushed for 819 yards and ten touchdowns, and leads all league running backs with 29 receptions for 411 yards and four scores. He closed out his career with 210 points and 35 touchdowns, tying Chris Reed's school record in both categories. Manigault ate up 946 yards on the ground and scored seven times for the Great Danes, who lead the NEC in rushing offense. Manigault moved into fourth place on the school's all-time rushing list with 2,252 career yards. St. John's junior wide receiver Matt May (Medford, NY/Patchogue-Medford) leads the NEC with 60 receptions (for 825 yards), including a 13-catch effort in the Red Storm's season finale. He collected five touchdowns on the season. He is joined at wideout by Wagner's Lou Simone (Staten Island, NY/Tottenville), who paced the Seahawks with 51 receptions for 622 yards, including six for scores. Simone's teammate, senior tight end Daryn Plummer (Somerset, NJ/Franklin), leads all players at his position and ranks second in the conference with 11 touchdown receptions. A first team pick in 2000, Plummer recorded a school record 21 touchdown grabs in two seasons. The offensive line is comprised of Monmouth seniors Matt Herdman (Bergenfield, NJ/Bergenfield) and Eric Buraszeski (Brick, NJ/Brick), Albany junior Regan Jones (Vero Beach, FL/Vero Beach), Albany freshman Geir Gudmundsen (Saugerties, NY/Saugerties) and Sacred Heart junior Jason St. John (Oakville, CT/Watertown). Herdman is the only repeat honoree - he was a first team choice last season - while Gudmundsen is the l

The second team all-NEC defense features four sophomore defensive lineman. Wagner's John Harrison (Hart, CA/College of the Canyons JC) field for second in the conference with 17 tackles for losses, while teammate Franklin Bright (Waltham, MA/Belmont) field for fifth with 15 backfield stops. Albany's John Bolt (Watervliet, NY/Watervliet) led Albany with 5.0 sacks and Monmouth's Sean Kerr (Summit, NJ/Summit) was a run-stopper who added 2.0 sacks. Wagner linebacker Mike Steed (Poughkeepsie, NY/N.Y. Military Academy) finds himself an NEC all-star for the third straight season (first team in 2000) following an 87-tackle campaign. He also totaled 13 tackles for losses. Steed is joined by teammate Jeremy Balina (Neptune, NJ/Neptune), a junior who finished with an NEC best 27 stops behind the line of scrimmage, the second best single-season total in league history. He also paced Wagner with 92 tackles and tied for the team lead with 5.0 sacks. Stony Brook's Aden Smith (Rockville Center, NY/Malverne) ranks first in the NEC in tackles per game (12.4) and set a new school record with 112 takedowns this season. In the secondary, Sacred Heart junior Blake Neri (Dover, NH/Dover) is the league's top pilferer, having picked off six passes, two of which he returned for touchdowns. Robert Morris junior Corey Oaks (Pittsburgh, PA/Perry) intercepted three passes and led the Colonials with 11 passes defended. Monmouth junior Michael Pitts (Tenafly, NJ/Tenafly) intercepted three passes, broke up eight more and forced three fumbles for the Hawks. Wagner's Kharee Shorter (Wyncote, PA/Cheltenham) made 62 tackles from his free safety position and had three pickoffs.

Robert Morris' Jeff Carlo (Wilkes-Barre, PA/Elmer Meyers) is the lone double winner this season, earning second team honors at both placekicker and punter. Carlo, a four-time all-star at placekicker, ends his career as the NEC's all-time leader with 35 field goals. This season, he drilled 6-10 attempts, and was successful on 34-36 extra points. A first-time pick as a punter, Carlo averaged an NEC-high 34.9 yards per kick and dropped eight inside the 20 yard line. Return specialist Ryan Castellani (Peckville, PA/Valley View) of Wagner leads the conference and ranks 22nd nationally with 13.4 yards per punt return.

UALBANY'S JANIS PIPIKIS WILL MISS THE OPENER VERSUS LAFAYETTE

Albany, N.Y. – Director of Athletics and Recreation Lee McElroy announced today that Janis Pipikis, a 6-foot-8 sophomore center from Latvia, will miss the University at Albany's opening basketball game of the 2001-02 season against Lafayette on Saturday, November 17.

The NCAA forwarded an official interpretation on Pipikis' eligibility status to the UAlbany athletic department on Thursday. The decision states that Pipikis violated the Amateur Status rule (By-Law 12.1.1) when, as a member of his Latvian club team, he played in one game within a league which promotes itself as a professional league.

Due to the circumstances, McElroy said the University will not appeal this decision and Pipikis will not be eligible to play against Lafayette.

ALBANY NAMES MEN'S BASKETBALL CAPTAINS FOR 2001-02

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany head basketball coach Scott Beeten announced today that **Will Brand**, **Joe Vukovic** and **Antione Johnson** will serve as team captains for the 2001-02 season.

A 6-foot-5 senior forward, Brand averaged 14.0 points and 6.9 rebounds last year. Brand, who is the first player to be named captain in three consecutive years, ranks 14th on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,118 points. He has made 84 consecutive starts, and is among UAlbany's top career rebound leaders with 542.

Vukovic, a captain for the second straight season, contributed 6.9 points and 4.0 rebounds as a starter in 12 of 22 games. The 6-foot-7 senior has made 77 career appearances in an Albany uniform.

Johnson, a junior guard, averaged 11.5 points and a team-leading 3.1 assists last year. He played 40-plus minutes against 14 opponents, and was the key figure in a pair of overtime victories against Army and Lehigh.

The Great Danes, who begin America East Conference play this year, open their schedule at home against Lafayette on Saturday, Nov. 17. Tip-off is 1:00 p.m.

He fired a 19-yard strike to tight end **Brent Hockenberry**, and then found split end **Ricky Daldo** alone on the right sideline with a 31-yard pass.

BOSTON UNIVERSITY PICKED TO WIN AMERICA EAST MEN'S BASKETBALL TITLE

Boston, Mass. – Boston University has been picked to win the 2002 America East Conference Men's Basketball Championship, as announced on Thursday at America East Basketball Media Day at Northeastern University's Matthews Arena. The conference's head coaches chose the University at Albany to finish eighth in the nine-team league.

THREE ALBANY MEN'S SOCCER PLAYERS EARN AMERICA EAST HONORS

Boston, Mass. – University at Albany's Jason Warshaw, a senior midfielder, and junior sweeper back Sadeky Jackson have been chosen to the All-America East Conference men's soccer squad in voting conducted by the coaches. Both players were second-team selections. Freshman forward Lucas Machado was named to the America East All-Rookie Team.

A starter in 14 contests, Warshaw totaled two goals and four assists. He returned after missing most of last season with a knee sprain and was elected captain for a school-record fourth time in five seasons. Jackson, a transfer from Monroe College in the Bronx, stabilized the Great Dane defensive backfield from his sweeper back position. Albany held opponents to two goals or less on 11 occasions and posted three shutouts. Machado, a native of Porto Alegre, Brazil, was one of 11 players, regardless of position, to be selected for the All-Rookie Team. He recorded three goals and one assist in 17 outings.

Albany finished with an 8-9 overall record, matching last season's win total in its first year of America East Conference competition. The Great Danes placed seventh out of 12 teams, but were bumped from the final playoff berth for the league's postseason tournament on the final day of the season.

Boston University's Kaland, Hartford Alon Lubezky Earn Top Honors Boston University's Roberts is Chosen Coach of the Year

BOSTON— Boston University senior forward Joachim Kaland and University of Hartford forward Alon Lubezky were chosen America East Player and Rookie of the Year in voting conducted by the conference's men's soccer coaches. Boston University head coach Neil Roberts was named Coach of the Year for third time in his career.

Kaland is second in America East and ranks among the national leaders in scoring with 18 goals and six assists for 42 points. His 18 goals are tied for the Terrier single-season record. Alon Lubezky leads America East with 20 goals and eight assists for 48 points. He ranks third in the nation with 2.53 points per game. Kaland is fourth with 2.47 points per game. Kaland is tied for second in the nation with 1.06 goals per game while Alon Lubezky is fourth with 1.05 goals per contest.

Roberts, who was also chosen the Coach of the Year in 1991 and 1994, has guided the Terriers to a 9-1-1 mark in America East as the conference's regular-season champion. Boston University is 13-4-1 overall and is unbeaten in its last nine (8-0-1). Roberts is 214-85-42 in 17 years with the Terriers, with 10 trlps to the NCAA Championship in that time.

Kaland and Alon Lubezky are joined on the all-conference first team by Towson University senior forward Alfonso DeMares, the 2000 America East Player of the Year, who ranks third in the conference this season with 14 goals and nine assists for 37 points.

Alon Lubezky's brother, Asaf Lubezky, a junior at Hartford, leads the selections at midfield. Asaf Lubezky has eight goals and six assists for 22 points and has earned first-team honors in each of his three seasons in America East. Other midfielders are junior Andrew Dorman of Boston University, who has seven goals and leads America East with 12 assists, Towson senior Todd Lauber, who has nine goals and a like number of assists and Northeastern University senior Anders Hoyem, who has five goals and nine assists.

The all-conference backs are sophomore Rishi Matadeen and senior Luckisee Williams of Hofstra University, each of whom move up after earning second-team honors last season, and Hartford senior Milton Speid, a repeat selection on the first team.

Hartford senior Chris Doyle, who is 12-5-2 with a 1.26 goals against average is the first-team goalkeeper.

The second team consists of Hofstra senior Hughroy Daley, Towson junior Machel Millwood and Northeastern senior Petter Starnas at forward. The midfielders are seniors Dan Keane of University of Delaware, Patrick Geraghty of Hofstra, Trond Olsen of Northeastern and Jason Warshaw of University at Albany. Rookie Erik Evjen of Boston University is joined at back by Towson senior Steve Hoeck and Albany junior Sadeky Jackson. Boston University rookie Zak Thompson, who leads America East in goals against average at 1.00 and has posted a 9-1-1 mark in 12 games, is the second-team goalkeeper.

The All-Rookie team consists of Alon Lubezky, Evjen, Thompson, Federico Bianchi of Boston University, Steve Fell of Towson, Akil Jordan of Stony Brook University, Antha Kirkopoulos of Northeastern, Logan Lee of University of New Hampshire, Lucas Machado of Albany, Justin Sadler of Drexel University, and Easton Wilson of Hartford.

Each of the 11 first-team all-conference selections and eight of the second-team choices are in action this week at the America East Men's Soccor Championship. No. 6 seed New Hampshire visits No. 3 Towson in a first-round game Wednesday, November 7 at 1 p.m. No. 5 Hofstra travels to No. 4 Northeastern Wednesday at 3 p.m. in the other first-round match. The winner of the New Hampshire-Towson game plays at No. 2 Hartford at 1 p.m. Saturday, November 10. TIM CAMPE CHOSEN NEC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Somerset, N.J. – University at Albany's Tim Campe has been selected as the Northeast Conference Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in last Saturday's 19-10 victory over Monmouth.

Campe, a senior inside linebacker, spearheaded a defensive effort that knocked Monmouth out of first place in the conference standings. The 6-foot, 235-pound defender made 13 tackles, including nine solo hits, and added three tackles for a loss and one quarterback sack. The Great Danes limited Monmouth to 40 net rushing yards, including 31 by All-NEC running back Matt Merklinger.

Campe, who has recorded 10 or more tackles twice this season, is second on the team with 65 total hits, and has three pass break-ups, two fumble recoveries and one forced fumble. Albany's defense is ranked 14th nationally in rushing defense at 101.6 yards per game, and is 10th in scoring with a 15.8 average.

A starter in all 17 contests, DiMicco led the Great Danes in scoring with six goals and four assists for 16 points. She finished her career tied for second on the school's all-time scoring list with 99 points (41 goals, 17 assists).

Albany 19, Monmouth 10

West Long Branch, N.J. – Senior tailback **Brian Manigault** rushed for 148 yards and caught a first-half touchdown pass to lead Albany to a 19-10 Northeast Conference victory over Monmouth on Saturday at Kessler Field.

Backup quarterback **Marcus Rotondi**, who ran for a season-high 79 yards, helped Albany (7-1, NEC 5-1) build a 13-0 lead early in the second quarter. Rotondi, a senior, scored on a two-yard option run with 6:54 remaining in the opening period, but the extra point missed to the left. He then capped a 12-play drive with a two-yard touchdown pass to Manigault on a third-down play with 10:32 left in the half.

Monmouth (6-2, NEC 4-1) entered the contest unbeaten in conference play, and got on the scoreboard with a 23-yard field goal by **Ryan Peterson**. The Great Danes, who rushed for a season-best 330 yards, responded with a 14-play march that resulted in **Bryan Bagstad's** 24-yard field goal with 2.7 seconds left before the intermission.

The Hawks, who were off to their best start in school history, trailed 16-3 at halftime, but scored on their first possession of the third quarter. Quarterback **Bill Rankin** hit **Matt Merklinger** with a screen pass, and the tailback raced 74 yards down the right sideline to paydirt. Merklinger caught seven passes for 107 yards and ran for 31 more.

Albany had two opportunities to take control of the game in the second half, but two drives resulted in a missed field goal and a failed fourth-down conversion at the Monmouth five-yard line.

In the fourth quarter, the Hawks were working on a drive, but a high snap went over Rankin's head in a shotgun formation. Albany's **Josh MacAnn** knocked the ball away, and defensive end **John Bolt** recovered at the 26-yard line. Four plays later, Bagstad booted a 29-yard field goal with 6:47 left. The senior place kicker tied the school's all-time record with his 20th career field goal.

"We were able to pound the football, and Marcus Rotondi played his best game of the year," Albany coach **Bob Ford** said. "Our defense did a good job of shutting down their ground attack."

"If you keep feeding me the ball, I will try my best," said Manigault, who ran for 100 or more yards for the seventh time as a collegian. "This win goes to the offensive line, they contributed a lot today."

Rankin and **Chris Wielgosz** combined to complete 17 of 22 passes for 257 yards, but the Albany defense limited Monmouth to 40 net rushing yards.
